

SIX ESCAPE DEATH AT TURK'S HANDS; COME TO PORTLAND

Miraculously escaping massacre at the hands of the Turks for more than six years and completing a hazardous journey of four and one half months, 10 travelers, relatives of the Cartozian brothers of Portland, arrived in the city Wednesday evening from their home in Sivas, Armenia, to take up residence in this country.

Only the vow of the Masonic order saved the Armenians and only the vow allowed them to get away from the ravaged Near East to rejoin their relatives in this city. For years, in fact, the Portland members of the Cartozian family thought their relatives to be dead, and only word received recently made known the fact that they were still alive.

MASONIC VOW SAVES HIM
Pilos O. Cartozian, the oldest of the brothers, brought the party safely to Portland. Pilos was ordered by a Turkish government official to be killed, but the Turk who took him in charge was a Mason and he took him into his home at the risk of his own life and kept him there all during the war.

A sister, Mrs. Makweh Kirishian and her four children were also members of the party. Her husband was killed in 1917 and she and her family were protected through efforts of the Turk who saved the life of her brother. The children range in age of from 1 1/2 to 16 years.

At the Cartozian home Wednesday evening a welcome was celebrated in Biblical fashion. The mother, who had been seriously ill for several months until news of the safety of her children and

grandchildren brought her recovery, had been preparing for the homecoming feast for two weeks. Mrs. Cartozian has been in this country since 1905.

FATHER MASSACRED
When the father of the family was killed in the massacre of 1895, Pilos, the older brother, took the family in charge and sent his brothers to America while he stayed in Armenia to take care of his relatives there until all could come to this country.

Although passports are almost impossible to obtain from Armenia, letters from Wallace McCannan to the Scottish Rite Masonry in Washington, D. C., resulted in the papers being finally obtained.

Mrs. Cartozian, son of Pilos, arrived in Portland in June after a perilous journey of many months. There are now about 50 members of the family in the United States.

Entertainment for Benefit of St. Joseph Home Big Success

Approximately 3000 persons made merry Tuesday night on the spacious lawn surrounding the Mount St. Joseph home, East Thirtieth and Stark streets, at a benefit entertainment given for the 80 aged persons in the home.

Acts from the Hippodrome, Pantages and Lyric theatre, together with local talent, received warm applause from the audience which assembled in the improvised theatre on the lawn. John McEntee had charge of this end of the entertainment. Mike Driscoll directed the booths.

Members of the Knights of Columbus and Daughters of Isabella had charge of the various booths. Seven "jazzing" musicians, who also donated their services, added merriment to the occasion. The amount of money raised has been estimated at \$2500.

During the entertainment many things were done to make the inmates of the home happy. Those who were able to be out of bed sported about on the lawn with the younger generations. Others were wheeled in front of windows where they watched the merriment.

MARSHFIELD ONLY CITY AFTER 1921 ELKS CONVENTION

Salem, July 22.—Although Marshfield is at this stage of the convention apparently unopposed as a candidate for the 1921 session of the Oregon State Elks' association, the "Elks" from the Coos country are taking no chances on a defeat of their ambition through overconfidence.

The Marshfield delegation of Elks, 150 strong, arrived early Thursday morning in six special cars and began at once to let the rest of the antlered herd assembled in annual convention know that the metropolis of the Coos district was on the map and awake to its opportunities as a prospective convention city. Headquarters have been established in which every window proclaims the fact that Marshfield and the Coos country are ready with an open hand to welcome the Elks of Oregon a year hence.

ONE CONTEST IN VIEW
So far but one contest is apparent in the race for position on the official roster of the state association. R. L. Alexander of Pendleton will be opposed by Dr. Rosenberg of Bend as a candidate for president of the state association. James Olsen of Portland, present secretary of the association, will be unopposed for reelection it is stated.

With approximately 1500 Elks on the job for the kickoff of the third annual convention of the state association Thursday morning and reinforcements arriving by train and automobile every minute the Capital City presents a scene that is dominated by the purple and white of the lodgemen. It is estimated that not less than 2000 Elks, together

with their ladies, will have arrived for the convention before the day is done.

