'Tex' Rickard Has Lease on Madison Square Garden, N. Y.

New York, Aug. 7.—George Louis (Tex) Rickard, promoter of heavyweight championship contests has closed a deal with the New York Life Insurance company for the leasing of the biggest amphitheatre in New York city, namely, Madison Square Garden, covering a period of 10 years. Mr. Rickard took possession of the place August 1.

Coincidental with the announcement of Rickard's lease came the further news that he had resigned as official manager of the International Sporting Club. While it could not be ascertained just how much money was involved in the transaction, it is understood that under the terms of the agreement the well-known fight promoter was required to put up an advance rent guarantee of \$200,000 in order to bind the lease.

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Northwest Is Found Ripe Field for Work In Boy Scout Lines

C. K. Warner, national field executive of the Boy Scouts of America, his territory including Oregon, Washington, Idaho and Montana, was a Portland visitor Wednesday. The United States has been divided into 13 districts with a national field executive in each district, whose work it will be to organize and develop Boy Scout work. Warner, who makes his headquarters in Spokane, has been in his new field only since July 15 and is making his first tour of his territory.

"I am amazed at the demand of the Northwest for scout work," said Warner. "Already I have had requests from Eugene, Astoria, Vancouver and Twin Falls, Idaho, to install the work. The West is doing now only about 50 per cent of the amount of scout work that the East is doing in proportion to its population, but I believe when the work gets going you are going to give the East and Middle West a good race."

"The scarcity of men of the right type for leaders is one of the greatest hindrances to the movement, but they must be executives and they must love humanity. I think Louisville, Kentucky, holds the record for men who have caught the vision of the movement and are really devoting time regularly to the work. There are 674 men in that city who devote at least two hours a week to guiding the boyhood of that city along scout lines."
