

### FINAL TESTIMONY BEING TAKEN IN RAE WILL CASE

Final testimony was in progress Thursday before Circuit Judge Tazewell in the contest of the will of the late George Rae, who was a member of the Inman-Poulsen lumber company, and who left an estate valued at more than \$100,000.

The suit was instituted by Maude Rae Emerson, an adopted daughter. Sensational features marked the testimony during Thursday forenoon.

Arthur Spencer, chief counsel for the contestant, had named in his complaint Maude Emerson Rae and Elizabeth E. Rae, the widow, as the heirs.

He asked the court for permission to withdraw the names of Elizabeth E. Rae, declaring his belief that there had never been a valid decree of divorce between W. W. Miller and Elizabeth Miller, now Mrs. Rae, and that therefore there was never a legal marriage of Rae and Mrs. Miller on November 1914.

The testimony of Maude Rae Emerson was to the effect that she did not know for years that she was an adopted daughter, and that this information came to her from strangers; that during the lifetime of George Rae, he became infatuated with Mrs. Miller and neglected his own wife; that this caused her to become so mentally deranged that she was confined to a sanatorium and later sent to the state hospital at Salem, where she died.

Mrs. Emerson said that Rae made himself conspicuous during the lifetime of the first Mrs. Rae by his attentions to Mrs. Miller; and that the diamonds and jewelry of Mrs. Rae were worn by Mrs. Miller before Mrs. Rae passed away.

"I was in a convent at Salem," said Mrs. Emerson, "and he asked me to go with Mrs. Miller to the hospital to see how Mrs. Rae was getting along. When Mrs. Miller entered her room Mrs. Rae saw the diamond earrings in her ears and jumped at her, crying out, 'Those are my earrings.' They made me go away, as they said we upset the patient too much."

The general contention of the contestants is that under the will of George Rae, the bulk of his property and leaving a small bequest for Mrs. Emerson, the daughter.

Washington, July 29.—James C. Davis, general counsel for the railroad administration, has written Senator McNary to the effect that it can make no change in its recent order that all claims for damage in excess of \$250 must be referred by interested carriers to regional counsel of the railroad administration for approval.

### Cancellation Asked For Paving Highway Through Polk County

Authorizing the state engineer to cancel contracts for paving the Pacific highway or other state roads in Polk county, resolutions adopted at a special meeting of the state highway committee Monday were filed in the Multnomah county circuit court Thursday.

The same resolutions route the west side Pacific highway as follows: South to Rickreall, west to Dallas, south to Monmouth, from Monmouth southerly along routes heretofore adopted by the highway commission.

The action follows an injunction gained by Polk county against construction of the highway along rearranged routes.

### IRELAND IS QUIET; TRUCE REPORTED

Dublin, July 29.—(U. P.)—Bearing out rumors that a truce has been declared between the Sinn Fein and the British government, it was announced at Dublin castle today that for the first time in five years a period of 24 hours had passed without an outrage being reported from any part of Ireland.

### Army Office Issues Appeal for Recruits For Rhine Service

The Portland recruiting office of the United States army has issued a call for men to service in the American forces along the Rhine. According to a telegram received from the adjutant general in Washington 1123 men are needed.

Only men of high rating will be accepted for the service and the enlistments will be for three years. The call for men is in the following branches: Infantry, 176 without special qualifications, 30 men qualified as cooks, 30 qualified as clerks; cavalry, 15 men without special qualifications, 5 qualified as cooks, 5 as clerks; field artillery, 25 without special qualifications, 5 as cooks, 5 as clerks; quartermaster corps, 27 without special qualifications, 3 as cooks and bakers, 6 as clerks.

### John A. Chaloner to Stage Movie Against Act of Lunacy Trust

Los Angeles, Cal., July 29.—(U. P.)—John Armstrong Chaloner, New York millionaire, author and famous as the "hero" of an escape from Bloomingdale asylum in New York Thanksgiving eve, 1900, was here today, carrying on negotiations for the motion picture production of his book "Robbery Under Law," as a part of his campaign against the "lunacy trust."

