

STUDY OF TREND OF
CONDITIONS URGED

Oregon City, July 22.—That the indifference of the American people is responsible for the conditions existing in the country today was the statement of Judge George D. Alden, speaking before the Chautauqua audience Thursday night. He pleaded for an educated people, who should strive to study the trend of the times and understand the day's questions, especially with one of the most important presidential elections of years approaching.

The drama, "Kindling," will be the

feature of Friday's program, given by the Maurice Browne players of New York. Among them is Miss Janet Young of Eugene, Or., who, during the past winter, has been playing in the "Little Theatre" in New York city.

Saturday will be a day of big numbers. In the afternoon Dr. Whitfield Ray, fellow of the Royal Geographical society, known to scientific men as the "Livingston of South America," will give a travel lecture on "Through Five Republics on Horseback." The Parnells will give one of the most varied preludes of the season, vocal and instrumental music and impersonations.

Judge Fred G. Bale, champion of the cause of the youth of the country, delivers a lecture on "The Fourth Line of Defense" at the evening program. The forum hour Saturday will be given over to the pioneers of the county, with H. E. Cross, president of the association, presiding. All pioneers of Clackamas county will be admitted free to the grounds and will be the guests at a barbecue at noon.

At 4 o'clock a meeting will be held for the purpose of organizing a county pioneer association. W. C. Hawley, repre-

sentative to congress; George H. Himes, secretary of the Oregon Historical society; H. G. Starkweather, president of the Sons and Daughters of Oregon Pioneers, and Rev. A. J. Joslyn, pioneer minister of Canby, will speak at the forum hour.

During Saturday a straw vote on the presidential nominees will be taken and the results announced at the evening session.

The final day of the demonstration work will be devoted to the following program: Preparing fowls for market, Hazella club; preserving eggs in water-glass, Hazella club; bread making demonstration, Willamette club members.

The championship game of the series will be played Saturday afternoon between the leading teams, Crown-Willamette and Estacada. Crown-Willamette and Woodburn will meet Friday afternoon, West Linn having forfeited the game to the mill men. In a 19 inning game, Estacada defeated Oregon City by a 12 to 8 score Thursday afternoon, giving them three games won and one lost. Crown-Willamette has won three
