

TENNESSEE SOLON IS DEIGHTED WITH OREGON SCENERY

United States Senator Kenneth McKellar, who hails from Tennessee, and who loves his state and is proud of it, takes his hat off to Portland, Or., to its scenery, its flowers, its highways and its cherries. To the latter he does more than take off his hat.

The senator was a Portland visitor Thursday, arriving from the quakered city of the Angels in the morning, he was the guest of Senator Chamberlain at luncheon at Crown Point in the afternoon, and in the evening left for Seattle, en route home.

FOUGHT LA FOLLETTE

The Tennessee senator was a militant member of the national legislature during the time when the United States was passing its forces and its functions against the enemy. He was one of those who held that no man holding public office should say or do things which could be construed into disloyalty, and he was one of the senators who voted to expel Senator La Follette when the Wisconsin senator was before the bar of the senate.

Now that the war is over and the country is attempting again to get back into the paths of peace the senator is an advocate of 100 per cent development of the commercial and natural resources of the country, and his visit to Portland has confirmed him in this course. He rode up above the Columbia and looked out over the reaches of its waters. "It is wonderful," he said, "I have heard of it; I have been told of it; I have seen it and now I know it is more than true."

HARBOR IMPRESSES

He rode over the Broadway bridge and looked at the deep draft steamers riding alongside their berths. "I am glad I came," he said, "I will know now through my own eyes when they talk about your harbor."

"I am glad I came," he said again, and several times. "I am glad because of the beauty of the scenery through which I have passed; the Siskiyou, the valley, this wonderful highway and its surroundings; the flowers and the cherries I never tasted anything like them before. But I am glad beyond these pleasant things," he continued. "I am glad that I have seen Portland, and what of Oregon I have, because I believe that a senator owes it to the country to see all sections, to learn the needs, the hopes and the ambitions of their people."

FORT EQUALITY URGED

"I believe that every seaport should be given full opportunity and an equal chance to develop itself to the fullest possible extent," he said. "I drafted a plank which was written into the San Francisco platform pledging the Democratic party to the policy that every port, both upon the Atlantic and the Pacific should be accorded full and equal opportunity by the government in its administration of the merchant marine laws, that each port should be aided to the maximum of its use and development. This has not been true in the past, for New York has been given the advantage in the east, San Francisco and Seattle on the western coast, and the Columbia river should be given full opportunity and assistance by the government in the development of its water commerce, and I am glad I have seen it in the past, for so that I can act with direct knowledge of conditions should the occasion arise."

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Senator McKellar paid high tribute to both Senators Chamberlain and McNary. "If you say anything for me," he said, "please do not forget that I want to voice my regard both for Senator Chamberlain and for Senator McNary. I served as a member of the military affairs committee with Senator Chamberlain both prior to and during the time the United States was involved in the war."

COURT PERMITS HARD SURFACING IN POLK COUNTY

Funeral Held for H. E. Pennell; Burial To Be at Old Home

Funeral services for Henry Edward Pennell, president and founder of the Coast Shipbuilding company, manager of the North Pacific Lumber company and director of the Peninsula National bank, were held Friday afternoon at the chapel of J. P. Finley & Son. Burial will be in San Francisco.

Pennell died Thursday morning at his home, 317 Cornell road. His health has been failing for over two years, following an operation, but he did not become seriously ill until about three weeks ago. He was one of the most prominent men in lumber circles in Portland, starting his career in San Francisco when 17 years of age as an office boy for the Simpson Lumber company. Pennell was 55 years of age. He was a member of a San Francisco club, the El Comodoro, and in Portland about eight years and organized the Coast Shipbuilding company at the outbreak of the war.

Morton to Handle All Naturalization Work in U. S. Court

E. M. Morton has been commissioned a deputy clerk in the United States district court to handle all naturalization work, according to announcement made Friday by U. S. District Judge Marshall. Marshall has also requested an additional room in the building to handle this work. It is probable that one of the rooms on the first floor of the central station formerly occupied by postal authorities will be turned over to the naturalization service. Beginning August 1 the state courts will refuse to accept applications for citizenship, so Morton will receive all applications filed in the Portland area.