BOXING BIG FEATURE
Wednesday night's program, which formally opened the convention, included addresses of welcome by Governor Ocott, on behalf of the state, August H. Hucksstein, on behalf of the Salem lodge of Elks, and Mayor Wilson on behalf of the city.

Harry G. Allen, state president of the order, responded to the welcoming addresses and Supreme Court Justice Lawrence T. Harris delivered the principal address of the evening.

Business sessions of the convention opened at 10 o'clock Thursday morning. Eight bands, from as many sections of the state, will regale the visitors with concerts during their leisure hours, and a parade will feature the evening's program. The big entertainment feature of the convention is scheduled for Friday night, when two Pacific Coast boxing championships will be decided and three additional matches will be staged in the stadium at the State Fair grounds. The convention will continue through until Saturday night.

Ladies accompanying Elks to the convention will be entertained Friday night at a showing of the pageant "The Awakening of Spring" in the Grand opera house.

DECORATED AIRPLANE IS SENT BY ROSEBURG LODGE

Roseburg, July 22.—A decorated airplane left Roseburg Thursday morning for the Elks' convention at Salem. On the lower side of the wings "Roseburg" has been painted, "B. P. O. E." on the fuselage and "Roseburg Lodge No. 326" on the tail.

The plane will distribute Roseburg roses and will fly low over the parades scattering flowers. The Elks, almost to a man, drove to Salem.

The plane was piloted by Lieutenant Ayres, and Ralph Gunn, was a passenger.

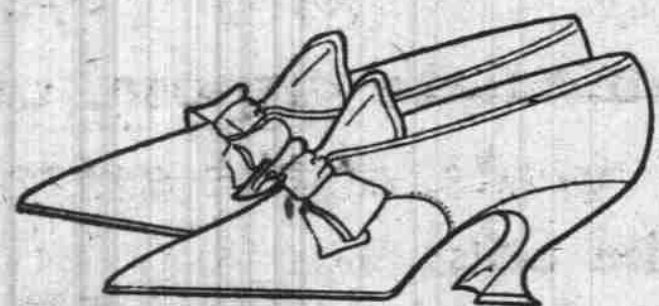

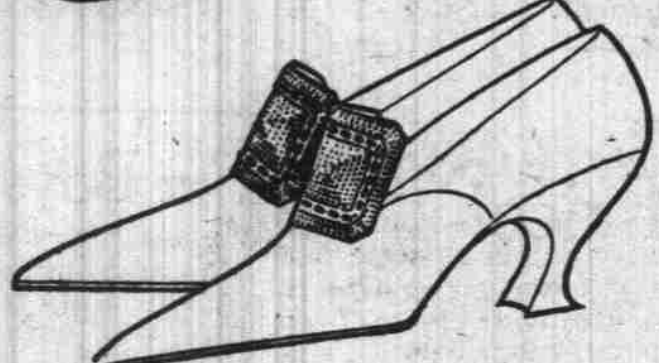

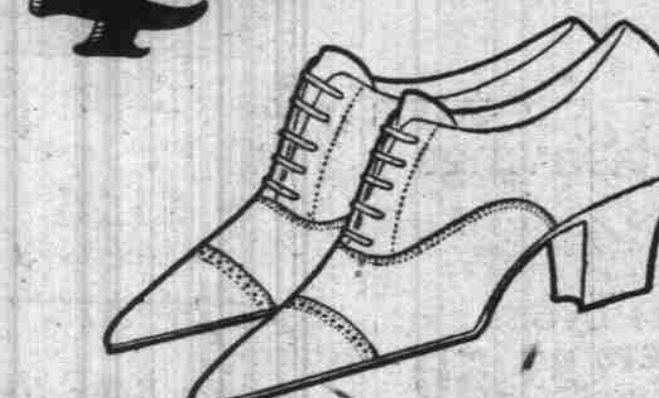
