Hand Organ Player Quits When Arrested

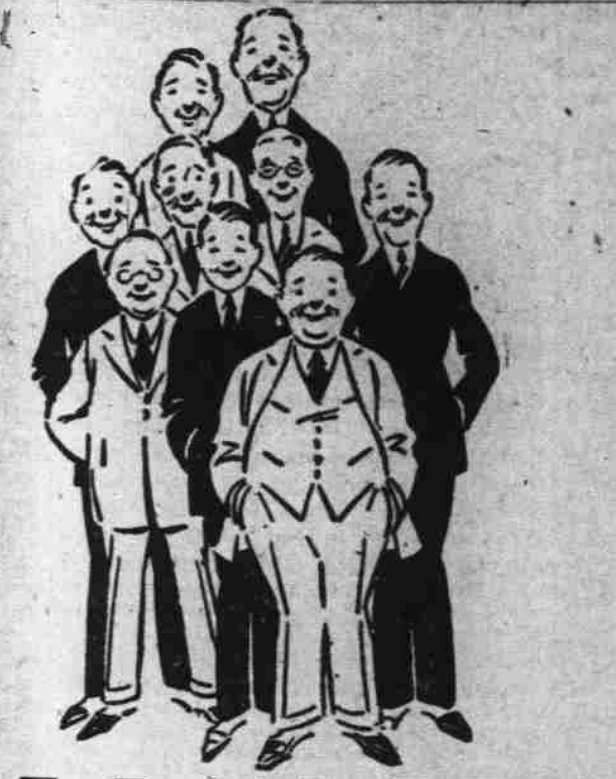
