Beaver Clan Moves Up to Third Place

Double Victory Over Angels Puts Portland Ahead of Rivals; Cox Is Hero.

DEFEATING Los Angeles in two sensational contests Saturday, 3 to 1 and 5 to 4, the Portland Beavers moved up two notches in the Coast league pennant race, and are now in third place.

Carrying the figures out six places, the Beavers—as the result of their remarkable spurt since their return home—are just .000202 of a point ahead of the Angels. "The standings are:

Dick Cox was proclaimed the hero of the day by nearly 4,000 fans who witnessed the double bill. In the seventh, with the Beavers three runs behind, Cox tripled with two men on the base, and scored a moment later, tying up the count. Costarring with Cox was "Big" Schaller, who doubled, scoring two runs in the eighth.

FOUR TWILERS USED

Boss Walter McCredie used every twirler, except Harold Polson, who pitched the Beavers to a sensational 15 inning victory over the Angels Friday. Four twirlers were used in the second game, two of them breaking into the box score in the ninth inning, when the Angels rallied.

Manager Killefer of the Angels used two pitchers in each game, two southpaws—Thomas and Brown—working the first contest, and Hughes and Crandall hurling the second battle.

KALLO SHOWS CLASS

Rudy Kallo worked the first game for the Beavers and the local hurler pitched one of the best games he has turned in this season. He set the Angels down with four hits, the lone run off his delivery being scored on Crandall's walk. McCredie's double and an infield out. He was accorded great support by his mates.

Sam Ross started to southpaw for the Beavers in the second game, but was not in the best of form. He was very wobbly, and after the Angels had scored once in the fourth and twice in the fifth—not on clean baseball, but loose playing and pitching—McCredie put Glasier in the fray. Glasier went along nicely until the ninth inning, when after disposing of Crawford he allowed Lapan to hit safely to center and passed Crandall. Brooks was rushed to his rescue and McCredie was out at first base. Brooks named Basler, who batted for Niehoff, and also walked Crandall, forcing in a run.

SUDS SAVES BATTLE

This caused Manager Mac to squirm on the bench and Sutherland, who rushed into the battle, and, with the aid of Koehler, who picked a foul fly off Statz' bat, ended the battle.

It did not take the Beavers long to sew up the first game. Paddy Siglin cracked one of Hughes' first offerings for a double to right field. Westralier was hit by a pitched ball, and a foul sacrifice and was safe on fielders' choice when Thomas threw wild to Niehoff to catch Siglin. Paddy and Westralier both scoring and Maisei going to second while the former Giant was chasing the ball. Blue sacrificed and Schaller drove Maisei over with a single to right field, Siglin going out trying to stretch the hit into a double.

KALLO THERE A MILLION

The Beavers filled the bases in the fourth and sixth innings, but could not put a run across. Spranger and Kallo failing on the first occasion and a great catch by Basler of a foul ball from Ross' bat practically killing all chances to score in the sixth. The Beavers were not outed up just right in this inning.

After the Angels put across their run in the fifth inning they did not have a chance against Killo. During the last four innings only two runners reached first base. Rudy was sure the candy kid.

Los Angeles threatened to score in the first inning of the second game when Zeider got a freak double to right field and took third on Cox's error. He was caught at the plate by Maisei on Killefer's short fly to center field.

In the fourth, Ross walked Zeider and then threw wild in an effort to catch him off first base. Killefer bunted safely down the third base line and Zeider, thinking Westralier was going to make a throw to first, bluffed and Rolie was caught between third and home, but was declared safe by Byron after he had ducked past Koehler. The Beavers left the home plate unguarded.

BOYER HURTS ANGELS

In the third frame, Lapan singled down the third base line and Crandall walked. McCredie sacrificed and Crandall pulled a boner by trying to steal third and was thrown out before he got back to second. Niehoff walked and Hughes dropped a double between Maisei and Niehoff. Schaller, scoring Lapan and Niehoff. Statz singled to center, but on an attempted double steal Hughes was out at the plate.

Hughes was going great against the Beavers, allowing but three hits until the seventh. The great catch by Karl Crandall pulled the Angels out of a bad mess in the first. Siglin being the first to get on the base, and Crandall's short liner by running backwards.

COX COMES THROUGH

In the seventh inning, Blue drew a walk, the first allowed by Hughes. Schaller was hit on the shoulder with a pitched ball and Cox drove both of them across the plate with a triple to the left center field fence. It was a solid smash and Dick reached third base with a great slide. From the press box, it looked as though Cox slid under Niehoff's glove, but Manager Killefer protested loudly and then justified. Umpire Anderson and was chased out of the contest.

Koehler's long fly to Statz, who moved over to center, allowed Cox to score easily. Spranger popped out and Glasier made his second hit, a double to left field, but Paddy could not hit Crandall, who replaced Hughes.

Maisei beat out a scratch hit, his attempt to sacrifice being a little pop-up, which fell between Ote Crandall, who had been rushed into the fray after Glasier doubled, Niehoff and Dasser. Blue was out for bunting on the third strike, and then Schaller dropped a double into left field.

It looked bright for the Beavers until the near blow-up in the ninth. There will be a doubleheader this afternoon at 1:30 o'clock. Sutherland and Brooks being carded to pitch for the Mackmen, while Crandall and Brown will likely work for Los Angeles. The scores:
