

MILLIONAIRE LLOYD CONVICTED WITH 19 OTHER REDS

Chicago, Aug. 3.—William Bros. Lloyd, millionaire sergeant at arms of the Communist party, and 19 co-defendants were guilty of conspiracy to overthrow the government in Judge Oscar Hebel's court Monday night. The verdict was returned at 9:30 o'clock.

The jury fixed Lloyd's punishment at imprisonment in the penitentiary and a fine of \$5000. Arthur Proctor, Chicago bookstore owner, was given the same sentence as Lloyd. The rest of the defendants were given sentences ranging from penitentiary sentences to one year in the Cook county jail.

The case went to the jury at noon.

LLOYD SURPRISED
Lloyd and his co-defendants were charged with organizing the Communist Labor party for the purpose of forming an alliance with Russian radicals to establish soviet government in the United States by a revolution which was to take the form of a general strike. They were prosecuted under the Illinois sedition laws.

Lloyd, following a cigar hotel, read a magazine while the court was waiting for the jury to come in. When the 12 men filed in, he smiled broadly and waved to friends in the audience. When the verdict affecting him was read, he nervously chewed his lips and tried to smile, but failed. His attorneys asked him a question and he nodded violently. Exception was then taken to the manner in which the jury reached its decision in each individual case.

TO APPEAL DECISION

L. E. Katterfield of Dighton, Kas., a farmer, and Ludwig Lore of New York were given penitentiary sentences by the jury, the term to be fixed by the court. Lore is the publisher of Class Struggle.

Jack Carney, Duluth, was fined \$1000 and given a penitentiary sentence. He is the editor of The Truth. Max Bechtel, San Francisco; Dr. Oscar J. Brown, DuKalb, Ill.; Charles Krumbein, Chicago; Morris A. Stolar, Chicago; Dr. Carl F. Sandberg, Chicago; Edwin Furth, Indianapolis; John Vogel, Chicago; Samuel F. Hankins, Chicago; M. J. Christiansen, Chicago; James A. Melisinger, Chicago; Edgar Owens, Mo-line, Ill.; and Nels Kjar, Chicago, were given one year in the Cook county jail. Perry Shipman, Rock Island, Ill., was sentenced to the penitentiary.

The decisions will be appealed, it was declared by Clarence Darrow, chief counsel for William Bros. Lloyd, who has paid for the entire defense of the Communists.

The trial began May 12, after five days had been spent in getting a jury. The arrests were made in a nationwide roundup of "Reds" last New Year's day.

Gamelin Gets Medal

Work Finished on Columbia Highway; Celebration Is Held

Hood River, Aug. 3.—Monday afternoon the last load of hot stuff went on the highway west of Mitchell point tunnel, and at 4:25 o'clock the Columbia highway was opened for all time to the public, amid cheers for Simon Benson, chairman of the state highway department.

A deputation from Hood River was present, including County Judge L. N. Blowers, Leslie and Truman Butler, C. M. McCullagh, County Surveyor Cruikshank, E. E. Brett, C. A. Bell, H. G. Ball and J. D. Thomson. The first car over the completed highway from the west was driven by H. W. Mitchell, while from the east a car was driven across by Leslie Butler. The latter carried County Judge Blowers and County Surveyor Cruikshank, was the first to make the trip over.

The highway is now open at all times and today the stream of traffic was unbroken.

Stock Takes Over Sphagnum Product Company Control

W. S. Stock, for 20 years manager of the manufacturing department of the Blumauer & Frank Drug company, has taken over a controlling interest in the Sphagnum Products company and assumed active management of the concern. The Sphagnum Products company was recently reorganized with the following officers: President and general manager, W. S. Stock; Emil Waldman, vice president and sales manager; C. O. Stone, secretary, and C. B. Russell, treasurer. Directors are Stock, Waldman, Russell, F. P. Drinker, L. E. Jones and W. R. Drummond.

The company employs 30 operatives in the manufacture of sphagnum moss surgical and sanitary dressings and is shipping its products to all parts of the United States and a number of foreign countries. An educational and hygienic department has been organized and placed in charge of Mrs. E. J. McDonald.

William Taylor of Pendleton Arrested

Pendleton, Aug. 3.—William Taylor, recently sentenced to 2½ years in prison for larceny and paroled to the late Sheriff Taylor, was brought here Monday from Walla Walla for having violated his parole. He is the second parole violator arrested for this offense within a week, the other being Austin Mann, sentenced for automobile stealing.

OLD HIGH COST IS ENEMY OF STORK, FRENCHMAN SAYS

Paris, Aug. 3.—Because of a lack of proper accommodation facilities for bourgeoisie mothers, the middle class birth rate of France is suffering an avoidable check at a time when the greatest need of the country is increased population, in the opinion of Professor Pinard, deputy from Paris.

