

GERMAN TROOPS DECLARED READY TO PROTECT BOUNDARY

Paris, Aug. 3.—The German government will send troops to the Polish frontier if their presence is considered necessary to protect East Prussia against the warfare between the Poles and the Russians, the French government was informed today.

A note addressed to the allies stated that the commissioner at Allenstein, in East Prussia, had been given authority to move forces to the border. The note said that the order was issued in default of a reply from the allies to the previous request of Germany that she be allowed to send troops.

GERMAN'S APPEAL
This request, which was sent on July 21, insisted that the Russo-Polish disturbances made it imperative that protection be established.

Since the council of ambassadors was not in session, because of a vacation, Dr. Goepfert, head of the German delegation in Paris, forwarded the note directly to the French government.

Word from Berlin told of reports that 5000 Poles had been driven into East Prussia, where they were disarmed by the Germans.

Scant information reached officials regarding the progress of armistice negotiations between the Poles and the Bolsheviks. Fighting continued with unabated fierceness.

TERMS ARE HARSH
Dispatches from Berlin, quoting several sources, purported to give the demands of the Bolsheviks, which amounted to absolute surrender.

Poland must submit to military occupation for five years, according to these advisers, and the Russians shall take over Poland's coal and salt mines as security for the soviet administration, after which the Poles would be allowed to choose their own form of government.

The Bolshevik spokesmen are said to have demanded further that Poland renounce claims to Vilna, Minsk, Grodno and Cholm, and surrender all war materials and 7 per cent of the country's rolling stock.

WARSAW MENACED
The fighting apparently is progressing toward Warsaw, the Polish capital, which is menaced.

"Fighting at Brody (58 miles east of Lemberg) and at Toporow is proceeding in our favor," said the communique.

"The Russian losses at Toporow were very heavy. The Bolshevik chief of staff was among those killed. Our troops have repulsed attacks along the Sereth river."

Reports received earlier in the day said Bolshevik cavalry was conducting raids 60 miles to the north of Warsaw.

The military operations of the Red armies are such as to endanger the Polish capital, and there is little news to indicate the Bolshevik advance is being checked.

CONFIDENCE REMAINS
Confidence remains, however, that terms will be offered which the Poles will find acceptable. It is believed the

Bolshevik will not endanger their chances to reestablish trade and obtain recognition by the entente governments. While the unofficial reports told of successes of the soviet armies, it was pointed out at the foreign office that representatives at this armistice meeting assembled on a date requested by the Poles, as a consequence of which the Bolshevik could not be held responsible for the delay in bringing an end to the warfare.

The allied mission remains in Warsaw and is extending all possible aid to the Polish government.

SUPPLIES UNLOADED
Supplies are being unloaded from both France and England, and are being hurried to the front.

Warsaw is reported to be overcrowded with refugees and the population is becoming alarmed as the fighting draws nearer to the city. Measures of defense are being undertaken under the direction of 600 French officers.

It is intimated here that if the Bolsheviks enter the Polish capital, Kameny and Krasin, soviet spokesmen at general pour parlors looking toward an establishment of peace, will be ordered home. Kameny arrived Monday.

Increased Freight Rates Will Lower Costs, Says Holden

Chicago, Aug. 2.—(U. P.)—Increased railway freight rates eventually will bring about a reduction in the cost of living, in the opinion of Hale Holden, president of the Chicago, Burlington & Quincy railroad.

While there may be a slight temporary increase in the prices of some commodities, predicated on the rate increase, this will be negligible, Holden said today.

The increased freight rates will allow the railroad to restore the bid efficiency in transportation and this eventually will mean faster and wider distribution of foodstuffs, fuel and other necessities," Holden said.

"Rolling stock can be improved and new cars and locomotives built. Terminal facilities can be increased, relieving freight congestion. The rate increases may be regarded very optimistically by the public, I believe."

