

FINANCIAL WORRIES CONFRONTING BOTH REPUBLICAN PARTIES

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Chicago, July 26.—Campaign finances of both the Republican and Democratic parties are in no too good condition. Each side is handicapped by a peculiar set of circumstances: entirely apart from the supposed restraints which the senate investigating committee was expected to apply this year to excessive spending.

The Republicans, in a moment of indiscretion, committed themselves to \$1000 as the limit of the contributions, something that not only prominent Republicans but looking Democrats say is wholly impracticable for a short campaign.

DEMOCRATS PLAY SAFE

The Democrats are affected by no such limits and can take any sums they please, but Wilbur Marsh, Democratic national treasurer, who was here today, declared the Democrats would reserve the right to refuse to accept contributions from sources not deemed sufficiently disinterested.

The Democrats, however, are in bad shape because the San Francisco convention took at least \$500,000 for travel and hotel expenses from the individual delegates and also delayed the organization of the Democratic campaign committee. So, while the Republicans have been at work for several weeks, the Democrats haven't even begun, and every day counts in a canvass for funds before election day.

COLLECTORS ARE HARD
Collecting money for a deficit, after the election result is once known, is an almost impossible task. The theory behind the Republican approach is a question of finance is entirely different from that being adopted by the Democrats. The Republicans are depending upon large subscriptions up to \$1000. They must raise at least \$5,000,000. It is much harder to get 5000 persons to contribute \$1000 apiece than it is to get 50,000 persons to give \$100 apiece. For the first must be accomplished by individual canvasses and soliciting, while the second might be collected through a mail organization if there were time to build one.

It isn't that 5000 Republicans can't be found to give \$1000 each, but all contributions must be made public and the art of giving money to campaigns is not highly developed work for several weeks, the Democrats haven't even begun, and every day counts in a canvass for funds before election day.

DEMOCRATS HAVE SCHEME
The best system devised is the one the Democrats established just after the close of the 1916 campaign, when they found themselves confronted with a deficit. Wilbur Marsh of Iowa, treasurer, and W. D. Janeson, also of Iowa, director of finance, organized a regular financial factory which did nothing but write chain letters asking for small subscriptions.

Five men would be asked to give small sums, for instance, and each requested to send in the names of five other persons who might be interested in contributing equal amounts. In that way the Democrats have acquired a mailing list of about 300,000 names. They collected in this way nearly \$2,000,000 in two years following the last election.

First, the money comes from so many contributors that it is no chance for any individual to have a disproportionate hold on the successful candidate when he takes office and, second, the increased number of subscribers means an almost equivalent number of volunteer workers on election day.

REPUBLICANS PAY ORGANIZERS
The Republicans have mistakenly educated organizers in some of the populous states to pay their workers, and it is difficult to switch from a paid to a volunteer basis. In a few places, where the Democratic state organizations have acquired a powerful influence, the same system of paying workers obtains, but generally speaking neither political party could afford to buy the services of many

workers on election day without subjecting themselves to loss.
There are Republicans who wish their party had the policy of asking for small subscriptions and at the same time had placed no limit of \$1000. For the Democrats get both the small and the large subscriptions. In some quarters here it is predicted that by the time October arrives the Republicans will have to confess that the \$1000 limit isn't getting results and that a general appeal for funds of any size, large or small, with the right to reject contributions from sources not considered disinterested, will have to be made.

Of course, federal laws are very weak with respect to campaign finances and there are plenty of ways of certifying that only \$5,000,000 have been spent by a national party when a total of five or six times that sum may have been expended by state committees, who do not have to make their contributions public or even certify to them.

SIX MILLION IN BILLS
It is a fair estimate that the national campaign committees of the Democrats and Republicans, respectively, will run up bills of at least \$5,000,000 each before they get through with the present campaign; but in the effort to elect senators, representatives, governors and state officials, millions will be spent "in the interest of the party" within the state which need never be revealed in a certificate of national campaign expenses.

With the Republicans and Democrats of the national committee are getting ready to make public weekly or semi-weekly, if necessary, all contributions. No sensations need be expected, for with the Republicans limiting their funds to \$1000 and the Democrats centering all their efforts on small contributors, the two campaign committees probably will struggle along during the next few months and wake up with deficits on the day after election.

Already there are murmurs about high cost of travel for speakers, the high cost of advertising and publicity and the fact that whereas a party worker would give all his time in the old days for \$5 a day, he wouldn't leave his job now for less than \$10 or \$15 a day to stand around the polls and coax voters to "vote right." With women voting, moreover, the work will have to be largely one of education through public speech and written word instead of the individual canvass of other years.

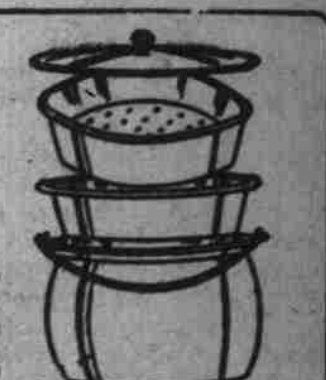
