

HARDINGS AT HOME ARE FASCINATING TO CORRESPONDENTS

G.O.P. Nominee and Wife Kindly, Neighborly Folk, Says David Lawrence of Marion, O., Visit.

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Marion, Ohio, July 24.—It's from the home folks and neighbors that one learns of the true character and personality of a candidate for the presidency. And after spending a week in Marion mingling with the folks who have known Warren G. Harding all their lives, those who call him "Warren" and his wife "Florence" without the slightest exaggeration of their familiarity with both, the visiting correspondent encountered reminiscences on every side of the struggle of the Hardings, for in a small town most everybody knows all about most everybody else's trials and tribulations.

The home folks talk frankly and sincerely and with honesty in their eyes that convinces the inquirer they would have made the same comment even if their most distinguished citizen were not a candidate for the highest office in the land.

EARLY MARRIAGE UNHAPPY

The story really starts with the unhappy marriage of Florence Kling to Peter Dewolf, a railroad employee, whose errand ways made life miserable for Mrs. Dewolf. It was one of those youthful marriages which never would have occurred in later years. She bore the yoke for many years, but finally the dominating personality of old Amos Kling, her father, persuaded her to obtain a divorce. The aged Mr. Kling is still spoken of as a self-made man who made a big business success and who felt that his daughter was worthy of a better husband. And so did everybody else who recognized in Mrs. Dewolf a woman of extraordinary talents and amiable qualities. When the separation came, the elder Kling was inclined to draw his daughter to his side and persuade her to enjoy the fruits of his wealth, either in extended travel or in an exalted social position. But Mrs. Dewolf fell in love with Warren Harding. He was then a poor young man struggling for a foothold, but the elder Kling would listen to the idea of a marriage between his daughter and Warren Harding. He had higher aspirations and ambitions for her. But his daughter shunned the opportunities which her father seemed to see before her and married Warren Harding. Old Amos Kling did not think young Harding would make good in the world, but Florence Harding thought otherwise. She set to work beside her husband with an earnestness and determination which was unusual for a woman of her position and luxuries which her father might have given her, she took her place beside her husband in the tiny newspaper office, and while he devoted himself to the editorial side she managed the circulation department. She hired the newsboys and kept them on the job all the time. To this day there are bankers and real estate and professional men who owe their first knowledge of salesmanship to the instructions given them as newsboys by Florence Harding. Indeed, there has been organized here a sort of Florence Harding Alumni association, the members being the same newsboys who, in their youth, sold the Marion Star for the Hardings.

WILL NOT RECONCILED

Steadily the Harding couple forged ahead, but still the elder Kling was not reconciled to the choice of his daughter. He lived to see Warren Harding elected lieutenant governor of Ohio and the United States senator and did become reconciled to the marriage. For Warren Harding had "made good" after all, and many a man and woman who remember old Amos Kling wishes he were alive today to see Warren Harding Republican candidate for the presidency and with a good chance to be the chief executive of the nation. The character of the senator and Mrs. Harding is such that nowhere in the town is the slightest mention of a grievance.

The Hardings are known as generous and kindly people whose success has not gone to their heads, whose hearts are with their friends and neighbors and whose lives have been a heroic struggle against odds of every kind, but who in the typical American fashion have ironed out and stand unimpeachable before their neighbors and their friends—the best testimony that can be offered to public life, more persuasive than the blarney of orators, politicians or the blarney of party associates.

GOVERNMENT AID IN REHABILITATION WORK ACCEPTED

Governor Issues Proclamation to Put State Machinery to Task of Helping Injured Workmen.

Salem, July 24.—The provisions of the federal act for the promotion of vocational rehabilitation of injured workmen in cooperation with the various states, is accepted in behalf of Oregon in a proclamation issued by Governor Olcott Saturday.

The governor's proclamation: Empowers and directs the state board of vocational rehabilitation to cooperate with the federal board in the administration of the provisions of the act as provided in the federal act.

Recommends that a plan of cooperation in carrying out the provisions of the federal act be formulated between the state industrial accident commission and the state board of vocational education.

Authorizes the state board of vocational education, in cooperation with the state industrial accident commission, to use state funds or other funds available for vocational rehabilitation in matching federal funds available from the federal act to the state of Oregon.

Appoints the state treasurer as clerk of the board of vocational rehabilitation and directs their disbursement in conformity with the provisions of the state law.

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WORK FINISHED ON PACKING PLANT OF PRUNE COMPANY

Building Is Ready for Installation of Machinery; Pool Includes Sixty Per Cent of Entire Crop.

Vancouver, Wash., July 24.—The prune packing plant of the Washington Growers' corporation was completed Saturday except for installation of machinery, according to a statement made by M. J. Newhouse, manager of the corporation.

The corporation pool was closed the first of last week, following the entrance of at least 60 per cent of the bearing and non-bearing acreage of the county into the association. It is estimated that about 1800 acres of bearing prunes and 800 acres of young trees, to bear within two years, have been signed up by the corporation from the entire 4000 acres of orchards in the county.

