BONNEVILLE MADE BY JOURNAL PLANE IN THIRTY MINUTES

While the grocerymen in their picnic at Bonneville Wednesday had plenty of things to do to keep them busy all day, they suspended the program immediately after 1 o'clock to assemble on the banks of the Columbia river and watch for the coming of The Journal's seaplane express service bearing the early afternoon editions of the paper.

Passenger Is Taken—The Journal's seaplane, starting at their usual hour for the early runs, had the papers ready to leave Lewis and Clark field at 1 o'clock, and Captain F. E. Harding of the Oregon Washington & Idaho Airplane company in an F-boat put off five minutes later.

The flight to Bonneville consumed exactly 30 minutes, and at 1:35 Captain Harding breasted the swift current in the Columbia and tied up the boat. A flight was made over the picnic grounds later in the afternoon, but the combination of current in the river and the high wind sweeping through the gorge was regarded as too dangerous for passenger flight.

Officials of the grocerymen's association declared it was the most successful holiday in the history of the organization, between 3000 and 4000 people attending the picnic. Two trains and hundreds of automobiles carried the merry-makers from Portland. Nearly all the grocers in the city closed their establishments for the day.

A lengthy program was carried out. There was continuous dancing, two band concerts, and sports of all kinds were provided.