As a remedy for the situation, Pinard has introduced a bill to create a society service department to operate through- out France. It would do up and trained nurses to bourgeoisie homes at fees within reach. A part of the expense of such a department would be defrayed by annual dues from homes, in return for which subscribers would have the right to command the services of experts.

"The existing maternity accommodations are either prohibitively expensive or they prevent recourse," said Pinard. "A bourgeoisie father recently searched vainly for a week between the two extremes. Large hospitals demanded fabulous sums, such as 3000 francs for medical attention and a hundred francs daily for care. Unfortunately, such instances are not exceptional."

"Experiences like this discourage maternity at a time when it is the most important to place a premium on it. Person B, I am opposed to the present scene of maternity hospitals, which place a holy procedure on a purely commercial basis. I regard the American method of child birth in the home with skilled attendance, where the mother is in close touch with her loved ones, as infinitely superior."

Oak Grove Orchard Fire Under Control

Hood River, Aug. 3.—Fire which destroyed the mill at Ditch creek Saturday has been raging two days in the Oak Grove district and a number of orchard homes have been endangered. Fortunately few trees have been destroyed, a large number of orchardists having turned out to fight the fire. Owing to the flames destroying the flume, several orchards are without irrigation water. Late Monday it was reported that the fire was under control.

Boy Dies of Bullet Wound; Was Accident

Houliam, Wash., Aug. 3.—Earl Sawyer, aged 14, died here Monday from a bullet wound, accidentally inflicted Sunday afternoon when he and Raymond Hess, both route carriers for the Washingtonian, went out hunting. Sawyer dropped the supply of cartridges accidentally over a cliff. He jumped down after them. Hess handed him the barrel of a rifle to assist him to climb up. A shot in the gun was discharged, piercing Sawyer's right lung.

Word 'Americanism' To Be Put in All of Coast-Made Garments

Labels bearing the word "Americanism" will be placed on all garments manufactured by tailoring firms of the Pacific coast in place of the union label, according to a statement made by Samuel G. Levy, president of the Merchant Tailors' Association of the Pacific coast, at the members' forum luncheon of the Chamber of Commerce Monday.

Open shop has been placed in effect among the merchant tailors of the Pacific coast after an eight months' struggle. Levy told of this struggle and advised business men to organize for future emergencies.

Captain William D. Southwick of the United States Chamber of Commerce, Charles F. McWilliams of Shanghai, China, and Dr. Rufus P. Kinsman, president of the University of Arizona, were among the guests of the chamber and were introduced to the members' forum. George L. Logan, American consul at Penang, Straits Settlements, spoke on trade relations between Pacific ports and the Malay peninsula.

Toledo Reports 93 Cases on Calendar

Toledo, Aug. 3.—Circuit court has convened here for the regular August term, with Judge Skipworth of Eugene on the bench. There are 93 cases on the docket and it is expected the grand jury will return several indictments.

The first jury trial was the damage suit of Clarence Gardner against F. N. Mewhirter. Mewhirter was found guilty of having struck Gardner with a club during the summer of 1917, fracturing his left arm. Gardner was awarded \$400 damages and \$100 for medical services.

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WINSTON CHURCHILL ATTACKED FOR VIEW

London, Aug. 3.—A vigorous attack was made in the house of commons Monday on Winston Spencer Churchill, minister of war, in connection with his article in the Evening News last week. Churchill suggested that Germany be utilized to stem the successful advance of the armies of the soviet government against Poland.

Premier Lloyd-George disclaimed responsibility for the personal view of his colleague, which he declared was never intended to represent the policy of the cabinet. The article was in no way objectionable to the cabinet and was regarded as "a hankering rather than an expression of policy."

The premier staved off numerous questions until the motion of Charles Palmer to adjourn the house to consider the matter was defeated 124 to 32.

