

ROOSEVELT SPEECH AT BILLINGS, MONT., IS RECEIVED WELL

Billings, Mont., Aug. 18.—(I. N. S.)—Montana Democrats were elated today over the party success following an address by Franklin D. Roosevelt, Democratic vice presidential nominee, before an outpouring of prominent Democrats here yesterday.

Roosevelt declared that the issue of the campaign is "men against dollars and progress versus obstruction."

"The League of Nations," he said, "is but an extension of the Monroe doctrine and we have never been called upon to defend that with arms. Pictures painted by critics of the league showing American boys drafted to fight the battles of European powers are lies on their face."

Roosevelt defended the administration and bitterly assailed the "senate obstructionists."

He predicted the Democrats would carry every state in the November elections if Senator Harding continued his speeches on the "ancient tariff."

"Harding's front porch plan will not go down with the people who demand personal contact with the candidates themselves," he declared.

Roosevelt will speak in Butte today.

Two Are Killed in Blasts at Rubber Plant; Five Hurt

Muskegon, Mich., Aug. 18.—(I. N. S.)—Two men are known to have been killed, and five others are believed dying and searchers are still seeking bodies of possible victims of three explosions which wrecked the rubber plant of the Brunswick-Balke Collender company here today.

Those killed and injured were caught in a fire which followed the explosions. Company officials are checking their records to establish an accurate list of killed, injured or missing.

The fire burned for two hours before it finally was placed under control.

Naval Seaplane Is Wrecked on Beach After Going Adrift

San Francisco, Aug. 18.—(I. N. S.)—Naval seaplane No. 10, which went adrift yesterday from her moorings at Gualala, is a total loss, according to reports received at naval headquarters here today.

The seaplane went ashore two miles from Fort Ross and 20 miles south of Gualala and was battered to pieces on the rough coast.

A crew is now salvaging the machinery.

Senator Lamping on Road to Recovery, Following Mishap

Olympia, Wash., Aug. 18.—(U. P.)—Senator George B. Lamping, candidate for the Republican nomination for governor, is reported on the road to recovery today at St. Peter's hospital following serious injuries sustained by the fall of a tree across his campaign automobile yesterday.

Lamping was on his way to Aberdeen with his secretary, E. W. Brailford, where he was to make a speech, when the tree struck them. Two women in an automobile behind them brought them to the hospital here.

Escaped Convict Is Shot After He Swims Almost to Safety

Folsom, Cal., Aug. 18.—(U. P.)—As he neared the far side of the river—and liberty—George P. Davis, 22, fleeing Folsom prisoner, was shot and killed by penitentiary guards last night.

Davis had strapped mail order catalogues about his body to turn the bullets. He was working in the stone quarry when he started his dash for liberty. Past two lines of guards he ran. A score of shots were fired at him. All missed. He jumped into the river and started to swim across, and was nearing the far bank when killed.

He was committed from San Bernardino county for burglary.

Davis, before he came to California, escaped from a reform school in Oregon.

California Club to Launch Pilgrimage To Harding's Porch

San Francisco, Aug. 18.—(I. N. S.)—A California pilgrimage to Senator Harding's front porch at Marion, Ohio, will leave about September 10 for a conference with the Republican presidential nominee and his campaign conference on the Pacific coast situation.

The Harding-Coolidge Business Men's club of California will invite a representative group of about 25 citizens from the state to lead the party. As the plans stand now, invitations will be issued to representatives of the club itself; the state committee; to four representative Republican women; to Governor Stephens, Senator Hiram W. Johnson, Herbert Hoover, or representative whom they may designate; to representative labor men, farmers, citrus growers, mining men, oilmen, raisin growers, wool growers, newspaper correspondents.

Woman Killed When She Falls Through Skylight of Hotel

Spokane, Wash., Aug. 18.—(U. P.)—Falling through a skylight on the third floor of the Davenport hotel last night, Mrs. Ellen O'Donovan McNamara of New York city crashed to the floor of the lobby in full view of hundreds of guests.

She died an hour later without regaining consciousness.

Mrs. McNamara was the widow of a former prominent New York business man. She was touring the Northwest with a party of friends.

Gold Is Discovered in Excavation in N. Y.

New York, Aug. 18.—(I. N. S.)—Gold has been discovered in a new building excavation at 43 Broad street in the Wall street district, according to one of the construction engineers.

Kurz, sent up from the 89th division at Camp Funston, crossed the line into Canada following his escape and engaged in the garage and welding business.

German War Loss Given as 1,748,341

SOLDIER WILL FACE INQUIRY IN AUTO MURDER MYSTERY

Madison, Wis., Aug. 18.—(I. N. S.)—In connection with the slaying of Mrs. Leroy Moss, wife of an army captain, Private Lester Van Tassel is being held here today pending the arrival of an intelligence officer from Camp Grant, Ill.

Mrs. Moss was killed June 15 under mysterious circumstances while riding in an automobile with her husband and some friends in the vicinity of Camp Grant. The party had stopped after hearing an explosion nearby. After driving on for nearly a mile, the woman, who had been sleeping in the tonneau, was discovered dying with a bullet wound through the back of her head.

Van Tassel and another soldier escaped from the camp farm the night before the shooting.

Fugitive to Face Sentence Despite His New Wealth

Topeka, Kan., Aug. 18.—(I. N. S.)—Clarence Kurz, who escaped from the Leavenworth military prison shortly after being charged with complicity in counterfeiting operations, must finish his sentence despite the fact that he has accumulated between \$15,000 and \$20,000 while at liberty.
