

THREE MILITARY MOVEMENTS UNDER WAY IN IRELAND

Strong British Reinforcements Arrive and Belfast Streets Are Now Veritable Armed Camp.

Belfast, July 24.—(U. P.)—Three distinct military movements were under way throughout the north of Ireland tonight, with sporadic outbreaks of factional fighting occurring at many places. The casualty list in Belfast stood at 18 dead and more than 350 wounded. It was believed each faction had also buried a number of their own dead secretly.

Sinn Feiners' headquarters issued an appeal for volunteers and notified all nationalists to be prepared to defend themselves against an expected military attack by unionists. In the meantime the Orangemen were marshaling all available forces in Belfast and vicinity, and many secret meetings were held. Strong British reinforcements have arrived and all manner of war vehicles were stationed in Belfast streets.

ALL SEARCH FOR ARMS

Harmed wire entanglements were placed on all main arteries of transportation and all persons entering or leaving the city were closely questioned and searched for arms. Patrolling of streets was taken over from the police by the military, owing to the intense bitterness between the police and the Sinn Feiners who attacked their comrades.

There was considerable rioting here during the early part of today, but authorities had the situation well in hand tonight. The most serious outbreak today was reported from Cork, where a motor truckload of police set fire to houses at Kilmallock, a short way from Limerick.

AMBULANCES STONED

In several instances police charged the Sinn Feiners had stoned ambulances bearing wounded as they passed through the streets of the city. Storekeepers closed their shops and refused to continue business in districts where the fighting occurred. Hospitals were crowded to capacity with wounded of both sides.

Many saloons and shops were looted at the height of the rioting, and the mobs set fire to the places after taking everything of value. Scores of buildings were burned to the ground. There was considerable hand-to-hand fighting, but the troops were not instructed to interfere with shooting started.

IRELAND MUST REMAIN.

Lloyd George Says U. P. Great Britain will not permit Ireland to secede from the empire, nor will it permit coercion of Ireland by south Irish factions.

London, July 24.—(U. P.)—Great Britain will not permit Ireland to secede from the empire, nor will it permit coercion of Ireland by south Irish factions, Premier Lloyd George told J. H. Thomas, labor leader, who headed a delegation of trade unionists, which called on the premier today and demanded removal of troops from Ireland under threats of laying down their tools.

"I am very sure things are going to happen on the other side and conditions will become very much worse," the premier said. "We cannot allow the present state of affairs to continue. Therefore, whatever anybody intends to propose to bring about peace let him do so quickly."

Lloyd George declared his willingness to discuss the Irish problem with sons of Kierie truly representative of the Irish people.

Reports at the war office here tonight said grave rioting had again broken out in Belfast. Snipers fired on crowds from trees and house tops. Many looters were arrested. Hundreds of refugees were reported fleeing to County Tyrone.

Troops were reported en route to Drogheda, 20 miles southwest of Belfast, following rioting there in which the Catholic club was burned and the parochial hall wrecked. Wesley Mitchell was killed when police fired into a mob.

Thirty were reported wounded in a skirmish here last night between a crowd of citizens and a detachment of soldiers. The soldiers turned machine guns on the crowd.

Lane County Reports 10,777 School "Kids"

Eugene, July 24.—The annual report of the schools of Lane county shows that in the 200 districts there are 10,777 children of school age and 507 completed the eighth grade during the year. Teachers number 419, with 212 school houses in operation. The average salary for teachers in schools of one room was \$21 a month; those in schools with two rooms \$25 a month. The average salary for principals was \$110 a month. About 50 per cent of the teachers are graduates of some college or university and 50 per cent have had two or more years of school experience.

LICENSE PROPOSED FOR HOMES THAT BOARD CHILDREN

Startling Disclosures at Trial of Mrs. Mathus Result in Drafting of New City Ordinance.

As a result of the shocking disclosures of ill treatment and neglect of children made in the trial of Mrs. E. F. Mathus in municipal court last week, City Attorney W. P. La Roche, at the suggestion of Portland women interested in child welfare work, is preparing an ordinance for the licensing of homes that board children.

Under the proposed ordinance, members of the Child Welfare commission or their agents, acting in ex-officio capacity, would be named to investigate applicants for license to care for children and to approve of the conditions found before a permit was granted.

The child welfare committee would be named for this because it has the fairest and most complete investigation better than any other agency in the city.

COMMISSION WORK LIMITED

The state law governing the work of the commission does not permit it to function unless the children for whom aid is sought are either declared dependent or delinquent in the courts. There are many children being boarded in Portland not dependent upon the public for support. Usually these are cases where one parent is dead and the other works to support the offspring. Such were the children who were boarded by the Mathus woman.

Because of their equipment and willingness to serve, the welfare commission is being named in this ordinance as a municipal organization to carry on the work. Ultimately it is hoped to have the state law enlarged to embrace supervision of all children who are away from their parents, regardless of the condition of dependency.

It is planned that the examiners of these homes shall pass upon ability of the caretaker, the cleanliness and equipment of the home, food provided and sleeping arrangements. References will probably be asked of applicants for licenses. The city's agents will endeavor to make the same anxious inquiry in these cases that the parent would make, should he or she have the time to do it.

CHOICE SOMETIMES HASTY

Too often, it is pointed out, the parent, battling with the problems of family existence, makes hasty choice of the foster mother, leaving the helpless children to the mercies of people about whom little is known.

WILSON'S OFFER IN TESCHEN CASE IS NOT ACCEPTED

Ambassadors Decline Proposal For Commission to Handle Dispute of Poles and Czechs.

Paris, July 24.—(U. P.)—A note has been sent to Washington declining President Wilson's proposal to the council of ambassadors that an international commission be appointed to adjust the Teschen boundary dispute between Poland and Czechoslovakia, the French foreign office told the United Press tonight.

The president's note was submitted to the ambassadors Friday, the foreign office said. The allied reply pointed out the question was being settled by methods already approved by both Poland and Czechoslovakia, and explained the difficulty of shifting the negotiations for a plan which would necessitate a completely new start.

COMES AS SURPRISE

News of the president's communication, delivered to the council by Hugh Wallack, the American ambassador first became known today. It caused surprise because it was generally taken at what they considered their face value statements that America for the present would take no part in European affairs.

It was admitted in official circles the president's apparent eleventh hour entrance in European difficulties had complicated the situation and placed the council of ambassadors in something of a quandary.

The council took the position that, although it wished to give the utmost deference to the president's wishes, it could not reopen the entire Teschen question.

The report of the council's geographical and political experts, hearing on the Teschen squabble, was practically ready for submission.

Both the Poles and the Czechoslovakia, it was stated, had agreed to abide by the ambassador's decision.

WILSON'S ENEMIES BURY

Anti-Wilson circles seized upon what they termed the president's renewed intervention in European affairs to accuse him of repeating his tactics in the Plume controversy between Italy and Jugoslavia.

The situation was further complicated today by a note from Germany requesting permission to send troops from the Teschen district to protect property belonging to German citizens which, the note said, had been endangered by disorders growing out of the crisis in Poland brought about by her defeat by the Russian Red forces.
