

BANDIT ESCAPES IN STOLEN TAXI

A youthful bandit armed with a nickel plated revolver held up two taxi drivers early Wednesday night and escaped with a total of \$32 and a taxicab.

Ed Reiser, driver for the Yellow Taxi company, answered a call at Nau's drug store, Sixth and Alder street, and was directed by a well dressed 180-pound youth 5 feet 4 inches tall, who wore tortoiseshell glasses, to take him to 108 Johnson street. Between Nineteenth and Twentieth streets the lad ordered Reiser to stop, and swinging out to the side of the cab leveled a revolver at the driver. He obtained \$2.

Fifteen minutes later a City Taxicab company driver was summoned to Twenty-third and Hoyt streets. There the same youth, believe the police, told the driver to take him to Vista avenue. Near Spring street he drew a revolver, took \$20 from the driver, and fled in the cab leaving the driver on the curb.

Commissioners Back From Horseback Ride To Mt. Hood Highway

Sore from the effects of a 25-mile ride on horseback, State Highway Commissioners Booth and Kiddle of Multnomah County Commissioners Hoyt, Holman and Muck returned Tuesday night from a two-days' trip over the proposed Mount Hood loop highway. They were accompanied by State Senator George W. Joseph and District Attorney Evans.

The party left Portland Monday, going to Hood River, where they were joined by Leslie Butler and J. R. Nickelsen, who accompanied them to Mount Hood lodge, where the night was spent. Tuesday morning the party abandoned automobiles and mounted horses to ride around the mountain to Government Camp. Forest Supervisor Sherrard serving as pilot.

At Government Camp, which was reached about 4 p. m., Tuesday, automobile transportation to Portland was secured.

As to the possibilities of the proposed road as a tourist attraction on account of its scenic character the party was unanimous in its expression, but whether the great expenditure of money required to construct it at present would be justified in view of the fact that the main highways are yet uncompleted developed individual differences of opinion.
