How Actress Makes Waffles Mollie Malone Says They're Good

Is there a man with appetite so blasé that he does not enjoy good waffles? Mollie Malone, screen actress, maintains there is not, and that the surest way to a man's heart is by feeding him plenty of delicious, fluffy waffles—provided you have the best recipe on earth to make them from, and Miss Malone says she has. However, she insists that she isn't a cook, but there are two things she can make—and make well. "I believe it's better to make even two things well than many things badly," she philosophized. "It took me a long time to find this waffle recipe, because I selected it from a number of others. Lots of people think they can make waffles, and lots of

cook books print recipes how to make them, but this is the only one that never fails." Here are the two things Mollie Malone can make to perfection:
Fairy Leaf Cake—Three fourth cup of butter, 1 1/4 cups of sugar, 1/2 cup milk, 4 eggs, 2 1/2 cups of flour, 2 teaspoons of baking powder. Cream butter and sugar, add beaten egg yolks. Mix, then add dry ingredients alternately. Fold in egg whites. Flavor to taste and bake in moderate oven 40 minutes.
Waffles: Two cups flour, 1 teaspoon baking powder, 1 1/4 cups milk, 1 teaspoon melted butter, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 3 eggs, beaten separately. Fold in whites. Bake in waffle iron, well greased.

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WHAT'S IN A NAME?

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Alice, curiously enough, is a man's name, not a woman's. Originally it was given to the sons of the family, and is, without doubt, derived from the Anglo-Saxon Adelgis, of which the feminine form was Adelgisa. It means noble, in both its masculine and feminine form. It is clear that Alice represents Adelgisa and not Adelgisa, and that the proper feminine form would be Alisa. Some believe that Eliza, generally thought to be a derivative of Elizabeth, is this misapprehension. For proof of Alisa as the representative of Adelgisa, the Liber Vitae of Durham records the changes of Adelgisa from the first noble lady of that name who laid her gifts upon the altar. By contraction, it became by steps Adelisa, Alisa and Alia.

Alice is still given to daughters of noble families in Europe. Adalia, Adiza and finally Aliz, are other contractions. Aliza is a derivative which represents an effort at euphony, ending in Alisa, but Alisa is not so derived as is popularly supposed, but has a completely different origin.

Alice is purely English, with a slight Teutonic flavor, since another explanation of its origin is that the name is derived from the feminine Adalith or Adalich, signifying "daughter" in Frankland. Aliz or Alisa in Lombardy was naturalized in England when Aliz Belle married Henry I.

Alexandrite is the talismanic stone of Alice. It is found in the emerald mines of Russia, and its splendid green, which changes pulsatingly to columbine red, makes it the white hawthorn, which means hope.

Alice has been surrounded traditionally by all the virtues and simplicity which man is supposed to desire in woman. Indeed, the name is poetically synonymous with "true blue." It has been immortalized in the old song "Ben Bolt":

"Oh, do you remember sweet Alice, Ben Bolt,
Who thrilled with half so brown;
And trembled with fear at your frown?"