Truck Driver Takes 100 Foot Plunge to Save Others' Lives

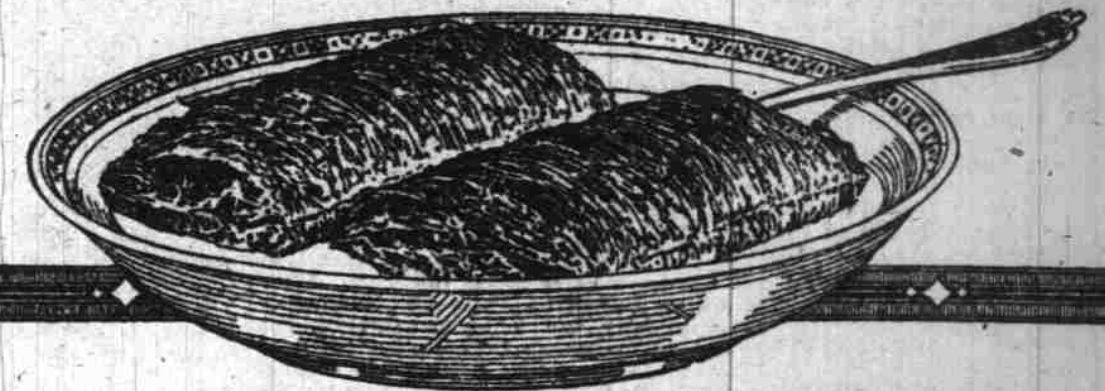

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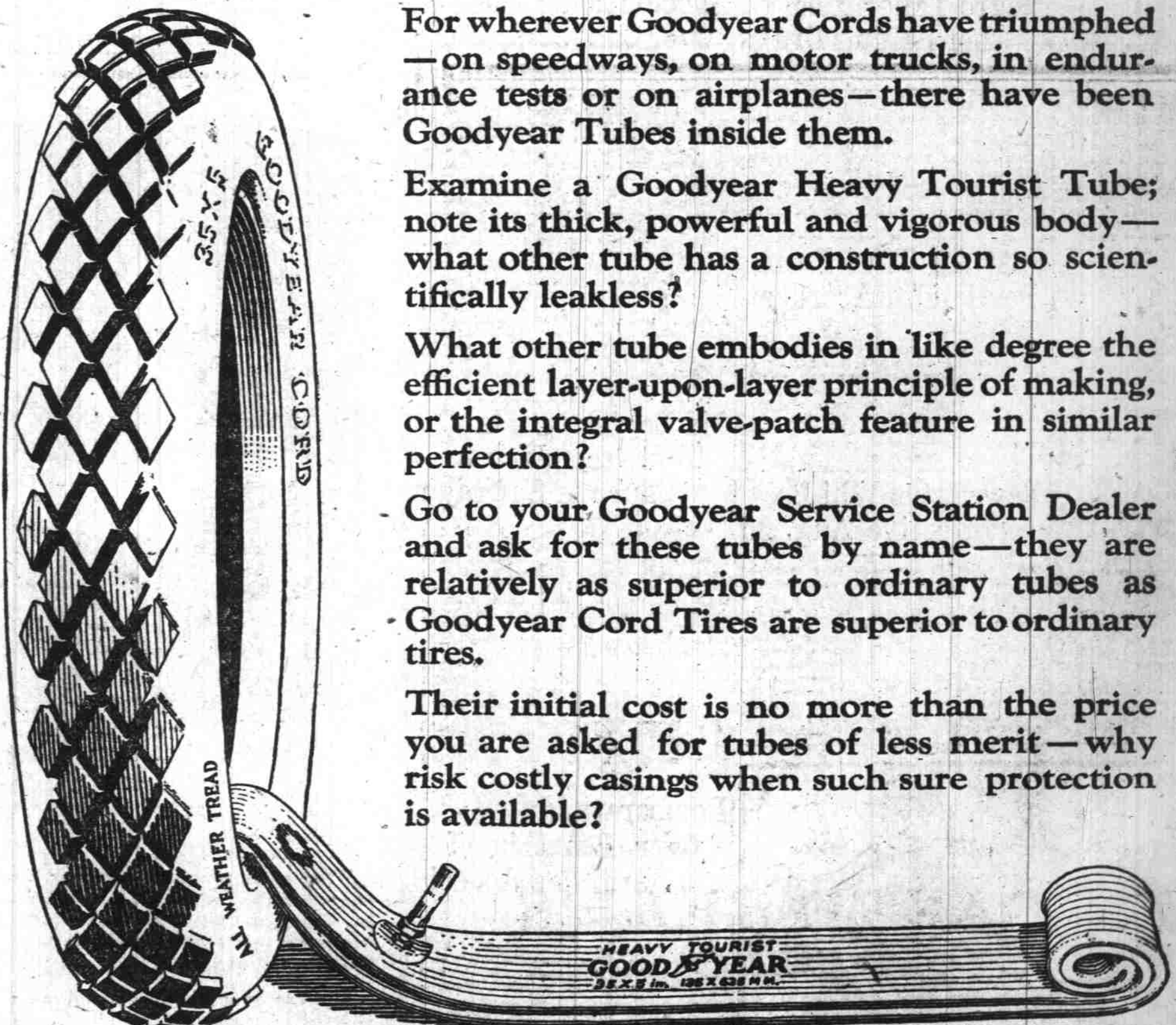
