COAST RAILROAD
OFFICIALS MUM ON
INCREASE IN RATERumors Are to Effect That West-
ern Roads Are Not Satisfied
With Increases That Are Made.

San Francisco, July 31.—(U. P.)—Officials of Pacific coast railroads tonight were inclined to withhold comment on the rate increases granted by the interstate commerce commission pending more detailed information.

At the same time, conferences were known to have been held during the afternoon at which the award was given careful study.

At the office of President William Sproul of the Southern Pacific it was declared that no statement would be made probably until Monday, as further reports from New York representatives of the company would be necessary to determine the complete situation.

There were whisperings that the western roads might not be entirely satisfied with the increases granted, but none of these rumors could be traced to any reliable source, and the more conservative opinion was that even the railroad officials themselves were not yet certain just what the effect of the increase would be in the west.

Effect of the interstate commerce commission's award on action to be taken by the California state railroad commission was one of the centers of interest tonight.

On Monday morning a hearing will begin before the state railway commission on applications for rate increases by all common carriers, steam and electric railroads and steamship lines—operating within the state.

These carriers all are asking that their rates be harmonized with interstate rates and they have specifically requested, in most instances, from setting a definite figure for the increase they ask.

EXECUTIVES IN ST. PAUL
PLEASED OVER RAIL RISES

St. Paul, Minn., July 31.—(U. P.)—Railroad executives here tonight declared rate increases announced by the interstate commerce commission "encouraging," and believed everyone warranted in taking a very hopeful view of the railroad situation.

Ralph Budd, president of the Great Northern, said tariff revision probably would take about 15 days and that new rates probably would be made effective about the middle of August. The principal delay will be in printing, he said. "It is difficult to tell off-hand just how the decision will affect the so-called transcontinental lines," said Budd. "The application to the commission was made in three districts—the Western, Southern and Eastern. The commission has designated a fourth district, the mountain-Pacific district, and it is difficult to tell just how the increase, varying as they do in the new district and the Western district, will affect our lines."

"The application was made with the idea in view that the increase would enable the roads to realize a return of between 1½ and 2 per cent on their value and enable the roads to reestablish their credit. This is the thing that must be done. We are working in the spirit of giving the transportation act a fair trial, and it is very encouraging to the roads to see the commission working so hard to get to the things that are required of it under the law."

Charles Donnelly, executive vice-president of the Northern Pacific, said the roads had asked a general increase of 25 per cent in the Western district, and said it would take a few days to determine just what the effect of the increases announced will be. He said he thought everyone was "warranted in taking a hopeful view."

New York May Lose
Fame as Mecca for
People With Thirst

New York, July 31.—(U. P.)—New York, which has been called "the wettest city in dry United States," is threatened with the loss of this questionable fame by another burst of activity by federal agents.

The latest raids in which wet stocks to the value of \$171,000 were seized has been followed by the tip along Broadway, "big drought coming!" One hundred federal agents under James Shevlin, supervising prohibition enforcement agent, are seeking evidence. The nearby cities of Newark, N. J., and Jersey City are being combed also. John J. Quigley of the prohibition enforcement office denies that it is easy to get a drink in New York.

"It is getting harder every day," said Quigley. "A stranger cannot go into a New York saloon and get a drink. It is true that a person well known to the bartender might get a drink, but saloonkeepers are getting more and more cautious every day."

Senator Borah to
Go On Stump for
Republican Ticket

Chicago, July 31.—(U. P.)—Senator William E. Borah of Idaho, chief adviser of Senator Hiram Johnson during the latter's campaign, here to take campaign presidential nomination, will campaign actively for Senator Warren G. Harding, according to Congressman James E. Good of Iowa.

"Borah is going to speak in the campaign," said Good, who has arrived at Republican headquarters here to take charge of the speakers' bureau. "In fact, he already has made a number of speeches in Idaho. He assured me he would go wherever the bureau wanted him. He is very friendly to Senator Harding and he will give enthusiastic support to the ticket."

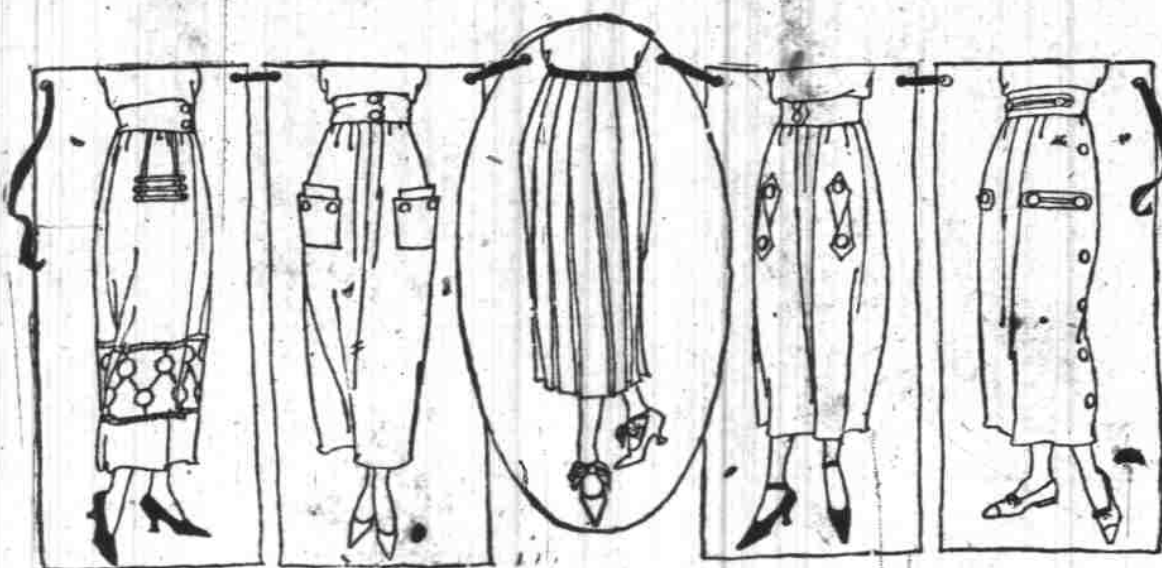
