

BUY APPLES BY BOX FOR SAVING

Apples are now arriving with rather favorable quality for early stock. The fruit is getting sweeter, and for that reason will not need so much sugar for cooking. Prices are very moderate and it would be advisable to secure a box because that is the way they can be purchased at the lowest price.

Apricots from the Wenatchee section are arriving. This stock, while of small size, is of good quality. The fruit is packed in 15 pound boxes and sells in the retail shops around \$2.50@2.75 per box.

A few small lots of Southern Oregon peaches are arriving, but total supplies are limited as they are keeping prices about as high as during the last week.

Fresh prunes are reaching the market in fair supply and they are very sweet and of good size.

Time for putting up crab apples has arrived. Consumers should get busy because quality is now good and prices are about as low as they usually go.

Cantaloupes are selling very low—down to 5c each for good stock. They're sweet, too.

Watermelons are cheaper and are now within the purse of most people.

Consumers have been paying higher prices for tomatoes and other vegetables on the public market than in many of the retail shops which pay rent. This has not only applied to tomatoes, where profits of fully 100 per cent are shown, but in other lines of vegetables prices have been held extremely high.

It has been noted that since the maximum prices were discontinued on the public market, sellers there are taking advantage of the situation. An effort is being made to reestablish maximum prices.

The following prices are averages and consumers are expected to pay retail stores. Qual-

ity quoted is average, fancy stuff being slightly higher and inferior stuff fractionally lower.

Father Sees Child Hurlled to Street; Injuries Said Few

In full view of his father, who sat in an automobile parked double on Yamhill street between Fifth and Sixth streets, 8-year-old Andrew C. Baker of Oregon City was knocked down by a machine driven by J. A. Harbour of Garden Home, Or., at 2 p. m., Thursday. The boy had alighted from his father's machine and started across the street. When his mother, standing on the sidewalk near the family car, called to him. He turned back directly in front of the car driven by Harbour, who told the police he could not turn to one side because of the parked automobiles.

When the boy was struck, his father and pedestrians who saw it believed, the boy had been killed. However, he helped himself up and ran over to his father's machine. He was taken to Dr. O. W. Spencer, in the Seiling building, where his injuries were treated. The boy's father reported to the police that he was suffering with a bruised side which might cause some later developments. The driver was exonerated following a report by Investigator Freiburg of the police traffic bureau.

Standifer Shipyard Accepts Contracts For 2 More Tankers

Thursday night R. V. Jones, vice president of the Standifer Construction corporation, announced the acceptance of

contracts to build two 12,000-ton tankers for the Imperial Oil company, Ltd., of Toronto, which is subsidiary to the Standard Oil company of New Jersey.

Construction will start as soon as materials can be procured and deliveries are promised late next spring. The three Standard Oil tankers now under

construction at Vancouver will be completed by the end of this year. Work will start on the new orders before the finishing touches are made on the present order.
