

WOMEN DOUBTFUL ABOUT 2 PARTIES, SAYS LAWRENCE

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Columbus, Ohio, Aug. 5.—Women are sometimes supposed to arrive at conclusions by intuition, but whatever is at the bottom of it the fact is several suffragist leaders, who are keeping a close watch on Governor Cox and Senator Harding, only say the Republican and Democratic candidates for the presidency either separately or together can furnish the necessary state to make valid the nineteenth amendment, enfranchising the women of the country.

The suffrage leaders make out a circumstantial case tending to show that they are the victims of political chicanery, and if Tennessee does not ratify the amendment, they will not hesitate to place the blame where they think it should be placed.

PARTIES SUSPECTED

The women have expressed suspicion about the sincerity of both the Republican and Democratic efforts to get the suffrage amendment ratified.

Complaint is made that the Republicans in the senate could have furnished the extra vote to get the amendment through the session of congress in which the Democrats last exercised control, and that more time would have thus been available to get the approval of state legislatures before the presidential election. It is declared, for instance, that Senator Hall of Maine, Republican, could have voted for suffrage as easily when the Democrats had control as when the Republicans came into power a few months later.

But the quarrel of the suffrage leaders is not with the Republicans for that but with the Republican campaign managers this year, who, it is charged, have been able whenever they wanted to say the word to get ratification through either Vermont or Connecticut legislatures, but have feared the woman vote on the League of Nations might swing to Governor Cox.

To some extent the same sort of talk is heard among Democrats who say the Republicans have it in their power to ratify the suffrage amendment. But the women are not altogether positive that there is not some inner influence among the Democrats, too, which might be really happy if the Tennessee legisla-

ture, or any other for that matter, failed to furnish the necessary vote.

WET ISSUE ARISES

It is whispered, for instance, that the Democrats are afraid the women might oppose Governor Cox for his alleged views in favor of a modification of the prohibition laws. On the other hand, the women are voting in New York state for president, and Charlie Murphy was more than eager to have a wet candidate on the presidential ticket this year and is said to be coquise of carrying New York state for the Democratic ticket.

The suffrage leaders have camped on the doorstep of both the Republican and Democratic nominees for the presidency. They insist that Governor Cox can control the Democrats in the Tennessee legislature, and that Senator Harding can influence the Republican members. Thus far the women leaders credit the effort has been more or less perfunctory.

GOAL ANTICIPATED

What they would really like would be for the two presidential candidates to play the same old-fashioned pre-war politics, which they believe will be played to get the masculine support in vital states—namely, promises of reward later on and all that sort of thing. The president and candidates for the presidency do not hesitate to use patronage to get results, and the suffrage leaders, while scorning such tactics as highly distasteful, nevertheless recognize those methods as effective ones in practical politics. The suffrage leaders are tired of resolutions, pledges and public statements assuring support for the nineteenth amendment. What they want is the old, practical politics, and if the two candidates for the presidency don't succeed in winning a sufficient number of legislators in Tennessee there will be loud murmurs and pointed fingers of disapproval with respect to Governor Cox or Senator Harding, or both, before another week has passed.

Roosevelt to Speak For Republicans in Moonshine District

U. S. SEEKS FAIR CHANCE FOR OIL

Non-partisans Are Busy Organizing Throughout Idaho

Moscow, Idaho, Aug. 5.—An aggressive campaign to line up every farmer in Idaho with all of the laboring men of the state, is being made by the Non-partisan league, which is doing more work than any other political organization in this state now. A large tent, similar to those used for small circuses and camp meetings has been bought by the league and is being used for meetings in bad weather. The tent is to visit every county in Idaho and meetings will be held in all centers of population. For several weeks the "tent meetings," as they are advertised, have been held in Southern Idaho, but now activity is to be transferred to the "panhandle" and every North Idaho county will be invaded.

The schedule of tent meetings for this part of Idaho includes Bonanza Ferry, Sand Point, Priest River, Rathdrum, Coeur d'Alene, St. Maries, De Smet, Potlatch, Troy, Genesee, Kendrick, Lewiston and Moscow.

A. C. Townley, national head of the league, will speak at Moscow and Lewiston, it is announced. Townley's conviction on a charge of disloyalty and obstruction of the Minnesota courts. He is under jail sentence but has appealed the case.