John Francis Key's Last Grandson Dies

Baltimore, Md., Aug. 2.—(U. P.)—John Francis Key, only surviving grandson of Francis Scott Key, author of the "Star Spangled Banner," died Monday at the Confederate Soldiers' home at Pikesville, Md. He was 92 years old. Death was due to old age. He had been a patient in the infirmary at the home for six weeks. He entered the institution in 1914.

Two Rail Men Hurt When Cars Collide

Wenatchee, Wash., Aug. 3.—John Campbell, conductor, and H. M. Allen, Great Northern bridge foreman, were seriously injured at 10:15 o'clock Monday when the westbound Great Northern Oriental limited crashed into a box car at Wilson creek. The accident was due to an open switch. The injured men were brought to this city on a special train.

Harding Will Back Reclamation Plans

Pocatello, Idaho, Aug. 3.—Senator Warren G. Harding will boost for the reclamation of arid lands in the West, according to a personal letter received Monday by Major Fred Reed, secretary of the Idaho Reclamation association. The Republican nominee informed that the brevity of his reference to reclamation in his speech of acceptance does not mean he fails to recognize the importance of the work. In his letter he gives the last Republican congress credit for a great deal of reclamation work now in progress.

Speculators Not to Store Coal in Car, Commission Orders

Washington, Aug. 3.—(I. N. S.)—In an effort to stop the storage of coal in cars and to expedite the movement of coal cars, the Interstate Commerce commission issued orders today directing that "only one reconsignment" of cars could be made except at Gary, Ind., Chicago switching districts for the Great Lakes and New England points. The order further directs that \$10 per car per day be assessed after the first 48 hours the car is at its terminal point.

Coal operators had complained to the commission that cars were being held for storage purposes by speculators and the order is aimed to reduce this alleged practice.

G. O. P. BELIEVES WOMAN WILL LURE VOTE OF SISTERS

Chicago, Aug. 2.—In Miss Adah Elizabeth Bush, new head of the women's division of the Republican party, the G. O. P. leaders believe they have landed a vote-getter who will lead millions of women to the polls in November to cast a vote for Harding.

Miss Bush is also the champion insurance saleswoman of Indiana. Last year she sold more insurance than any man or woman in that state.

Immediately on her arrival, Tuesday, she will take active charge of women's activities in the Republican campaign for the United States. Heretofore Miss Bush's title has been executive secretary of the executive committee.

During the war she went to Washington as manager of the women's committee of the Council of National Defense and later was sent abroad by the Y. W. C. A. to assume charge of all American women's relief organizations except the Red Cross.

More honors were tendered women today by the Republicans when Mrs. Manley Fossee of Minneapolis was appointed joint chairman of the speakers' bureau for the coming campaign with Senator Harry S. New of Indiana.

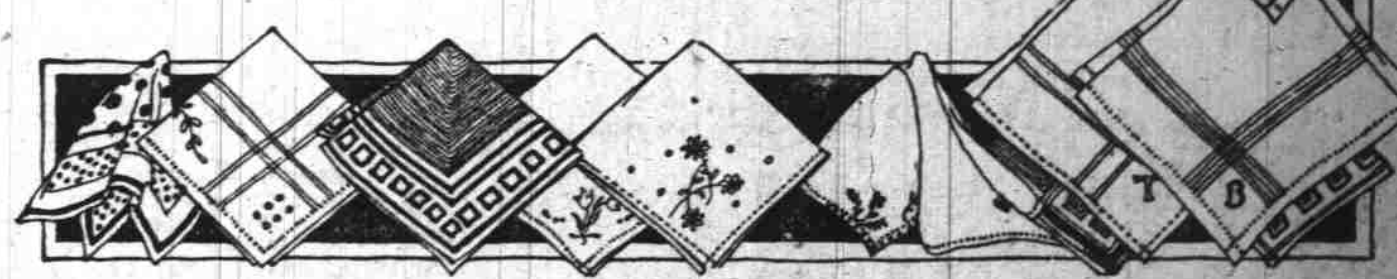
