

JUDGE TUCKER AND HUMANE SOCIETY ARE BENEFICIARIES

The home place of the late Mrs. Angeline Berry, who died in Portland August 4, is given to Judge and Mrs. Robert Tucker by the provisions of the will, filed Wednesday for probate. The will was drawn for Mrs. Berry by Attorney Earl C. Bronough.

The estate consists of real property of the approximate value of \$50,000 and about \$500 worth of personal effects. Judge Tucker, Raymond G. Jubitz and the Title & Trust company are made the executors.

In the will Judge Tucker is designated as one "who has been my trusted advisor and counselor," and his wife, Mrs. Gertrude Tucker, as "my true and trusted friend." Mrs. Berry declares that "out of desire to manifest my appreciation of their many kindnesses to me," the bequest is made of the home place, lots 1 and 2 of block 321, Burrell's addition to East Portland.

A bequest of \$8000 is made to the Domestic and Foreign Missions society of America, for the purpose of sustaining Bible readers in China and Japan, and some other small bequests are made in the will.

The remainder of the property is to be placed in a trust for the Oregon Humane society, for the purpose of providing for the employment of a competent, experienced traveling agent for Oregon to organize humane work and to provide annual prizes for school children of Portland for essays on humane work.

Mrs. Berry was one of the organizers of the Oregon Humane society and took a deep interest in its work. She was also connected with other humanitarian and welfare work for many years, helped organize the Portland Y. W. C. A. and to raise funds for its building and was the builder of Grace Memorial Episcopal church.

Judge Tucker was formerly president of the Oregon Humane society.

Fatal Elton Fire Prompts Mayor to Investigate Dangers

Commenting on the Elton Court fire last Saturday morning, as a result of which four persons lost their lives, Mayor Baker, in a communication Wednesday reminded the council of the necessity for a comprehensive plan of correcting conditions responsible for the fire.

Something had been left undone by the city, the mayor said, which resulted in a fire with such dire results occurring, and suggested that in the case of other legislation for safety, the important feature of safeguarding against fires may have been overlooked.

While apartments, hotels and rooming

houses, the communication said, should not be burdened with too heavy expense in making changes in the nature of safeguarding, something should be done to correct the conditions in many places similar to those in the structure ravaged by the flames.

The mayor recommended that the fire marshal be instructed to make a complete investigation and report to the council with recommendations of what could be done to eliminate some of these conditions.

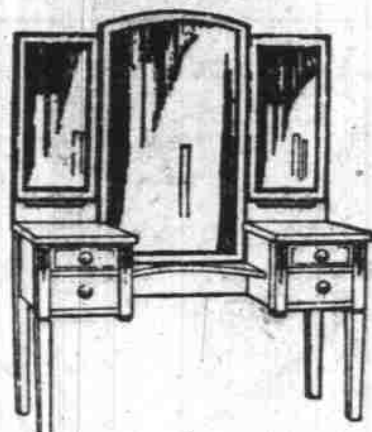

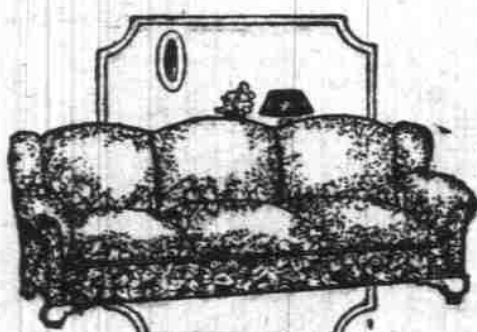

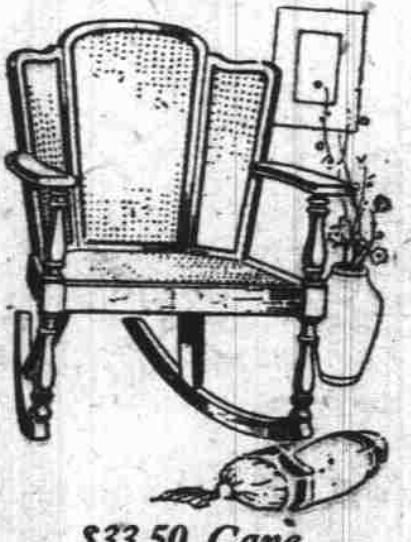
