

RHODE ISLAND HAS 604,397 IN CENSUS FIGURES FOR 1920

Washington, Aug. 6.—The 1920 population of Rhode Island is 604,397, an increase since 1910 of 51,787, or 11.4 per cent, the census bureau announced today.

La Salle county, including Streator, and La Salle, Ill., 1920 population, 52,935; increase since 1910, 3,709, or 7.1 per cent. Mahoning county, including Youngstown, Ohio, 1920 population, 166,310; increase since 1910, 70,158, or 42.4 per cent. Chatham county, Washington, 11,368; increase, 413, or 3.7 per cent. War Plot Suspect Arrested Following Country-Wide Hunt

Chicago, Aug. 6.—(I. N. S.)—A two-year search by federal agents, which extended from the rocky retreats of the Catskill mountains to the slums of large cities, ended here Thursday with the capture of John Alexander, alias John La Granch, wanted in connection with war plots and the distribution of Red literature since the armistice.

Alexander was taken in a Hudson street apartment by members of the police bomb squad. Chief Immigration Inspector Harry Landis said it was the "most important anarchist arrest since the war."

1800 Employees of O-W. R. & N. Sign To Attend Picnic

Over 1800 employees of the O-W. R. & N. at Portland have signed up for the fourth annual picnic of the Employees club, which will be held at Bonaventure, Sunday. Arrangements have already been made for the operation of three special trains, two from Portland and one from The Dalles. Probably more

than 50 passenger coaches will be necessary to handle the crowd out of Portland.

Provision is being made for the handling of the largest crowd in the history of the annual picnics of the O-W. Employees of the O-W. at The Dalles, Hood River and intermediate points will join the Portland employees.

While Cops Watch One Store, Thieves Steal From Another

Walla Walla, Wash., Aug. 6.—Thieves robbed the Hockley drug store of a quantity of ice cream and \$10 in cash while the city police lay in wait for a clothing store farther down the street. The police had stationed themselves at the store where a pane of glass was being replaced. The thieves, who it would just hold in place. Guardsmen to Aid During the Harvest

Salem, Aug. 6.—That members of the Oregon National guard may assist in the harvest fields without losing credit for attendance at drill, all organization commanders have been notified to suspend drills during the harvest season, according to announcement by Adjutant General White this morning. The order is made by authority of the war department at Washington. Extra drills will be held during September and October to make up time lost.

Albany Resident Dead at Aberdeen

Aberdeen, Wash., Aug. 6.—John Daly, formerly a resident of Albany, Ore., suddenly became sick here on the street Wednesday night at 10 o'clock and was removed to a local hotel, where he died a few minutes afterward. He was about 80 years old. An effort is being made to locate his relatives.

CIGARETTE CAUSE OF DEATHS IN FIRE

Cincinnati, Ohio, Aug. 6.—Several members of the Cincinnati fire department were killed and another probably fatally burned in a fire and series of explosions at the plant of the Refiners' Oil company, late Thursday.

One unidentified body was received at the morgue. Lieutenant Fred Hotel of ladder company No. 8 is among the known dead. A cigarette stump thrown in the yard of the refining plant is believed to have caused the fire.

River Island Is Raided and Gives Up Moonshine

Salem, Aug. 6.—H. H. Buckner was arrested as a "moonshiner," some 40 gallons of liquor was confiscated, and an old-fashioned 80-gallon capacity still demolished in a raid on Tices island near Independence Wednesday night by six federal officers assisted by Sheriff Needham and deputies. The find is believed to have uncovered the source of

much of the liquor that has been sold in this section for some time. The still was cleverly concealed on the island and the operators are said to have been protected in their illicit trade through a system of signals. Two gallons of the moonshine was brought in with the prisoners and the remainder of the liquor was dumped into the river.

Man Swims Out to Rescue Lad's Toy And Is Drowned

Vancouver, B. C., Aug. 6.—(I. N. S.)—Because Sylvanus G. Thompson, 21, of Oakland, Cal., threw his little nephew's toy boat out into deep water at Myrtle

Point, the young man's body awaits an inquest. The two were bathing yesterday afternoon. Thompson swam out to recover the boat. He succeeded but immediately sank. He was dead when taken out five minutes later.

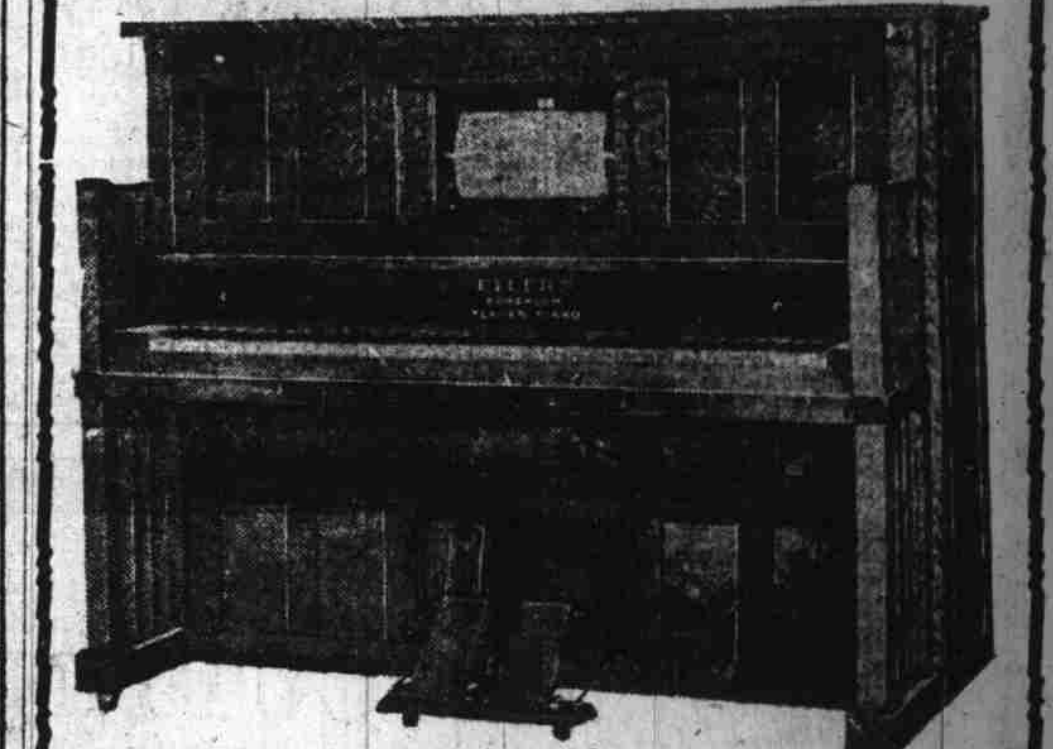
