HOTEL CONDITIONS INVESTIGATED AT MOUNT HOOD BASE

Special Committee of Portland Ad Club is Looking into Accommodations for Tourists.

Hotel conditions for the benefit of tourists at the base of Mount Hood are being investigated in detail by a special committee of the Portland Ad club, which left the city Saturday noon for Cloud Cap Inn and the summit of the mountain.

The party consists of officers of the Ad club, with their wives, members of the committee itself, and others of the club interested in the project. Leaving Eighteenth and Alder streets at noon, the party went to Hood River, where they had luncheon at one of the apple ranches of W. J. Piepenbrink, secretary of the club. From Hood River the party went to Mount Hood lodge by way of Neal creek, and from that place to Cloud Cap Inn, where dinner was served and the party spent the night. The question of adequate accommodations for travelers to the base of the mountain was taken up in a business meeting held at Cloud Cap Saturday night, and plans were laid for increasing facilities in the vicinity of Cloud Cap and Mount Hood lodge. Blaze in Laundry At Dayton Causes Damage of \$25,000

Dayton, Wash., July 31.—The business section of Dayton experienced its second devastating fire of the year when a \$25,000 blaze destroyed early Thursday morning in the boiler room of the Dayton Steam laundry, gutted several buildings and threatened an entire block. Dayton possesses a new chemical engine and fire truck, but the chemical was of no use, as the fire had gained big proportions when discovered.

The heaviest losses at Dr. C. H. Day, who owns the laundry building and adjoining places, including house Hager, the dentist and Kirschner's plumbing shop. Probably \$4000 worth of clothing belonging to people of Dayton, Wabburg and Prescott were burned in the laundry.

Japanese Emperor Is Recovering From Spell of Sickness

After cabling Tokyo concerning the present condition of the health of his majesty the emperor of Japan, Consul T. Sugimura at Portland has ascertained that "as has been already reported, his majesty is recovering from his recent overwork and suffering from diabetes and gout. At present these ailments have been relieved, but his majesty still feels tired, it is thought necessary for him to be spared from all official duties such as attendance at banquets and other court ceremonies. No anxiety is felt concerning the speedy recovery of the emperor."

Funeral Services For Mrs. C. Palmer Held at Dundee

Newberg, July 31.—Funeral services for Mrs. Cyrene Palmer, early Oregon resident, were held at Dundee Tuesday. She came to Oregon in 1885, residing first in Tillamook county. Two sons, Everett Palmer, Venice, Cal., and Gladson Palmer, Bend, survive. She was 72 years of age.

Child Beater Gets Shub From Women Inmates at Jail

A sidelight on the case of Mrs. Rita Mathus, convicted child-beater, comes through Mrs. Frank W. Swanton of the Oregon Humane society from the Multnomah county jail, where Mrs. Mathus was held for two days prior to her trial.

Women prisoners at the jail had seen the child victims of Mrs. Mathus' brutality, and when Mrs. Mathus arrived in the jail she found a mighty friendly reception. Mrs. Swanton reports. The women in the jail corridors refused to permit Mrs. Mathus the privilege of the sugar bowl and cream pitcher at the dinner table and declined to talk with her.

Denied the coffee cup ingredients, Mrs. Mathus did not enjoy her stay, and would have enjoyed a return to the jail after her trial much less, according to the threats of a husky maid who is still in jail. Mrs. Swanton mentioned Mrs. Mathus to this husky prisoner just as the woman was rolling up her sleeves to get at her work.

Cleaning her flat and shading the member wildly, the prisoner declared: "Just you bring that woman here. We'll show her how to beat innocent little kids."

Mrs. Mathus did not return, however, but is out on bail. She thus avoided the reception promised by a motley gathering of women jailed for all sorts of crimes from bootlegging to vagrancy, but not for child-beating.

John Hendrickson, Who Died in Quincy, Had Fought Indians

John H. Hendrickson, who died on July 20 at his home at Quincy, Columbia county, settled in Umatilla county in 1876 and was a veteran of the Indian campaign of 1858. In 1858 he moved to Columbia county and established himself in business at Quincy, where he remained until 1908, when he moved to Mayvick, Or.

Hendrickson was born in April, 1852, and was married January 10, 1886. Mrs. Hendrickson died October 25, 1904, and in November, 1917, Hendrickson was again married. He was a member of the I. O. O. F. for 40 years.

Funeral services were conducted at Quincy by the Rev. Dr. Waldo of Clatskanie. Surviving are the widow, Mrs. Emma Hendrickson, at Quincy, and three children, Mrs. Otto Grande and Henry and Eleanor Hendrickson of Portland.

Beaver Dam Cause Of Near Fatality to Hood River Horse

Hood River, July 31.—A big colony of beavers engaged in building a dam across the east fork of Hood river near Mount Hood were responsible for a near fatality to a horse. The animals had felled a big tree trunk in the stream and it carried away the high power lines of the Pacific Power & Light company. A few minutes later B. J. Montgomery, a rancher, passed in his buggy and the horse came into contact with the live wire. It fell unconscious but later recovered. This is the second misadventure of the kind in the past two weeks, on a former occasion cutting off both power and telephonic communication when they dropped a tree across the wires.

SURF BATHING IS DELIGHT THIS YEAR

Ocean Water Warm Because of Lack of Cold Winds; Sun Heats Sand.

Early beach vacationists returning from the seashore resorts of Oregon and Washington are bringing back the glad tidings that the wild waves of the Pacific are warmer this year and that bathing has become an increased joy as a result.

But vacationists are prone to bring back many strange reports of what they have seen, heard or felt during their precious two weeks parole from the shackles of business.

It is an impossibility, however, to keep the watchdogs of the republic from the scent of anything unusual and now government officials have made the story more interesting by declaring that it is not only probable but true in a small sense.

The verdict doesn't say anything about extra large crowds of bathers heating up the water or a sudden turning of a tropical current into the shoreline of Oregon and Washington.

The whole thing is very simple and due to a combination of the elements that does not happen every year. Warm weather has hit the beach just at a time when the lowest tides of the year are running. There is a big run out of water and a much larger expanse of sand for the sun to beat down on. Result: Warmer water along the shore.

An absence of wind has been another factor to aid bathers. Net results of the proposition is only from 4 to 6 degrees difference, but that is a great amount, say the government officials in consideration of the fact that a half mile from the shore line the temperature of the Pacific will not be found to change more than 5 degrees in year around.

The warmer water will not therefore be justification for the weather man to bring on warmer summer weather.

Christian leadership is the element of a boy's training given special emphasis at the Y. M. C. A. boys' camp at Spirit Lake, Wash. The camp is on the shore of Spirit Lake at the base of Mount St. Helens, where 45 boys are enjoying the annual outing.

If for four or five weeks a boy can be exposed to the breath of nature cool waters where fish abound, and plenty of other live boys like himself, exposed to all these things plus the stimulus of self-government and Christian leadership, he is very likely to catch by contact that which he cannot get from books—namely, big hearted, self-reliant Christian character—the camp leaders declare.

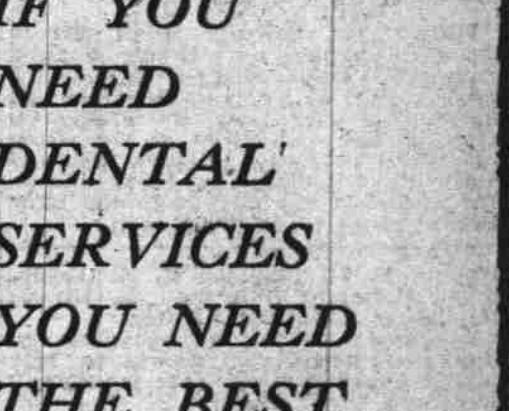
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
