

OREGON'S LUMBER CAR SHIPMENTS SHOW AN INCREASE

Cargo shipments of lumber from Oregon during the first six months of 1920 totaled 344,469,202 feet compared with 192,224,992 feet for the first six months of 1919, a gain of 152,244,210 feet, according to records of the Pacific Lumber Inspection bureau submitted by Robert B. Allen, secretary of the West Coast Lumbermen's association.

Total water shipments from the Pacific Northwest for the first six months of this year amounted to 845,235,524 feet compared with a total of 544,429,511 feet during the first six months of last year, a gain of 300,806,013 feet.

Nearly 27,000,000 feet of the cargo shipments went to the Hawaiian islands and approximately 6,000,000 feet to Alaska.

CHINA HEAVY BUYER

China was the largest foreign buyer for the six months period, taking 77,900,000 feet, compared with 31,239,000

feet during the first six months of last year. Japan comes next with purchases amounting to over 65,000,000 feet compared with slightly over 4,000,000 feet for the first six months in 1919. Australia bought 55,733,800 feet compared with 20,690,725 feet during the 1919 period, and shipments to the west coast of South America for the first six months of the current year amounted to 41,831,333 feet compared with 15,753,745 feet for the first half of 1919.

Denver Avenue Is Name Selected by Ballot of People

By a majority of about three to two, residents of Derby street and Denver avenue have decided that the streets shall hereafter be known by the one name of Denver avenue.

It would hardly be fair to say that any of the Derbyites voted for a change of name, as they were unanimous in the demand that Derby be used throughout, according to George A. Rhea, appraiser for the department of public works, who has been conducting the delicate plebiscite for the last three weeks.

The matter was finally settled on the vote by front footage on the two streets. Denver's footage is 12,423, and property owners for 290 feet, or 23.5 per cent of the total footage of both streets voted for Denver. Derby's front footage is 11,432 feet, and owners for 4263 feet, or 22.2 per cent of the total, voted Derby. A total frontage of 11,433 feet, or 69.5 per cent, was voted. Owners of 930 front footage, or 4.9 per cent of the total, voted favorable to either name.

Commissioner Barber will take the matter before the council Wednesday with recommendation that an ordinance be prepared naming the whole route Denver avenue. This is one of the two approaches to the Interstate bridge in North Portland.

South Aberdeen Store Robbed
Aberdeen, Wash., Aug. 11.—Safe blowers here last night took from the Workmen's store in South Aberdeen \$50 in cash and several hundred dollars' worth of Liberty bonds. Police believe the men are the same who blew open a safe at Bay City a month ago, making a large haul.

WOMEN RETURNING FROM VACATIONS FOR PARTY WORK

Vacation delights are giving place to political activity among democratic women folk, and campaign headquarters expects within a few days to welcome several prominent women back to their tasks.

Dr. C. J. Smith, chairman of the Democratic state central committee, has received word from Dr. Esther Pohl Lovejoy that she is en route home from New York, where she has been concluding her wartime activities in anticipation of her congressional campaign. Mrs. Lovejoy left New York Tuesday morning and will arrive in Portland late in the week.

Meanwhile word has come from Mrs. Carrie C. Van Orsdal who has been enjoying a rest in California, that she will be right in the game again in a few days, and Vice Chairman Mrs. Ida V. Jontz, former general secretary of the Y. W. C. A., has taken a break at the Democratic headquarters in the Morgan building and there will have an active part in the campaign. Headquarters, its occupants aver, is besieged by Coos Bay folk, who want Franklin D. Roosevelt to spend another day in Oregon and speak at Marshfield. The possibility of such an extension of Roosevelt's visit has not yet been determined, though Dr. Smith has taken the matter up with the vice-presidential nominee.

Dairymen's League Sues Brownings for Money Alleged Due

The Oregon Dairymen's Cooperative league filed suits on Tuesday against

Ben and Albert Browning and A. J. Browning in which it seeks judgments for amounts claimed due for advances on account. In the first case the claim is made that \$789.16 was advanced and there still remains unpaid the sum of \$299.50. In the suit against A. J. Browning it is claimed that advances of \$359.95 were made and there has been no repayment. These advances were for feed, milk transportation, etc.

Circuit Judge Kavanaugh Tuesday set for August 20 the hearing for making permanent the temporary injunction obtained last week by the Oregon Cooperative Dairymen's league against various milk distributors. The league contended that the distributors were using newspaper advertising space and other agencies to create the impression that the producers were responsible for recent advances in milk prices.

Mayor Baker probably will be able to announce the personnel of his commission to investigate the local milk situation and reach an adjustment between the distributors and milk dealers by Friday of this week, he announced Tuesday morning.

Women's Apparel Thief's Specialty, Police Informed

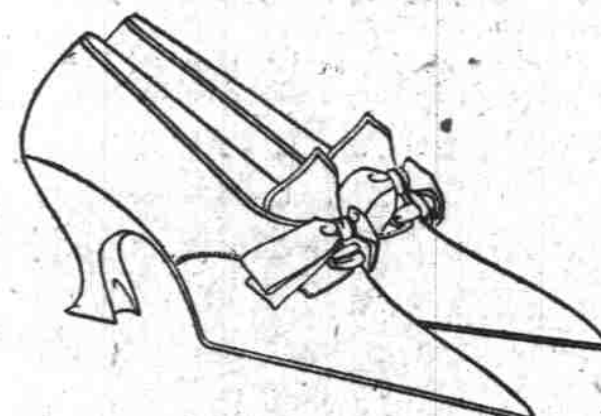
