

WHITE HURLS BACK HARD QUERIES FOR HARDING TO CRACK

Does Republican Candidate Side With Taft or Johnson on the League Issue? Chairman Asks.

Washington, July 31.—(I. N. S.)—To Senator Warren G. Harding's peppery challenge of Governor James M. Cox's position on the League of Nations and to the senator's charge that the governor's position is vague, Chairman George White of the Democratic national committee and manager of Governor Cox's campaign, today made response L. kind.

"I don't propose to enter into a newspaper controversy with Senator Harding," the Republican nominee, Chairman White said, "but I would like to ask the senator one question. On the League of Nations issue, does he side with former President William H. Taft or Senator Hiram W. Johnson? Which one represents Senator Harding's views—Johnson or Taft?"

Chairman White's reference was to a statement issued by Senator Harding at Marion in which the Republican candidate asked Governor Cox whether he had pledged himself to President Wilson on the ratification of the treaty and league without essential modifications, and if he had accepted Article X.

HITS BACK AT HARDING
White also came back at Senator Harding on the question of campaign finances. The senator from Ohio assailed the no-limit fund plan of the Democrats for raising campaign money and declared the big-money group was behind the Democratic party.

"I suggest that Senator Harding get together with Fred Upham, treasurer of the Republican national committee, who has confessed that appeals to the small contributor have fallen down and has suggested contributions raised," White said.

"Democrats welcome full investigation of campaign contributions and expenditures," White declared, adding that it was the Democrats who in the closing hours of congress obtained the continuation of the federal election committee hearing which unearthed "such large expenditures in the Republican primaries."

Replying to Senator Harding's charge that "it is quite true that certain powerful influences, which are deeply concerned in carrying out the present administration's foreign policy, are prepared to contribute most liberally to the Democratic funds," Chairman White said he had not seen any such contributions so far, and that yesterday, when the national Democratic committee payroll was laid on his desk, it came with the remark that there were no funds.

White declared the Democratic party had always depended upon popular support in its campaign, and would do so this year. Some 300,000 names, he said, were on the committee's list, and indicated that the machinery for canvassing these would be speeded up. It had not been determined whether W. D. Jamieson, who has been in charge of this work in the past, would continue to function in that capacity or do other work in the campaign.

O'BRIEN WESTERN MANAGER
William H. O'Brien of Lawrenceburg, Ind., had been tendered the post of Western manager with office in Chicago, White said.

Before leaving for New York this afternoon, Chairman White sent a telegram to Democratic members of the Tennessee state legislature, urging them to do their utmost to make their thirty-sixth state to ratify women's suffrage today, if it would please Governor Cox very much.

Senator Robert L. Owen of Oklahoma, himself a candidate for the Democratic nomination for the presidency at San Francisco, had a long conference with White.

"I shall do my utmost to assist Governor Cox and the Democracy in the pending campaign," said Senator Owen. "I feel this is the best way, in which to serve the American people."

Germany Buys Fresh Beef of U. S. in June Valued at \$503,051

Washington, July 31.—(I. N. S.)—Meat products of American packing houses to the value of \$41,115,735 were shipped abroad during June, according to figures made public today by the department of commerce.

An interesting fact in connection with these figures is that Germany in June imported 2,159,884 pounds of American fresh beef, valued at \$503,051, while Belgium took 6,255,377 pounds, valued at \$1,123,204. France received 4,558,730 pounds of canned beef, valued at \$1,309,870. Germany also received from this country more than 6,500,000 pounds of bacon, together with a large quantity of oleo, lard, oil, etc.

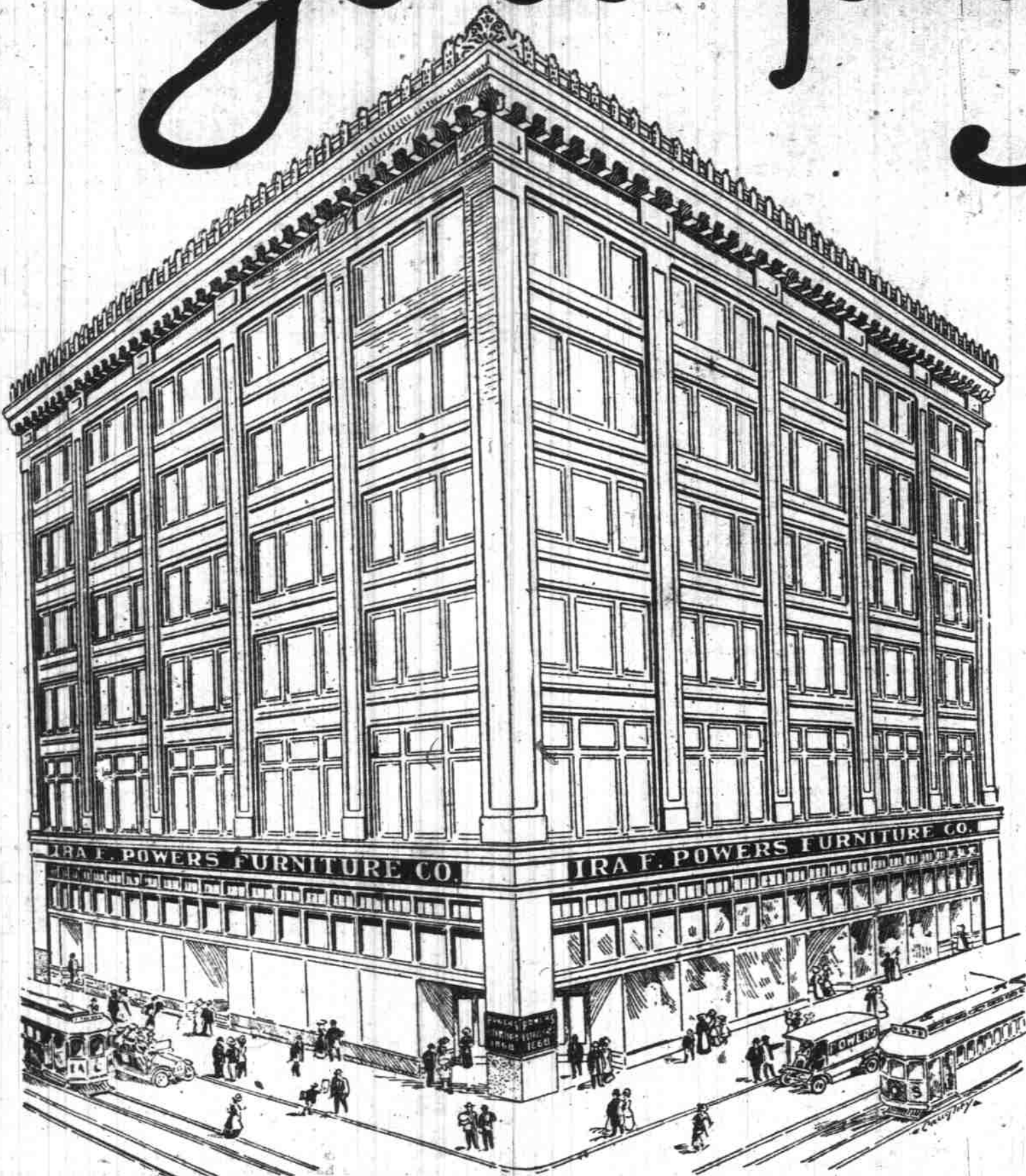
The bride is the granddaughter of Noah Davis, justice of the supreme court, and her father is George T. Montgomery, a New York broker.
