

STATE UNIVERSITIES ON THE ROAD OF BIG DEVELOPMENT

New Building Program During
Next Five Years May Reach
Total Expenditure \$1,500,000.

University of Oregon, Eugene, July 24.—Following the passage of the higher education millage bill, and the increase in enrollment which seems certain, many changes are under way at the University of Oregon, not only in the way of new buildings and the enlargement of quarters for the different schools and departments, but in the development of the organization of the university with the addition of new schools and departments and in the new additions made to the faculty. According to the report of President Campbell to the board of regents, construction at the university in the next five years will amount to \$1,500,000.

The new women's building, which when completed will be the largest and most pretentious on the campus, is well under way, and workmen will soon start on the inside work. Practically all the structural work is completed, and the laying of the final roof-boards will be completed in a short time. It is hoped that this building will be ready for occupancy by the opening of school in the fall.

OTHER BUILDING STARTED

Work has been started on the second unit of Hendricks hall, which will face the present women's dormitory, and with the women's building and Johnson hall, form the women's quadrangle. Bids have been let for all the work on this structure, with a view to having it completed as early next fall as possible.

Ground has been broken for one other building, the commerce hall, which will be located where the M. C. A. building once was. The hut has been moved to a spot opposite the Y. W. C. A. bungalow.

A housing company has been formed by Eugene citizens to erect a building for the school of music, and a new men's dormitory. The plan as approved by the board of regents at their last meeting, is to lease the two buildings from the housing company for a period of years, the buildings and the ground on which they stand to become the property of the university at the expiration of the lease.

Just what arrangements will be made to shift the different schools into new buildings and departments into larger quarters have not yet been definitely decided. As soon as the new home of the school of education, the next building upon which work will be started, is completed, the school of education will move from Johnson hall, and the school of journalism will move into the new building. The school of commerce leaves the present commerce hall and moves into the new building being erected, either the school of architecture or the school of journalism will likely occupy the vacated building.

The new women's building will relieve much of the congestion among women's physical education and athletics classes, and at the same time permit class room space for part of the work of the new school of physical education, recently created with Dr. John F. Boyard as dean.

NEW TEACHERS ENGAGED

The corps of teachers who will care for students during the coming year will be the best obtainable, judging from the action of the last meeting of the board of regents. An increase in salaries averaging 25.9 per cent was approved for all members of the faculty, ranging from less than this figure for some members of the staff recently elected to the faculty to somewhat greater than this figure for those who have been here for a number of years and for some, who on account of special ability, were promoted in rank. This means that the university will not permit valuable members of the faculty to leave because of better financial inducements elsewhere, and will be in a position to secure the best possible corps of instructors for the school.

William G. Hale, who has been on the faculty of the school of law of the University of Oregon at the last meeting of the board of regents, Dean Hale will take the place vacated by Dean E. W. Hope, who resigned this year.

Another important addition to the faculty is that of Dr. George Rebec, who will be dean of the graduate school. Dean Rebec will succeed Dr. F. G. Young, who recently resigned. Colin V. Dymont, formerly professor in the school of journalism, will succeed Dean John Straub as dean of the college of literature, science and the arts. Dean Straub recently resigned from this position to devote his time exclusively to the deanship of men.

A total of 24 appointments of professors, instructors and assistants was made at the last meeting of the board of regents of the university, both to fill vacancies, and to fill new positions created by the enlargement of the schools and departments, and the creation of new courses to be offered next year. Careful estimates of the enrollment for next year place the number of regular students considerably above the two thousand mark, and the total for the year may even pass 2500.

Art School Has Large Waiting List

Students intending to enter the art school, in the Art Museum building, and Taylor streets, should make their applications early. Waiting lists in some of the classes are large, so that but few additional students may be received in these classes. Mr. Wentz will be in charge of the advanced painting classes in the morning, as well as the evening life classes and will conduct a composition class, and special work in design. Miss Stephens, whose paintings were exhibited in last year's art exhibitions in Seattle, San Francisco and New York, will have the first year drawing and painting and the advanced children's classes. The design and handicrafts classes will be in charge of Miss Kennedy, and the elementary children's classes. Miss Henrietta H. Felling conducted the art history courses.

