

LIBERTY'S FLAME SPREADING, SAYS TURKISH LEADER

England's Alleged Aim to Reduce Turks to Serfs Decried; Communists Said to Be Gaining.

Berlin, July 24.—I have just received a remarkable letter from Enver Pasha, the former Turkish war minister, who has not hitherto been directly heard from since he left Germany in an airplane early last April for Moscow, whence after important conferences with the soviet leaders, he returned to Turkey to take a directing hand in the nationalist campaign against the entente.

The letter from the famous Ottoman chief, who is today one of the most powerful and energetic figures in the Orient, is dated merely July. The text follows:

MESSAGE NOT DELIVERED "Dear von Wiegand: I have only just learned that you sent a wireless message to me at Moscow. It did not reach me, for reasons which I cannot tell you in a letter.

"I should have any regrets that you did not accept my invitation to accompany me on my flight across the border states to Russia. I will say that you were fortunate that circumstances prevented your coming along.

PEACE IN EUROPE DELAYED BY RUSSO-POLISH CONFLICT

Paris, July 24.—Peace in Europe will be retarded at least one year by the Russo-Polish conflict, even if the allied statesmen should succeed in keeping the great powers from being involved in military operations on a large scale. Such is the consensus in diplomatic circles in Paris. It can be further stated that American help, urgently desired by official quarters here and in London as possibly the only chance to prevent the Russo-Polish conflict from erupting into a general European war, is being withheld from wholesale bloodshed.

Should America officially declare a ban on trade with Russia until after the soviets have concluded peace with Poland, it is believed by Moscow government would desert from its apparent present resolve to settle Polish imperialism once and for all time by dilating armistice and peace terms in Warsaw.

Americans here, however, realize that such a measure on the part of the Washington government would automatically make America a partner in the blockade of Russia and thus hopelessly entangle her in a conflict with the Anglo-Russian negotiations for the resumption of trade, or other moves of that sort would not only be altogether inadequate, but would only be apt to add fuel to the smoldering fire and be sure to intensify the danger to world peace, observers here agree.

The choice of Ambassador Jusserand as a member of the French mission to Poland is interpreted as emphasizing the desire of the allied statesmen to influence America's course in the present international situation.

In this connection it is rumored that M. Jusserand will not return to his embassy in Washington, at least not so long as President Wilson is in the White House.

It was confirmed that General Weygand and Marshal Foch, chief of staff, will take care of the Polish army's reorganization immediately on his arrival in Warsaw. He will completely overhaul the Polish general staff in accordance with Marshal Foch's plan.

RUSSIAN COMMANDER TO FIX PLACE OF MEETING

London, July 24.—(U. P.)—The place and date of the armistice negotiations between the Russian soviet government and the Polish government will be fixed by the Red commander on the Polish front, a Moscow wireless message tonight said.

The message was sent to the Polish cabinet in Warsaw by the Red army headquarters in Moscow. It said the Polish representatives would be notified of the armistice arrangements as soon as the Russian commander had arrived at a decision and the Polish delegate formally invited to attend.

The allies will make no further move against the Bolsheviks, and will extend military and financial aid to the Bolshevik factions aside from relief in the form of food and clothing, it was stated on good authority here.

SOVIET PROMISES NOT TO INVADE GERMAN TERRITORY

Berlin, July 24.—(U. P.)—The Russian soviet government has telegraphed the German government, announcing that Russian troops will not invade German territory, it was learned tonight.

The Moscow wireless message came after the German government had protested to Victor Kopp, the Russian Bolshevik representative, regarding the approach of Red troops toward the Rostov German border. Some Russian forces operating against the Poles were reported to have advanced to within 10 miles of Germany's frontier.

TRAIN HITS TRUCK; ONE DEAD, ONE HURT

George Bowman Dies of Injuries Received at Woodburn; Miss Mary McGrew Injured.

Woodburn, July 24.—George Bowman of Sheridan, driver of a truck for the Graves cannery, was killed and Mary McGrew seriously injured Saturday evening when the truck was struck by a Southern Pacific train at Hardcastle avenue crossing.

The accident occurred at 7 o'clock. McGrew died a few minutes after the accident and Miss McGrew is unconscious, suffering from a fractured skull and other injuries. The truck was carried 160 yards. Bowman was thrown out. The view of the track is unobscured at the corner where the accident occurred.

Injunction Resorted to. Des Moines, Iowa, July 24.—(U. P.)—Prevented from visiting his wife by a temporary injunction, Ray Fates today secured a court order enjoining Ed Anthony, alleged wooer of his wife, from visiting her. Fates' injunction is believed to be the first of its kind ever granted.

POLICE HUNT FOR MAN IN TRUNK MURDER MYSTERY

New York, July 24.—A general search has been instituted for a South American whose name has been given to the police as A. J. Fernandez in connection with the discovery Friday at the warehouse of the American Express company in this city of a trunk containing the mutilated body of a young woman.

Fernandez is said to have used the aliases of O. J. Wood and E. LeRoy, and is believed to have been the man who shipped the trunk to this city from Detroit. This information is based on the evidence supplied today by Andrew J. Branic, an expressman of this city.

The brain of the trunk victim which was removed for examination by the chief medical examiner was examined today at the pathological department of Bellevue hospital. The analysis failed to reveal any indication of the cause of death.

MYSTERY TRUNK BACK IN DETROIT FOR IDENTIFICATION

Detroit, Mich., July 24.—The mystery trunk, which was found in New York

Friday, containing the body of a young woman, and which was shipped to that city from Detroit, arrived here late today. With it was sent the clothing and other articles which were found wrapped about the body.

Detectives at the Detroit homicide squad immediately interviewed Mrs. Lottie Brooks, landlady of the apartment at 109 Harper avenue, the address given by "A. A. Tatum," who shipped the trunk to New York. It is the same address also of "Mr. and Mrs. LeRoy," who disappeared under strange circumstances about the time the trunk was shipped.

Mrs. Brooks said the little black hat with black trimmings looked like the hat Mrs. LeRoy wore, and a blanket with blue stripes was of the same quality and color. One she missed but was faded considerably. She could not positively identify any of the clothing or laundry.

The trunk, Mrs. Brooks said, resembled the trunk shipped away by LeRoy. "I am not sure about any of the things at home," she said, "and I were such a loving, happy couple it is hard to believe the dead woman is Mrs. LeRoy."