Warren Construction Company May Proceed Temporarily with Work of Surfacing a Portion of the Pacific Highway in Polk County

The Warren Construction company may proceed temporarily with the work of surfacing a portion of the Pacific highway in Polk county between Rickreall and Monmouth, despite the restraining order issued a few days ago by Circuit Judge McCourt. The modification of the order was made Thursday by Circuit Judge Stapleton, Judge McCourt being absent from the city.

The Warren Construction company recently was added as parties defendant in the suit of Monmouth and Independence and officers of Polk county against the state highway commission in the litigation over the routing of the Pacific highway. The company was enjoined, on a temporary writ without a hearing on its part, from proceeding with the work on the highway. Through its attorneys it appeared before Judge Stapleton Thursday, asking for a modification of the court's order, so that the company could proceed with the completion of work now open.

PENITENTIARY SENTENCE OF STEPHEN CORBIN TO STAND

Stephen S. Corbin must go to the state penitentiary for two years, according to the sentence originally imposed, notwithstanding the efforts of his friends to get a modification of sentence. So decided Circuit Judge Stapleton Thursday afternoon after having taken under advisement the matters presented on Corbin's behalf. It was represented that John Wemberg, out on parole, was the chief actor in the stealing of the automobile that caused Corbin's sentence to the penitentiary, and he had been brought into court and subjected to close questioning. Judge Stapleton decided to continue Wemberg on parole, but gave him a severe lecture. Corbin created a sensation in Judge Stapleton's court a day or so ago, when he fainted as sentence was imposed.

INDICTMENT OF ALLEGED COMMUNISTS ATTACKED

On behalf of Herman Schluter, who was indicted by the Multnomah county grand jury on the charge of being a member of the communist labor party, advocating the overthrow of the government, a demurrer was filed Thursday by H. M. Esterly and George F. Vanderveer. They aver that the indictment is too vague and indefinite, that the court has no jurisdiction and that the act under indictment is unconstitutional.

MAPLEWOOD DISTRICT MUST PAY WATER ASSESSMENTS

Maplewood water district is a legally organized body, fully authorized to levy assessments on the property within its boundaries for sustaining its water system. Sheriff P. M. Hurlbut has full authority to proceed with the collection of the special assessment of \$4000 against property within the district levied by the commissioners. This is the gist of a decision made by Circuit Judge Morrow late Thursday afternoon.

SUIT BROUGHT ON CLAIM INSURANCE COVERED FIRE

The Columbia Film corporation filed a suit Thursday against the Royal Insurance company Ltd., of Liverpool, England, in which it seeks judgment for \$7064.25 and costs for losses alleged to have been suffered in a fire and which it claims are covered by a policy taken in this company. It says but \$64.25 of the amount due has been tendered, although more than eight months have elapsed since the fire and full proof of loss has been filed.

No Men in Family; They Had to Steal, Say 4 Shoplifters

Hoquiam, Wash., July 30.—Two women and two girls arrested Thursday afternoon, charged with shoplifting, took police to their homes and returned \$1500 in merchandise, which they admitted stealing during the past month. The collection contained articles stolen from practically every store on Grays Harbor, police say.

The prisoners are Mrs. Annie Jello, 69; Mary Holm, 55; her daughter, Pearl Holm, 14, and her niece, Irene Gavender, 15. Miss Betty Leonard, clerk, missed some purses after she had sold the quartet a few cheap articles. She notified the police. A search revealed merchandise stolen from these two stores tucked away in the women's skirts and waists. The women say they always worked together. The two children peddled the loot. The older woman said there were no men in either family and they had to steal to live.

Former G. A. R. Head Dies at Cincinnati

Cincinnati, Ohio, July 30.—(U. P.)—Captain J. R. Monfort, 78, former national commander of the G. A. R., died unexpectedly at Oaks Corner, N. Y., Thursday, while visiting his daughter. Monfort was wounded in the Civil war and carried a bullet in his thigh.
