

Portland Rowing Club Captain Angling for Regatta

Rowing Club Hopeful of Big Regatta

Captain Newell Endeavoring to Bring California Crews Here Next Month for Races.

FREDERICK R. NEWELL, captain of the Portland Rowing Club crews, has not given up all hopes of sending his championship senior four-oared crew against the California champions on the Willamette river some time next month. While attending the annual regatta of the North Pacific Association of Amateur Oarsmen at Vancouver, B. C., last month the matter of bringing the Californians north was discussed and Captain Newell was instructed to get in touch with the southerners.

The San Diego Rowing club produced the best four at the 1920 regatta of the Pacific Association of Amateur Oarsmen held in July and now efforts are being made to hold a Pacific coast championship race. The southern crews use a coxswain in their four-oared boat but Captain Newell has written to the Bear Steers that the Portland Rowing club will loan a shell and sweep to the visitors if they will come north.

Newell also suggested that should the Californians decide to come to the Rose City it would be best for them to be here about a week before the proposed race so that they could become accustomed to the shells without coxswain.

FALL REGATTA PLANNED

The only regatta on the program of the local crews is the annual fall meet which will be held on the Saturday following Labor day. It is intended to hold the championship race between the San Diego and Portland fours at that time as the "main event" of the program.

"The Willamette is at its best in September," said Captain Newell, "and at that time there is little danger of winds sufficient to cause water to swamp the boats or take away from the speed. We would like to make it an annual affair between the winners of the senior four race in the South and those of the North association, the place of meeting to alternate in the North and South."

"There was a rumor in Vancouver to the effect that a big championship regatta was going to be held in Honolulu in 1921 or 1922 and that all Pacific coast crews were going to be invited to take part. Some seemed to think that it would be in 1922 as a part of the entertainment to the visiting Shriners who will be attending the biennial convention of the annual national convention of the order at San Francisco. Nothing definite has been received here. If a crew were sent from Portland it means that considerable time would have to be spent in the islands previous to the race and it is not known whether or not all the members of the championship crew could get away from their work for any great length of time.

VICTORIA COMING STRONG
"At any rate we are waiting for developments but the word is up to the Victoria representatives to open up the eyes of the local squad that went North."

"Another year from now and we will be the Victoria crew that we will have to defeat to retain our championship," said Captain Newell, "for the Islanders were the best but they were up to the Victorians in the last 10 years. My first sight of a Victoria crew was in 1910 and although some mighty good prospects have been turned out by the Canadians it was not until last month's showing that it was noted they were coming back with a bang. First class mauling was on and plenty of it and all seemed anxious to enter a hard race."

The Portland Rowing club crews will work out two or three times a week until definite word is received from the South and then should the offer be accepted active training will take place.

Captain Lyons, who was 90 years old, was representative pilot of the English sloop Thistle, challenger for America's cup in 1887. He was also for many years sailing master for the late James Gordon Bennett aboard the yacht Henrietta.

FAMOUS COACHES WILL HANDLE U. S. OLYMPIC SQUAD

Innovation Expected to Meet With Approval of Team Members; Oregon Represented.

NEW YORK, July 31.—The American Olympic athletes will certainly be well coached.

The selection of Jack Moakley, the famous Cornell athletic coach; Lawson Robertson of Penn. Martin Delaney of Chicago, Mike Ryan of Colby and Bill Hayward of Oregon marks the first time in history that a board of coaches has been selected to prepare the athletes for the big games, and the move met with popular approval by followers of athletics throughout the country.

Because of his wide experience and brilliant record as a coach of athletes in all departments of track and field sports, Jack Moakley was made the head coach. Each of the other members of the board will have his own department to look after, with Robertson and Delaney handling the East and Middle Western athletes, Ryan the middle runners, and the Pacific coast representative the men from the far coast.

Each member of this board of noted coaches has spent considerable time in coaching and conditioning athletes, and it is a certainty that the Olympic coaches could not have chosen more wisely.

Moakley is known all over the country because of the wonders he has worked at Ithaca. He is a veteran at the game, and in this, his first appointment as head coach of an American Olympic team, he takes rank as a worthy successor to the great Mike Murphy, who, by the way, was always a great admirer of Moakley. Commenting on Moakley's ability Murphy once said:

"He is a great developer of men and deserves unlimited credit. When he loses one champion he brings out another to take his place."