The school offers training especially in the general foundation of knowledge of color, form and composition, which must underlie the practical artistic professions, such as illustration, commercial advertising, interior decorating and the like, as well as the fine arts. Students may register at any time.

Hill Military Expects Big Year

Hill Military academy has set September 15 as the date for the opening of its fall semester. Judging by the reservations so far made there will be a record attendance, according to President Joseph A. Hill. The new catalogue is just out and is an attractive book with a cover design and with many interesting action pictures as illustrations. Nearly all of last term's graduates will enter college in the fall. The majority of those who attended last term are planning to return. The training at the academy includes the regular high school course, military drill, discipline, social usages and moral and intellectual training that may be classed under the head of character building. The academy has government equipment and is recognized by the government in having regular inspection by an army officer. There are primary, intermediate and high school departments.

The school is distinctive, being the only one of its kind in this part of the country, and is recognized by business men and educators as a factor for good in the community and a financial asset to the state and the Northwest.

Soldiers Remembered By Pacific University

Forest Grove, July 24.—By way of recognition of the sacrifices made by the boys in the service and the interruption of their school work, Pacific university has decided to offer free college tuition during the year 1919-1920 to all service men. From humble beginnings in 1849 Pacific university has had a long and honored history of educational service in the Northwest. This history is built on the devoted and self-sacrificing labors of patriotic and far-seeing pioneers filled with the missionary impulse. Such names as Tabitha Brown, Dr. Atkinson, Harvey Clark, President March, and a host of others, have determined the character of the college as frankly Christian and thoroughly democratic. Not only have these persons figured largely in our history, but they have also left an inheritance that guarantees the continuance of their high ideals in the future development of the school.

Improvements Under Way at Philomath

Philomath, July 24.—Philomath college, founded in 1885, is looking forward to a successful new year, with increased enrollment and additional facilities for getting results. President L. L. Epley announces that Miss E. Ferne Richards, Ph. B. of Whittier, Cal., elected to the chair of philosophy, has accepted the place. The chair of music will soon be filled.

Improvements are being made on the campus, and among new equipment to be installed are included new furnaces in the main building. Special attention is also being given to refitting and furnishing the gymnasium. Ladies Aid societies of Oregon, California and the Columbia River and Montana conferences of the United Brethren church, co-operating in this work.

Behnke-Walker Is Of Sure Growth

Under the direction of I. M. Walker, who started his career as president of the Behnke-Walker business college, when it had only half a dozen students, the college has been brought to an enviable position. Today the college has more students than any other similar institution on the Pacific coast and it is one of the few accredited by the National Association of Commerce Schools of America. In the Behnke-Walker business college, Portland can claim the largest commercial school in the Northwest and the one whose students have won more gold medals in typewriter contests than any other college in America. Students may enroll at any time.

East Side Commercial
The East Side Commercial school, conducted by Miss Regina Buckel, is a day school for young women, with night classes for men and women. Increased attendance is expected for the new year.

College Opens September 7
Christian Brothers college, which previous to 1908 was known as St. Michaels college, will open for the new term September 7, with matriculation September 1.

ALBANY COLLEGE TO OPEN YEAR SEPTEMBER 21

Reservations Indicate Freshmen
Class Will Include Number of
High School Honor Students.

Albany, July 24.—Albany college's 1920-1921 term will open September 21. In July the president's office files indicate that the new freshman class will include a number of honor pupils from among the high schools of Oregon. More ex-service men who left school in 1917 are coming back next September.

The department of Bible and religious education has been definitely created by the board of trustees and President M. Williams placed in charge. For many years one semester's work in Bible has been required each year. In addition, elective short courses will be offered in Sunday school management, religious pedagogy and the leadership of mission study. Practice as well as theory will be regarded and credit given for assigned work in religious leadership when that work is done under supervision of the department. Other members of the faculty will assist the president in this department.