Chaloner, son of a wealthy New York family and brother of "Sheriff Bob" Chaloner, former husband of Lina Cavalieri, late yesterday "announced" plans for the proposed production.

"I will play the lead myself," he said. "After having been tried out to see how I film, I was more than delighted with my nonchalance before the camera."

### ST. LOUIS SEIZES FUEL SUPPLIES

St. Louis, Mo., July 29.—(I. N. S.)—The urgency fuel committee, appointed by Mayor Kiel, this morning seized in the name of the city, the fuel supply of St. Louis and established a directorate over distribution.

It was announced that essential industries, including ice factories, hospitals and similar institutions, would be cared for before coal dealers would be allowed to make their deliveries. The city is threatened with an ice famine as well as the closing down of hundreds of industries owing to the Southern Illinois coal strike.

They were able to fix the clock so that it again keeps time for the thousands of the city population who depend on it.

### Chicago Liquor Ring Dealt Knockout Blow

Chicago, July 29.—(U. P.)—The biggest whiskey running conspiracy on record, was dealt a knockout, according to A. V. Dalrymple, federal enforcement officer, today by the arrest of six men here and seizure of \$1 cases of liquor. The ring has made liquor deals aggregating \$1,000,000, Police Chief Garrity said today.

### Spokane Sleepless; Heat Is Unbearable

Spokane, Wash., July 29.—(U. P.)—Thousands of people dressed wearily to work here today, following a practically sleepless night. Yesterday was the hottest day of the year, the temperature mounting to 106.8 degrees late in the afternoon. The heat held all night. Earlier today it looked like another scorcher.

### Williams Appointed To War Department

Washington, July 29.—(U. P.)—President Wilson has appointed William R. Williams, Richmond, Va., as assistant secretary of war, Secretary Baker announced today.

### No Prosecutions in Milk Dispute Till Both Sides Heard

There will be no prosecutions of the Oregon Dairyman's Co-operative league under the city anti-trust ordinance, as announced by Deputy City Attorney Lionel W. Mackay, who made the original investigation in the latest milk price controversy, until both sides of the case have been thoroughly investigated.

### TOURIST DISCOVERS INCENDIARY BLAZE

Gold Hill, Or., July 29.—An attempt at incendiarism was spoiled when the smell of burning candle wax attracted the attention of a tourist camping near a clump of thick brush on the river road south of Gold Hill.

### DECLINES TO BUY COAL OF GERMANY

Paris, July 29.—(I. N. S.)—The finance committee of the chamber of deputies this afternoon by a vote of 14 to 12, rejected the Spa agreement to pay Germany 200,000,000 francs for coal. This is called the most serious setback the premier has suffered since he took office.

### Minor Girl Forfeits Bail for Smoking

Pennin's case suffered in Municipal Judge Roseman's court when the jurist ordered forfeited the \$25 bail posted for the appearance of Alice Greco, minor telephone operator, charged with smoking cigarettes. Miss Greco, together with L. Haacker, 28, and Joseph Volk, 28, was arrested Wednesday by Patrolmen Day and Stephens. The three men were charged with giving the girl cigarettes and were fined \$50 each and sentenced to serve seven days in jail.

### WOMAN WHO SHOT HUSBAND IS KILLED • In Ayrto Mishap

Chicago, July 29.—(I. N. S.)—Mrs. Jessie Brown, who shot and killed Frank Brown, her husband, an official of the Moving Picture Operators' union, last April, was killed in an automobile accident early today. Robert J. Book, with whom she was riding, also was killed and John Healy was probably fatally injured. Their car struck a safety island in the street.

### Proposal Is Made to Run Freight Depots Only Part of Time

Washington, July 29.—(U. P.)—The Interstate Commerce commission is considering the advisability of closing all freight depots three days a week, officials of the commission said today.