SALES ARE DELAYED

Little action is being taken at the present time concerning the selling of the fruit, on account of the unsteady condition of the market. Little buying is being done by the independent packers and it is believed that the individual packers are waiting for the associated growers of the coast to sell.

The California association is expected to state its price during the first week in August, after which the Washington and Oregon associations will sell. The fact that last year's crop has been well cleaned up indicates that there is no need for alarm on the part of the growers concerning this year's market. Newhouse said.

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HARDING REFUSES TO ACT BEFORE RELEASE OF DEBS' CASE

Cannot Express Opinion in Case of Socialist Candidate, G.O.P. Nominee Wires Christensen.

Marion, Ohio, July 24.—(U. P.)—Warren G. Harding declined tonight to take any action in securing release of Eugene V. Debs, Socialist party presidential nominee, now confined in the federal prison at Atlanta, Ga., convicted under the espionage act during the war.

In refusing to take any hand in the Debs case, Harding, wired Parley P. Christensen, Farmer-Labor presidential nominee, that he believes in freedom of speech and press within limitations which would guarantee liberty and in general amnesty of political prisoners, but could not vote for a candidate in the specific case of the Socialist candidate.

Christensen wired both Harding and Cox this week asking their aid in securing release of their Socialist opponent. Harding's reply follows:

"I have your telegram relating to the release from prison of Eugene V. Debs. I believe as heartily as you do in freedom of thought and speech and press, within the limitations which guarantee our liberty, and I can well believe we differ little about the abuses of that freedom when the republic is in peril. I believe in general amnesty of political prisoners, but this broad policy does not justify a hasty disposition of any case before it is considered on its merits. It is for me now to review a particular case and it is impossible to utter an opinion without review."

WAR SUPPLIES TO POLAND

Salt Lake, July 24.—Charging secret sale by the United States government of vast quantities of supplies to Poland for its use in the war, the return for long-term Polish notes, and perceiving the possibility of American entanglement in a bloody Eastern European war, Senator Harding tonight asked him to exert his power to compel the administration to reveal the full extent of its financial relations with Poland, and to withhold export of moral support of the Polish position until it agrees to remain within proper boundaries.

The telegram, in part, follows: "Your statement of March 1920, to Bruce Bliven of the New York Globe, that 'it is no business of our what form of government the Russian people choose' and that 'the allies in invading that unhappy country, is one of the most serious blunders that the present generation has ever committed'—encourages me to suggest that you employ your current power of the public position to acquaint the country with the immense quantities of supplies furnished to Poland for its use in the war, and to expose the details of the financial relations of its delivery of huge war stores to the Polish armies on long-term 5 per cent notes."

"If you are not, I can inform you that in the last 12 or 15 months the war department has provided the armaments for the Polish army, an offensive war against Russia on 3,500,000 pounds of food, 5,000,000 pounds of clothing, 5,000,000 pounds of miscellaneous military equipment, including 1500 motor trucks, 1000 tanks, 1000 airplanes, 1000 military engineering equipment, 1000 camp kitchens, trench tools, saddles, harness, forges, repair shops, observation balloons, and all without restriction as to the purposes for which they were to be used. The navy department has likewise delivered to Poland large quantities of naval supplies, including the Polish attack on Russia, without the payment of a cent, accepting in exchange long-term Russian government 5 per cent notes."

"The Polish war on Russia was inaugurated, encouraged and supported by French and British imperialism for their own selfish ends. In view of the Polish suit for peace, Britain and France have the alternative of accepting the obvious fact of Russian ability to defend her borders and repel invading armies, or of equipping large expeditionary forces to continue the Russian war against Poland. The Russian invasion of Poland is a direct result of the Russian government, this republic, involved as it already is and more deeply involved as the administration intends it to be in the fate of the Polish imperialist adventure, must needs face the question of transporting an American army to be slaughtered in a merciless and insane Eastern European conflict."

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ASTORIA EXPECTS GREAT THROG AT LEGION CONCLAVE

Great Preparations Are Made for Entertainment of Hundreds From All Parts of Oregon.

Astoria, July 24.—With the arrival of State Commander William B. Follett by airplane from Portland Friday, and the establishment Saturday of state headquarters, arrangements began in earnest for the second annual convention of the American Legion for the department of Oregon, dates for which have been fixed for July 30 and 31 and August 1.

The Astoria will be the mecca for Legionnaires from all parts of the state the last of next week is evident from reports received from various posts throughout Oregon. In addition to the hundreds of delegates and other American Legion members who will attend the convention, the visitors to this city next week will be increased by the 1200 officers and men of the fleet which will drop anchor in the harbor Wednesday, to remain here during the convention.

The cruiser Birmingham and the destroyer John Francis Burns, Fuller, Percival, Somers, Twigs and Habbitt will compose the detachment, in command of Captain L. R. Sargent of the Birmingham.
