

BANK ROBBERY AT STARBUCK IS LAID TO GEORGE C. BOYD

Walla Walla, Wash., July 23.—Charged with having robbed the Bank of Starbuck Saturday, of \$3270, George C. Boyd, 27, of Walla Walla, is being sought by the Washington state authorities and Sheriff Gimmel of Columbia county is preparing to send out broadcast description of the man. He is also wanted by the Colorado authorities for breaking from the Canon City prison in 1918.

The warrant for his arrest was sworn to by Will E. Sprout, president of the Starbuck depository, and specifically charges Boyd with stealing \$3270 in federal reserve bank notes. The money, which Boyd is alleged to have taken, is described in the warrant as being \$1000 in \$50 and \$100 certificates and \$270 in \$5, \$10 and \$20 notes.

The identity of the man was established through the Walla Walla police, who had his picture on file, sent by the Colorado state authorities. Miss Gladys Frothington, M. C. Zimmo and C. H. List, the three bank clerks whom the robber locked in the vault, positively identified it.

The Walla Walla police say that Boyd is one of the many aliases and that he has a mother living here whose name is Mrs. M. Purcell. They say he has relatives living near here who are well to do. Other names by which he is reputed to be known are Uricie Rumbau, D. Purcell and F. C. Smith. He is described as five feet eight inches in height, 150 pounds in weight and of medium build. His hair and eyes are dark and he has a scar on both sides and on the left front of head and on the left side of his chin.