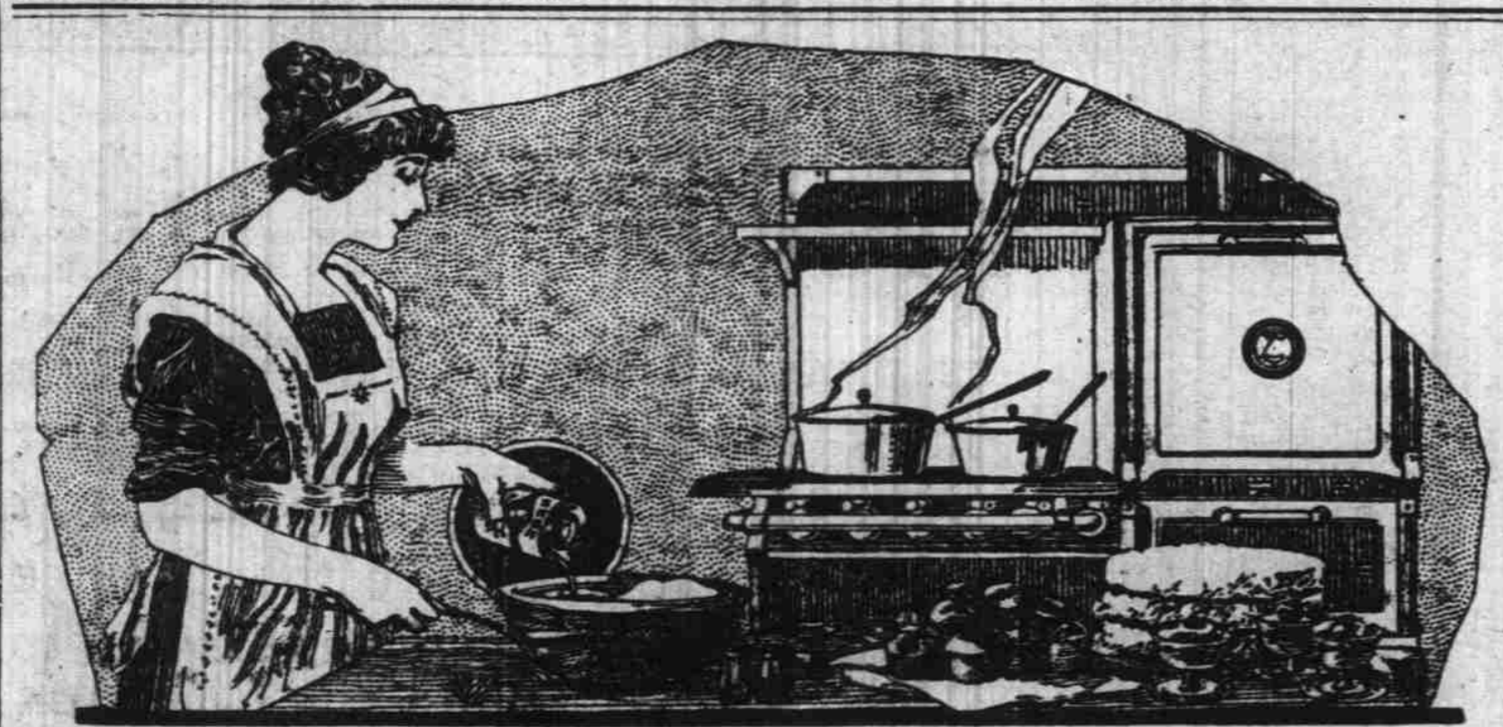

### 1919 Auto License Total Is Exceeded

Vancouver, Wash., July 29.—Automobile licenses have been issued to 3907 machines since March, 1919, the total amount to a total of 3768 licenses issued last year, according to a report just completed for the state by J. L. Garrett, county auditor. Since March, \$63,738.50 has been turned over to the state from the license fees. It is estimated that about 770 more machines will be given licenses during the balance of the year, which will make an additional \$12,558.70.
