Mrs. Richards Is County Nurses' Hostess at Picnic Supper Saturday

Work in Rural Districts, Topic

AN interesting event of the week was the picnic supper given Saturday evening at Peninsula park in honor of Mrs. Bessie Richards of Linnton, delegate to the Democratic national convention at San Francisco. Following the supper Mrs. Richards gave a resume of her work as a delegate to the convention. She was the only Oregon delegate recognized by the chair and had the honor to second the nomination of Franklin D. Roosevelt as vice president. She was warmly applauded and received the personal commendation of Homer S. Cummings, national Democratic chairman; Mrs. George Bass, national Democratic committeewoman; Secretary Daniels and Miss Fay, national committeewoman from California.

Mrs. Richards was the guest of honor at a luncheon given by supporters of John W. Davis and at a luncheon given by Mrs. Percy MacGill at the Palace hotel and she was a speaker at a meeting from all sections of the United States, who were pledged to William G. McAdoo for president.

George A. Laughlin, a West Virginia newspaperman, who contributed daily letters of a gossipy nature to his home paper, gave Mrs. Richards a half column sketch in which he commented upon her fight for the seating of a delegate whose right was contested, saying: "If more women of the type of Mrs. Richards engage in the political game, politics will be made better and cleaner and the wisdom of establishing equal suffrage will be justified."

A large crowd at the birthday celebration of the St. John W. C. T. U. last Monday listened to a fine address by the state president, Mrs. M. M. Sleeth. This is one of the oldest and most active organizations in the state and plans to "go over the top" with its jubilee plans before the state convention.

The last state board meeting of the W. C. T. U. outline plans for the state convention to be held in this city September 23 and 30 and October 1 were made. The presence of Mrs. Harris Atwood, the most widely known lecturer in the organization, is of great interest to members and all women interested in the welfare of women's work. Mrs. Atwood comes from Scotland where she visited the larger cities on a lecture tour after the world's convention in London. She will be in the convention September 20, afternoon and evening. The present plan is to hold a banquet in her honor in the convention church.

Baker W. C. T. U. is one of the most active of the far eastern organizations. They have just sent in \$100 to make Mrs. Alice Palmer a life member in the national organization.

The attention accorded Dr. Kohs, psychologist, court of domestic relations, by the members of the Business Women's club at their luncheon on Thursday, demonstrated their interest in his subject of Social and Business Efficiency.
