Huckleberry Crop Gives Promise of Enormous Yields

The extreme cold of last winter apparently had a beneficial effect on the huckleberry bushes, for the fruit is appearing in enormous quantities out in the mountains. In practically all the well known huckleberry patches where certain Portlanders have made the habit of going year after year the berry crop seems larger than ever before.

Out around Government Camp, south of Mount Hood, and on farther east, around the Summit House, the fruit is just ripening and in a couple of weeks the berries will be at their best. There are also many berries in the Coast mountains. Some of the finest berry patches in the state are on the upper Clackamas river above Cazadero, but they are inaccessible save to travelers who would make tedious hikes over trails or on horseback. 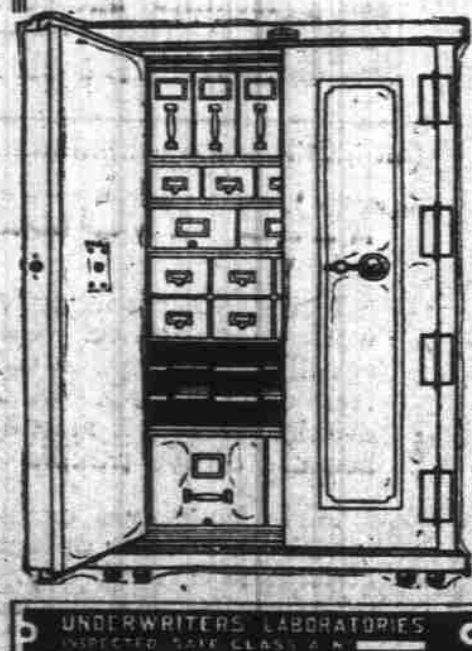
