FURS AND MYSTERY

Those who have followed this series of exposures from week to week have read of many substitutions that are perpetrated by conscienceless dealers in furs, and how many skins are "exchanged" by various ingenious methods. In fact, we've found enough misdirected ingenuity to have been expended to bountifully supply a nation, if only directed along legitimate channels.

Now in just such an apparently small thing as dyeing, for instance, we find that, instead of using the tried and true, he has worked out a quicker and cheaper method which so far as wearing is concerned, all but ruins the skins on which it is used, though to the average purchaser it looks nearly as good as the real thing, and can rarely be detected until the furs have actually been in use for some little time.

The old French system of dyeing requires a rather costly fluid that has never been excelled for the good of effect it has on both the fur and the skin, and the permanent "luster" it gives to the finished product. Where as the set - the money-on-low-price system - uses a cheap dye that ruins the fur and skin, leaving it without luster from the very beginning.

This, then, is another thing to the growing list of prospective fur purchaser must avoid. If the dealer you patronize is not of thoroughly established reliability you must first try and determine whether the piece you are offered is really the kind of fur it is professed to be. Next you must make sure the skins are natural size, and not conveniently-expanded, and then comes the task of making sure the fur has been properly dyed, if it is a dyed piece, and most furs are. Next, whether the skins are of proper grade, even though they are genuine. And finally you must make sure that the price is right by comparing the offering with that of a legitimate dealer.

Is it any wonder, then, that we advise you in all sincerity to - Beware of the Wolf in sheep's clothing?
