

BERLIN IS AIDING SOVIET, PRESIDENT POINCARÉ BELIEVES

"If we do not take care, all that was accomplished at Versailles will be destroyed at Warsaw," is the warning voiced by former President Poincaré of France...

Germany is carefully profiting by the indulgent respite granted her at the conference at Spa. The German commission of occidental Prussia is at present zealously recruiting in the sections along the Vistula, false protests are spread against their reunion to Poland...

SPRIT OF REVENGE We find in Silesia, German officers among the Kessel troops whom we took prisoners. The students form home guards, armed with rifles, in all the German universities. The majority Socialists in the reichstag reproach the International Socialist congress for having admitted that Germany was responsible for the war...

LLOYD GEORGE'S PLANS This is the moment chosen by several English newspapers to call upon Lloyd George to conduct the allies to a new international conference, or rather, a general congress of Europe, to which, of course, the soviets and the Germans would be admitted...

Interpretation of the will of Lloyd George, but it is certain on the other hand, that since the invitation to Tripoli, he has not varied from his idea to engage in conversation with the Bolsheviks...

A DANGEROUS CHAMBER Did this admitted desire accompany a more discreet thought, and did he dream of a vast congress in which, under his presidency, England would signify to the universe a new and easier peace for Germany?

I do not know. I even wish to believe that the papers which attributed this plan to him and compliment him upon it, misjudge his intentions and burlesque his policies; however, Lloyd George is a chamber, who, sometimes by seduction and sometimes by playful threats...

And we think we see, under his magician's hand, the treaty executed. There is nothing to assure us that, after first putting Krasin and Kamanoff in quarantine, he will not ask us to be neighborly with them and with Dr. von Simons, where they will try to regulate the future of Europe and Asia.

Today we find that from the slippery incline where they ventured, England and France have now arrived at the edge of the abyss. The Reds have opened the road to Teheran; Poland crushed, at the feet of the Bolsheviks; the soviet government continues with super-cleverness its plans to put us to sleep...

DUTY TO POLAND While Lloyd George was trying to hold onto the coat tails of the Bolsheviks, the latter repulsed him with disdain and told him without his wishing to look after their own affairs and were opposed to any mediation. Are the allies going to allow Poland to fall back under the slab of the sepulchre after having said in common accord: "Arise and live again in the light of the day?"

From France, from England, from America, from everywhere the exiled Poles returned to fight beside our armies for the liberties of the peoples and for their own national hopes. On the flag that Paris, Nancy, Bagert and Verdun had offered their legions, the white eagle unfolded her wings with the same pride as in other days upon the red velvet of the standard carried by the soldiers of Jagellon.

By this act the allies showed that they had themselves taken up the task of the resurrection of Poland, the nation which, in spite of a criminal dismemberment and of prolonged violence, had kept intact her traditions and her language; who had never allowed her voice to be stifled and who never allowed her claims to become obsolete, either in exile or under foreign domination...

COX IS 'PINCHED' FOR SPEEDING BY SMALL-TOWN COP

By Winder E. Harris Columbus, Ohio, Aug. 15.—Governor Cox, Democratic nominee for president, and his party, returning from Wheeling Sunday in four automobiles, were held up by motorcycle policemen on a charge of speeding in the little village of Jacksonstown, 32 miles out of Columbus.

The governor declined to be "pinched," however, and the party motored on to Columbus. The abashed policemen followed behind until they got the license numbers of all four cars and promised to have warrants served here.

Governor Cox assured them he would be glad to receive them at the state house any time they should call. Adjutant General Roy E. Layton, who accompanies the governor, declared he believed the attempted arrests were the result of a "frame-up" by local Republican officials of Jacksonstown.

"We had been warned yesterday that a group of Republican officials in Jacksonstown would lay for the governor and nail him today." The governor's party passed two men in plain clothes riding a motorcycle shortly before they reached Jacksonstown, but there was no attempt at that point to hold up the cars.

A large crowd was gathered on the corner and a man in his shirt-sleeves, probably the chief of police, who it is presumed, had been asked by the motorcycle men to stop the party, stood in the middle of the street waving one hand, pointing to his police badge with the other and shouting at the top of his voice: "Stop! Stop! You are arrested for speeding."

The governor's car moved on and the other chauffeur's car followed close behind. The motorcycle policemen then gave chase, shouting orders to stop and waving their hands as they rode past. To make certain the cars would stop, the policemen wheeled directly in front of Governor Cox's car and came to a halt.

One of them ran around to the side of the car and announced that the party was under arrest. The other three cars also had come to a stop and the newspaper men rushed up to the governor's machine. Someone informed the policemen that Governor Cox was in the first car. The

REDS SWEEPING THROUGH PERSIA

Washington, Aug. 16.—Following invasion of Poland, other soviet armies are sweeping through Persia. They threaten the subjugation of that entire country, according to advices to this government from its agents abroad.

One force of 50,000 seasoned and completely equipped troops, including Cossack cavalry, is driving in the direction of Teheran, the Persian capital, and is within 200 miles of that city. INVADERS ARE UNOPPOSED It is being effectively opposed by a poorly equipped Persian army numbering 50,000. Other soviet armies are operating in the southeastern sections of Persia.

The statement of V. Tchitcherin, foreign minister of Russia, that "until a general agreement is reached with C. at Britain the soviet has an absolutely free hand in the Orient," is interpreted by state department officials here to mean that the soviet force in lower Persia intends to drive right on through to the Afghan and Baluchistan borders.

INDIA IS MENACED Hence it will be able to command the route to India. Universal Service was informed today that Persia would be abundantly able to defend herself were it not that British domination has prevented her from obtaining arms and ammunition. Her present army is capable of expansion to 100,000 and within a few months to several times that number.

Only 6000 British troops are available to participate in the defense of Persia, even if, as Universal Service's informant expressed it today, "England showed a willingness to use them."

France Puts Claim On 1924 Olympics Paris, Aug. 16.—France has formally claimed the Olympic games for 1924.

Chicago Poles Meet In Sympathy With Brothers Overseas

Chicago, Aug. 16.—(U. N.)—Sunday was "Polish day" in Chicago. Meetings to create sympathy with Poland in its war against soviet Russia were held in 48 different places. Prayers were offered in every Polish church in the city and sermons dealt with the situation.

Throughout the afternoon and evening mass meetings, with speeches in both English and Polish, were held in various halls. There were several parades, the bands playing American and Polish national airs.

Crown Prince Knew More Than He Was Given Credit For Paris, Aug. 16.—The former Crown Prince of Germany, now plain Frederick William Hohenzollern, received a coat of whitewash from the Matin. It published, exclusively, an autographed letter, written by the former Prince three months after the United States entered the war, urging his parents to throw up the sponge, and thus save the throne and prevent untold misery, because Germany did not have a hope of winning against the United States.
