MARKET ATTACK CAUSES DROP

Bankers Discount Corporation Stock

Up to \$1,000,000

At a meeting of the board of directors of the Bankers' Mortgage Corporation Tuesday it was voted to change the name of the concern to Bankers' Discount Corporation and to increase the capital stock from \$500,000 to \$1,000,000, the increase being absorbed by stockholders in the old corporation.

Assets of the concern, shown in its June statement, totaled \$731,000, increased by new capital and paid in surplus to \$838,000. Officers are: C. J. Smith, president; R. S. Howard, treasurer; F. W. Wiegman, treasurer; R. H. Cochran, assistant secretary.

The outstanding feature of the wool markets of the world as seen by World's Markets, published by R. G. Dun & Co., was the decline at London auctions in the early part of June.

At the opening of the fifth series merinos of the choicest character fell 20 per cent. Average merinos dropped fully 30 per cent. Fine cross breeds dropped 10 to 15 per cent and medium 5 per cent or more. This is all accounted for by the recognition of abundant wool supplies in central markets at the present time. In the United States alone, when the last government report of stocks was issued, fully 700,000,000 pounds of wool were in sight, or virtually a year's supply.

The result of the first day's trading at London was a withdrawal of nearly half the offerings and a consequent drop of the offerings made at Liverpool United States wools from the current clip are not being bought at all liberally and growers are asking banks to finance them until better prices are obtainable. Inasmuch as the financial conditions are adverse the feeling prevails that growers will finally have to meet in some degree the lower tendency manifested at London.

Diffusion of Wealth Shown in New Report

Reports just compiled by the treasury department show a constantly widening diffusion of wealth in this country. On May 4, 1920, the number of deposit accounts in our national banks reached the unprecedented total of 20,380,550, an average of one deposit for every 5 1/2 of our population. This is an increase of 12,689,882, or 165 per cent, in 10 years.

Pennsylvania led all the states with 2,589,687 deposit accounts in her national banks. New York