Courses in accountancy and business administration, even last year, will be continued next year, and extended—by John J. McKnight, C. P. A. Commercial law will be taught as last year, by Attorney Carlton E. Sox, A. B., A. M. The work of Professors McKnight and Sox is of college grade. Next year short courses in bookkeeping, stenography and typewriting will be offered to students of at least two years' high school standing.

New Teachers at McMinnville College

McMinnville, July 24.—The field secretary of McMinnville college reports the prospects for new students as being good. Professor L. S. Shumaker, who has been elected to the chair of philosophy and education, is coming special studies at the University of Iowa this summer. He expects to reach McMinnville about September 1. Dr. Myron W. Haynes, leader in the successful endowment campaign from 1914 to 1916, will again enter upon an extensive campaign for the institution in the fall. He has already reached McMinnville and has purchased a home here which he will occupy with his family after a few weeks' vacation at Newport. Funds are available for new buildings on the campus.

Day and Night Courses at 'Y. W.'

Both day and night classes in shorthand, typewriting, bookkeeping and kindred subjects are conducted by the Young Women's Christian association at its Broadway home. Competent instructors are in charge and offer a course that will equip the student for general office work.

Normal Students Salem Visitors

Monmouth, Or., July 24.—An enthusiastic crowd of 150 students from the Oregon Normal school visited the various state institutions in Salem on Saturday. A special train was run from Monmouth to Salem and return to accommodate the students.

Miss Catlin's School
Miss Catlin's school for boarding and day pupils, on Western terrace, prepares girls for Eastern as well as for Western colleges. Instruction is included in primary, intermediate and high school departments.

Links Opens September 1
Link's business college, specializing in bookkeeping and stenography, will open the September term on September 1. Enrollment is now being made for the fall term.

Bible University Opens on Sept. 21

Eugene, July 24.—The Eugene Bible university, the new season to start on September 21, consists of the school of liberal arts, with two courses of study; the Bible college, with three courses of study; the college of fine arts, which includes the school of elocution and oratory and school of music, the Girls' Junior college and Seattle Bible college.

New building plans for the Eugene Bible university include a modern gymnasium and music building. Other plans are under way for increasing the dormitory accommodations for women and improving the tennis courts.

Canuto S. Udasco of the Philippine islands, a graduate of Union Theological seminary at Manila, comes to the faculty to lead in the promotion of work among the Philippine. Miss Hattie Mitchell will become instructor in Christian missions to succeed Kenneth C. Hendricks, who goes to the College of Missions in preparation for work in China. Mrs. Victoria Cave Byerlee, for several years head of the department of vocal music, sails in August with her husband as a missionary to Africa and her place in the university will be filled by the opening of the school year.

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NEW COURSE TO BE OFFERED AT TEACHERS' SCHOOL

Oregon Normal at Monmouth Has
Outlook for Prosperous New
Term Beginning Sept. 30.

September 30, the Oregon Normal school, "Oregon's School for Oregon's Teachers," will open its doors for the work of another school year. Its enrollment during the last year exceeded that of the preceding year by 36 per cent, and the enrollment for the ensuing year promises to exceed that of last year. The school is maintained by the state for the sole purpose of training teachers for the elementary schools of the state. The Oregon Normal school is located in the pretty little town of Monmouth, situated in the foothills of the coast range, 70 miles south of Portland and 15 miles southwest of Salem, on the Southern Pacific railroad.

The city has recently completed a gravity water system by which water is brought from Teal creek, a mountain stream, 12 miles from Monmouth, which furnishes the school with plenty of pure water. The school has a beautiful campus studded with trees and shrubs which afford ample opportunity for recreation. The normal is fortunate in having all the elementary children of Monmouth and Independence for training school purposes, which makes its facilities for practice teaching second to no normal school on the coast. It is also fortunate in having several rural schools for practice in fitting students for rural school positions.

The girls' dormitory accommodates 125 girls and is up to date in every respect.

The school's curriculum extends two years above the high school, thus making it a standard normal school; hence its diplomas are recognized in every state in the Union that recognizes the diplomas from its own standard normal schools.

