

LAWYER DEMANDS RETURN OF LIQUOR SEIZED BY POLICE

Demand for the immediate return to its owners of 35 gallons of sake seized by Patrolman A. W. Smith and other police in the kitchen of the Japanese restaurant operated at 74 North Fourth street by N. Kagawa and wife, was made before United States Commissioner Drake Wednesday by John Stevenson.

Stevenson, defending the Japanese charged with the illegal possession of intoxicating beverage, halted the machinery of justice on that point and followed it with another bomb when he declared, on the strength of various supreme court decisions, that evidence seized in cases of violation of prohibition statutes without the formality of a search warrant is unlawfully obtained and is, therefore, not admissible as evidence.

Kagawa and his wife were arrested after Smith and his mates had broken through a wall panel with axes and seized the sake, which tested about 84 per cent alcohol. Smith testified to the belief that liquor was concealed in the kitchen as his excuse for breaking open the cache without a search warrant. Stevenson's plea caused Commissioner Drake to take the case under advisement and, in the meantime, Stevenson

and Assistant United States Attorney Fiebel will argue the matter before the court.

When it was shown that the evidence had been destroyed, that fact, was received in lieu of its immediate return to the owners from whom it was taken by what Stevenson declared to be unlawful means.

The point emphasized follows closely upon United States Attorney Humphrey's opinion that seizures of evidence must be made on the strength of search warrants issued when authorities can swear that they know of the presence of the object of their search. Whether the interpretation applies to intoxicants is not determined, inasmuch, it is said, as the eighteenth amendment provides that there shall be no property right in illicit liquor.

In the meantime attorneys will determine whether city or state laws for the licensing of restaurants give power to anyone to "inspect" such places for anything but sanitary and moral conditions.

Harding and Cox to Be Heard From Same Platform August 31

Columbus, Ohio, Aug. 19.—(U. P.)—Governor Cox and Senator Harding will speak from the same platform at the Ohio state fair here on Presidential day, August 31, it was announced this afternoon.

Officials of the fair received Harding's acceptance today and Cox gave his after a conference this afternoon with Senator Harrison of the speakers' bureau.

The far-western tour of Cox will start the night of September 2 or September 3, Senator Harrison said. An itinerary will be announced in a few days.

German Ammunition And U. S. Guns Used By Reds, Is Report

Washington, Aug. 19.—(U. P.)—The report has reached government officials that the Russian Reds, in their advance on Warsaw, are using ammunition made in Germany and machine guns made in the United States. The report is being investigated.

How the American rapid fire guns, described as of the 1918 model, came into the hands of the Bolsheviks is a matter of speculation, but according to the informant they were presumed to have been part of the equipment of Admiral Kolchak, whose forces were scattered by the Reds.

Both shells and rifle cartridges, according to the information, have found their way out of Germany and into Bolshevik hands. It was stated that the rifle ammunition was as free from tarnish and as bright and shiny as though just turned out of the factory. This has been found upon red prisoners and elsewhere in large quantities.

Rail Rate Hearing In Olympia Similar To That Held Here

The hearing on rail rate increases before the public utilities commission of the state of Washington at Olympia Tuesday was similar to the hearing conducted in Portland, with the exception that much more time was spent in discussing the legal aspect of a state suspension order of rates prohibiting in-

crease in interstate rates, according to H. E. Lounsbury, general freight agent of the O-W-R & N., who attended the hearing.

Those who attended the hearing were Lounsbury, W. D. Skinner, traffic manager of the S. P. & S.; A. C. Spencer, counsel for the O-W-R & N.; Charles Hart, counsel for the S. P. & S.; J. N. Teal, representing the lumbermen, and R. J. Knott, representing the Western Pine Manufacturers' association.

Wasco County in Need of Teachers; Schools in Danger

The Dalles, Aug. 19.—Wasco county is short 15 to 25 teachers, according to A. E. Gronewald, county superintendent of schools. Unless the present shortage is remedied within the next month many of the country schools will be compelled to remain closed, he said. According to Gronewald the rate of pay for teachers in Wasco is much less than in many other counties and states.

Journey With Two Young Girls Lands Man in Baker Jail

Baker, Aug. 19.—Roy Clemens is in the county jail and the officers are searching for an unidentified man as the result of a complaint from Whitney. The men, it is alleged, accompanied by two Whitney girls, ages 13 and 15 years, came by automobile to Baker. The two girls were found together in a room in one of the hotels here. Clemens was arrested on the spot.

Sheriff Anderson arrested Jim Nelson in this city on instructions from Union county. Sheriff Lee Warnick of Union county and Fred Currey, federal prohibition agent, took charge of the prisoner. The arrest resulted from a raid on a gang of Greeks near Medical Springs. The Greeks are held on a charge of violating the prohibition act.

Ruth Montgomery, assistant in the psychology department of the University of Oregon, made a study of the inmates of the county poor farm in connection with the state survey of mental defect, delinquency and dependency and has gone to Canyon City, where she will carry on her work in Grant county.

Few Vote, but All Favor Combining Of Election Days

Medford, Aug. 19.—Only 34 votes were cast at Monday's special city election on the charter amendment to have the city election take place in November, at the time of the state and national election. Every vote favored the change.

William H. Baldwin, retired sergeant of Battery M, Fifth regiment, coast artillery, Fort Stevens, Or., died at his home here Tuesday. He had resided in Medford for 18 months and was 55 years old.

Cougar Puts Spice Into Camping Out Near Crater Lake

Medford, Aug. 19.—An unwelcome attraction to the tourists at Crater lake, especially the campers, is the presence of a large cougar which nightly roams around in the vicinity of the hotel. The animal has been seen several times late at night or early in the morning, but each time by persons who had no weapons.

The bears, which proved such a nuisance last fall, nosing around the hotel and government camp stealing food, several of which became tame, have not made their annual appearance.

Early Day Miller Of Dayton, Wash., Dies at Age of 62

Dayton, Wash., Aug. 19.—Judson A. Corbett died at his home in this city Saturday. He was born in Canada 62 years ago and settled at Huntville in his early youth. He built up a large milling business. He is survived by his wife and several children.

ernor Frank O. Lowden, Joseph P. Mason, his secretary, L. L. Emmerson, secretary of state, and the entire governor's staff since last fall, according to Acting Manager George Billingslee of the hotel today.
