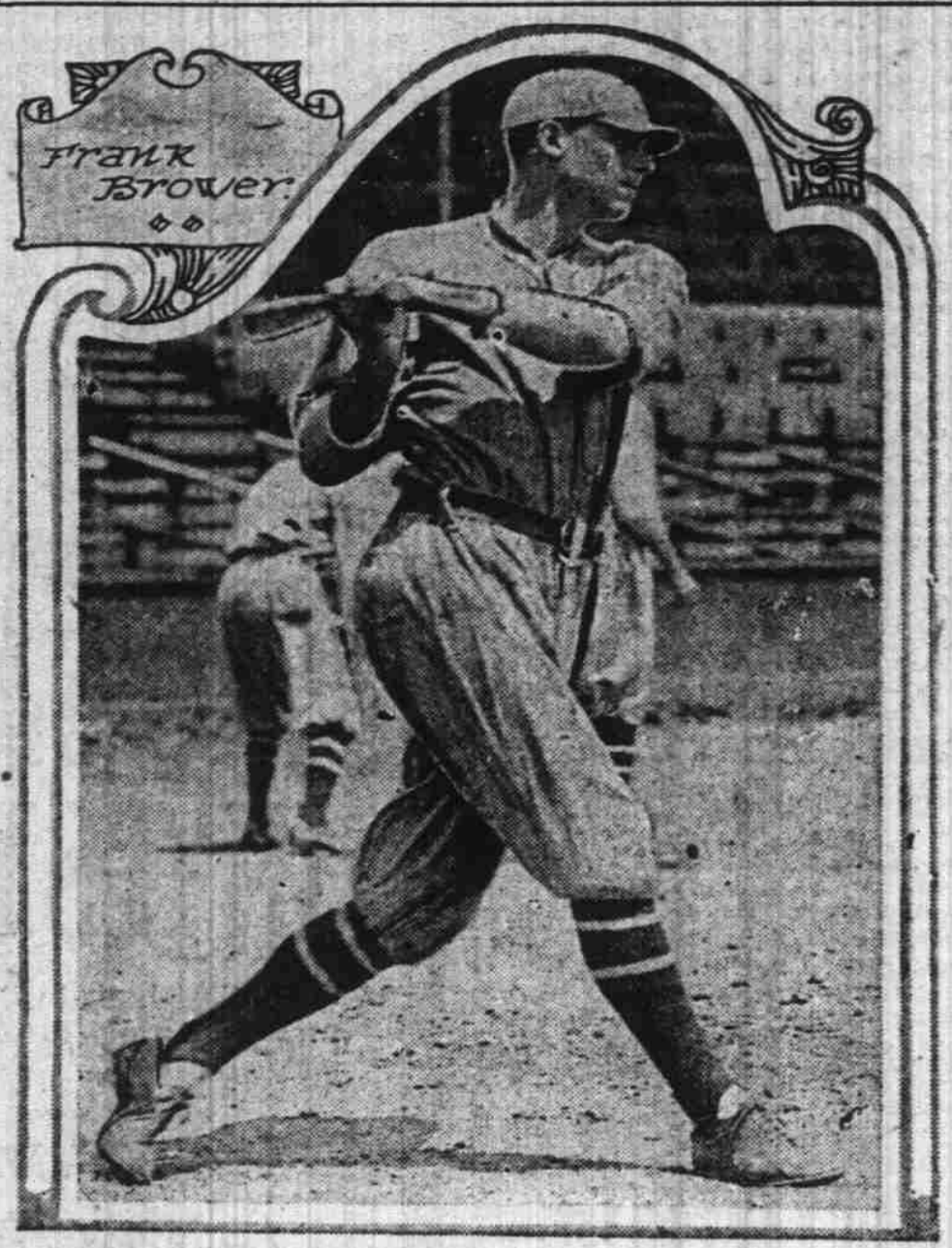

FRANK BROWER, first baseman of the Reading, Pa., International league team, is heralded as the "Babe Ruth of the Minor Leagues." His title comes from the fact that he has cracked out more than 20 home runs and he is leading the league in batting, with an average well over the 400 mark. Early in his career he was with the Philadelphia and St. Louis Nationals, but he was sent to the minors for more seasoning. It is said that no less than nine big league clubs are angling for Brower at present. He is 25 years of age, six feet two and a half inches tall and weighs around 185 pounds. He throws right-handed and bats left. Besides being a first baseman, Brower has a reputation of being a good pitcher.