The following courses are offered, the

completion of which allows the graduates to teach, without examination, in any elementary school of the state: Physical training, primary, advanced, rural, music, drawing, household economy and commercial. If the special courses in music, drawing, physical education, household economy, or commercial are completed, the graduates of such courses are certificated to teach such special courses in high school. The commercial course will be offered in September for the first time.

Law Course to Be Given Locally

The Northwestern College of Law will start its fall term on Wednesday, September 15, in the rooms on the seventh floor of the Multnomah county courthouse. This school, which is a continuation of the Portland law department of the University of Oregon, offers courses in law to classes meeting on week nights from 7 to 9 o'clock for a three year period, leading to the degree of bachelor in laws.

The school with its predecessors has been in operation since 1884, and from 1885 to 1919 was operated under the direction of the late Judge C. U. Gantenbein. The present dean is J. Hunt Hendrickson of the Oregon bar, and a Harvard graduate who has had 10 years' experience in active practice and in legal instruction at the law school and at Reed college. The faculty is comprised of leading members from the Oregon bench and bar, and an effort is made to afford specialized instruction within the three year period.

Allen 'Prep' School Opens on Sept. 7

The Allen Preparatory school for boys and girls will open in Portland September 7. The school is designed to furnish the best advantages for earnest students preparing for college. It is also intended for those who do not wish to fit for college, but who desire a thorough course of study and advanced work in special branches. Its aim is to teach pupils how to study, to help them to gain a mastery over self, and to develop character.

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High standards of scholarship are made possible by a capable faculty, modern equipment in the way of laboratories and museums, and a splendid library of nearly 100,000 volumes.

Intercollegiate athletics are encouraged, but under careful restraint. "Athletics for everybody" is the ideal toward which the University is working. The health of all students is given expert attention, and an infirmary is open to all.

The life of the students at "Oregon" is wholesome and studious, and the cost of living is very low. A wide variety of student activities gives ample opportunity for the expression of individuality.

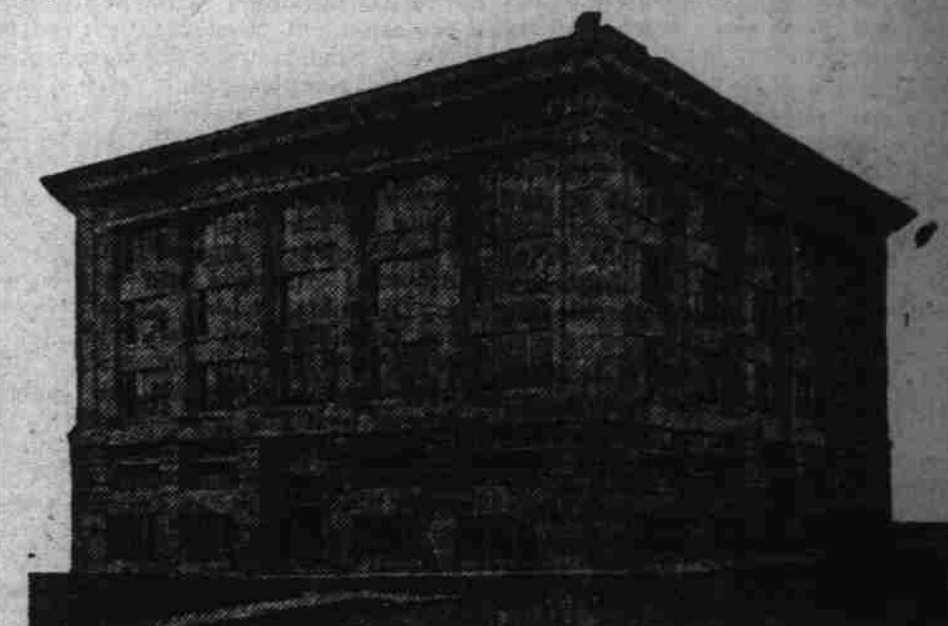
With a confidence born of the expression of public support given by the people of the state at the election in May, the University is now entering upon a new era of development and usefulness.