With the wonderful material that will be available Moakley is certain to uphold the prestige established by American track and field athletes in former Olympiads, and it goes without saying every member of the team will get careful and special attention for world's best.

His fine staff of assistants the veteran Cornellian will have an opportunity to watch over every one of the athletes.

Hood River Fishing Is Declared Good

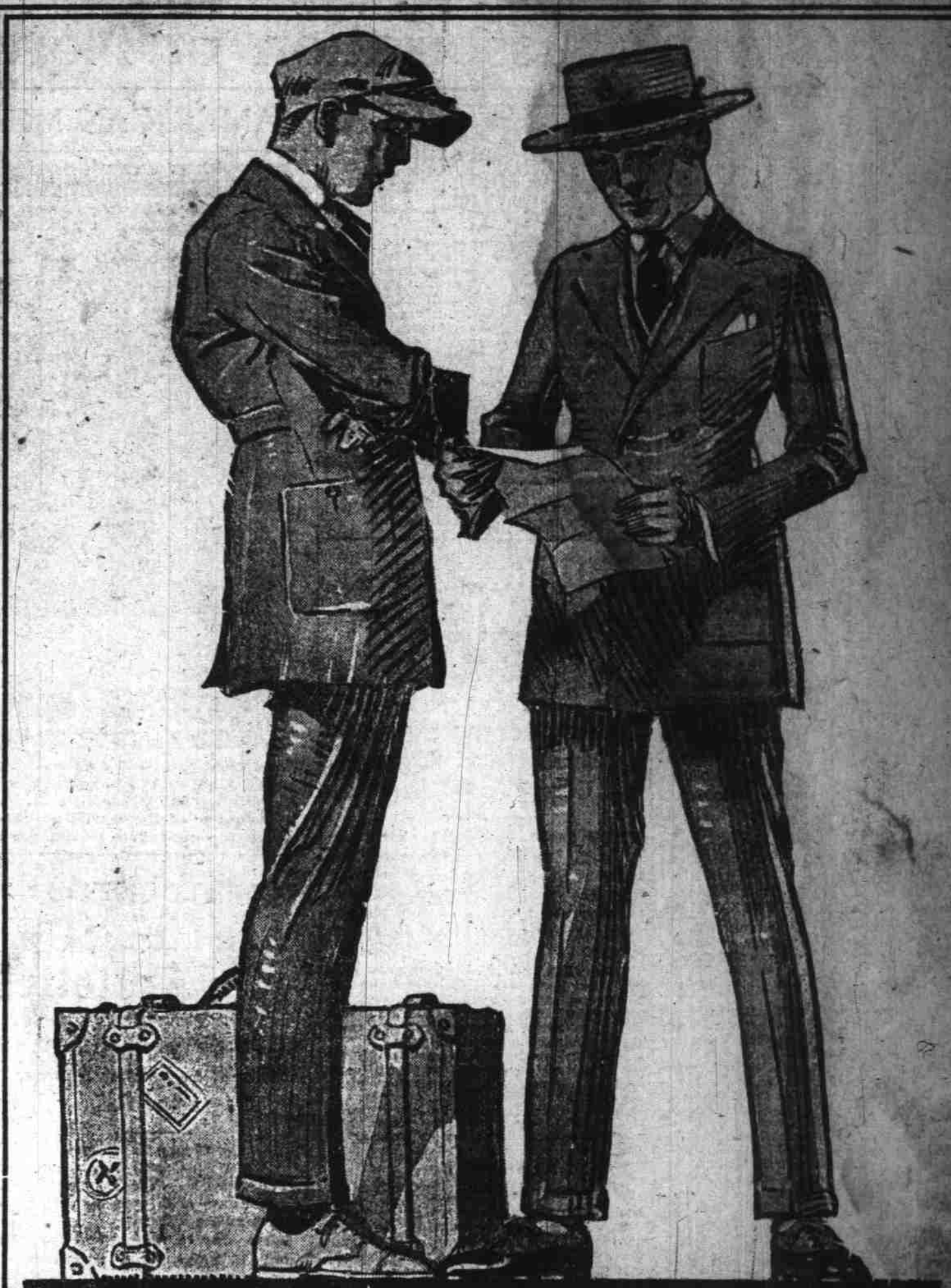