MEREDITH PREDICTS GREAT THINGS FOR OLYMPIC TEAM

New York, July 26.—The United States might send a better team to the Olympic games, but it could not have been a much better aggregation than the one that sailed from the past 3-5 scores. The caliber of athletes is as good as this country has ever turned out.

We will never see better sprinters than Ralph Trainor and Doc Lippincott, both in the collection of speedsters we have going over this year with Paddock, Murchison and Scholz. It is generally believed that these three men will bring back the same amount of prizes that the men of 1912 returned.

If the events are carried through the same as the sprint it will be seen that the team of 1912 showed a better crew leaving this country than the ones this year. Take in the quarter mile with Reidpath, who had shown 45 seconds in the trial before the team sailed, and Hap Haff, who finished second to him, this year has not turned out anything as good as that performance. However, Speedy does in the past 3-5 scores and is a much better quarter-mile than Reidpath on paper.

That will be the same in every event. The men of 1912 were better than the men of 1912. In 1912 we had Kiviat of New York, that had turned in a record for this race, and against him we had John Paul Jones, the inter-collegiate winner and record holder, besides Normy Taylor, who later brought the world's record in the mile, but in Joe Ray, who goes over this year as the star, we have a man that is more consistent than these three runners and is sure to return a better record in the mile.

This event that this country can depend upon to turn in a record performance, however, the weight events are as well as well off as ever and have the giant N. Y. A. C. men to hold that end of the game. In the pole vault and high jump we have never been as well off, having the trials and three that have done as well as the event which was won in 1912.

Look for this team to return a much better win than the team of 1912, but they will not have an easy job of it. The teams of the other countries are in the line to play the men that they have trained since 1912. The men shown how the events should have been run.

NEW YORK, July 26.—I believe the crack has come in the Cleveland pitching. It certainly looked that way when the Yankees got close to their hurriers with their bats. The fusillade of hits launched at the team which has been leading the league nearly all season was as fierce a barrage as we have shot at any club in the league. The weak clubs, as a matter of fact, have often fared better against us.

We expected to have considerable trouble with Stanley Coveleskie, but it now appears he has been worked to death in the drive for the top that the Indians have been through. Working day after day will get any hurler, no matter who he is. Coveleskie is paying the price of hard and steady work. We plastered him so hard that he was taken from the box in his first start.

When the Yankees went west recently the Indians managed to take us over the hurdles with about as much of a hurrah as we gave them here today. A lot of fans threw up their hands and said it was all over but the shouting. They forgot that the Yankee pitching staff is a good one and that it was suffering from a slump at that particular time. That was the answer of the merciful drubbing we got there. Our pitchers are in better form now and we were able to descend on the weak Cleveland pitchers with enough vigor to show them up.

Jim Bagby is a vastly over rated pitcher. Elmer Myers is not doing the work that he once was capable of. Guy Morton, they tell me, has come back, but if he has we couldn't notice it in New York. Ray Caldwell is through as a big league pitcher, sure. Just watch this and see if I am not right. Stanley Coveleskie would be a star with any club. But, as I have often said, he can't do it all.

The slump of this poor corps of hurriers is nothing to be surprised about. They have been pitching over their heads all season. It was bound to get back to normal sooner or later. The Yankees simply got first shot at them when they did break.

The White Sox visited us just previous to the Cleveland engagement. They left greatly saddened, for the Yankees clearly demonstrated they were the better team. I do not think we will be troubled again to any extent by this team, although it is composed of smart ball players. Its pitchers are not there, although a lot of fans would have you believe that Williams, Cicotte and Faber are all in good form. They believe that Wilkinson is ready for big league work, but I do not. Little Dick Kerr probably is the best pitcher of the lot.
