

STATE TO SECURE COMPACT BODY OF LANDS IN RESERVE

Salem, Aug. 20.—At a meeting of the state land board Thursday afternoon, Governor Olcott was authorized to enter into a contract with the federal government for the exchange of 50,000 acres of scattered base land in national forest reserves in Oregon for a compact body of equal area and value within the reserve.

The land will be reforested by the forestry school of the Oregon Agricultural college and the state forestry department.

Before the exchange is consummated the lands involved will be cruised jointly by the state and federal forestry departments. The exchange is made under provisions of an act of 1917 at which time \$2000 was appropriated to cover expenses incidental thereto.

The appropriation of 3000 second feet of water from Foley creek for the development of power in Tillamook is sought in an application filed with the state engineer's office here by W. H. Soles of Mohler.

Other applications for water rights have been filed as follows:
By E. J. Stewart of McMinnville, water from a branch of Cosine creek for the irrigation of 10 acres in Yamhill county.

By Robert A. Boykin of Bandon, water from Seven Mile creek for mining purposes.
By Fred Van Peger and Emma Oerling of Coquille, water from a small spring for domestic purposes.
By Dr. Morrison of Kerby, water from Jimmy creek for the irrigation of a small tract in Josephine county.

Petition for a physical connection between the Southern Pacific and Oregon Electric railroads at Forest Grove has been filed with the public service commission by business interests of Forest Grove.

State Engineer Percy A. Cupper, left Thursday morning for Boise, Idaho, to attend a meeting of the executive committee of the Western States Reclamation association, of which he is a member.

Tygh Valley After Establishment of New High School

The Dalles, Aug. 20.—Headed by Dr. H. Orfield and Hugh Woods, a delegation of Tygh Valley citizens Wednesday visited A. B. Gronwald, county superintendent of schools, for the purpose of securing a high school for their district. The delegation claimed, according to Gronwald, that many new families had moved into the district, giving enough pupils of advanced standing to warrant the establishment of a school with higher grades. It is understood that the complete personnel of the school board for this district does not favor the erection or establishment of a high school.

Gronwald assured the voters that an election would be called in the immediate future and that the voters would decide the question.

Opposition Growing Against Bill to Cut Rates of Interest

Opposition is developing rapidly throughout Western Oregon to the initiative bill providing for the reduction of the legal rate of interest in this state to 5 per cent on contracts and 4 per cent on ordinary loans, according to Robert E. Smith, president of the Title & Trust company, who returned Thursday from a trip through the Willamette valley.

Smith was accompanied by Lloyd Ritchie, Frank Golebur and Paul D. Murphy, officials of the Taxpayers' league. Meetings were held at Eugene, Albany, Corvallis, McMinnville and Hillsboro and county organizations started. The party will leave today for St. Helena and Astoria and will visit Hood River and The Dalles on Saturday.

"The proposed law reducing interest rates will be submitted to a vote of the people of Oregon at the November election," said Smith. "It is the most pernicious measure ever introduced in this state. While seeming to offer the benefit of low interest rates it would simply make it impossible to borrow money in the state and funds looking for investment here would go to other states."

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PEACH SEASON IS VERY DISASTROUS

This is the most disastrous season that the peach growers of the Pacific Northwest have known. While in some seasons there has been practically a crop failure in certain districts, this season the failure was almost general in both Oregon and Washington.

California growers are profiting by this condition and have never before received such extreme prices as this year. The end of the California season is now in sight.

Because of the extreme price asked for raisins by the California growers many former buyers of raisins are purchasing heavy supplies of currants from Greece. Even with the huge freight rate this stock can be landed and sold in Portland at about 3c a pound less than what California is asking for its poorer stock of raisins.

Beef prices at retail should be somewhat lower than at present. The prices being paid for live animals is the lowest for a number of years, but little change has been shown in values that consumers have been forced to pay.

There is plenty of salmon on the market but halibut is slightly higher again.

Butter market is likely to show a rise within the next few days.

Power Wires Torn Down
Nehalem, Aug. 20.—An electrical display caused Portland Beach visitors to congregate along the Nehalem bay Sunday evening, where the \$2,000 volt power line of the Coast Power company became entangled with the Wheeler Telephone & Telegraph company's lines, caused by the falling of burning trees across both company's lines. Nehalem remained in darkness Sunday night.

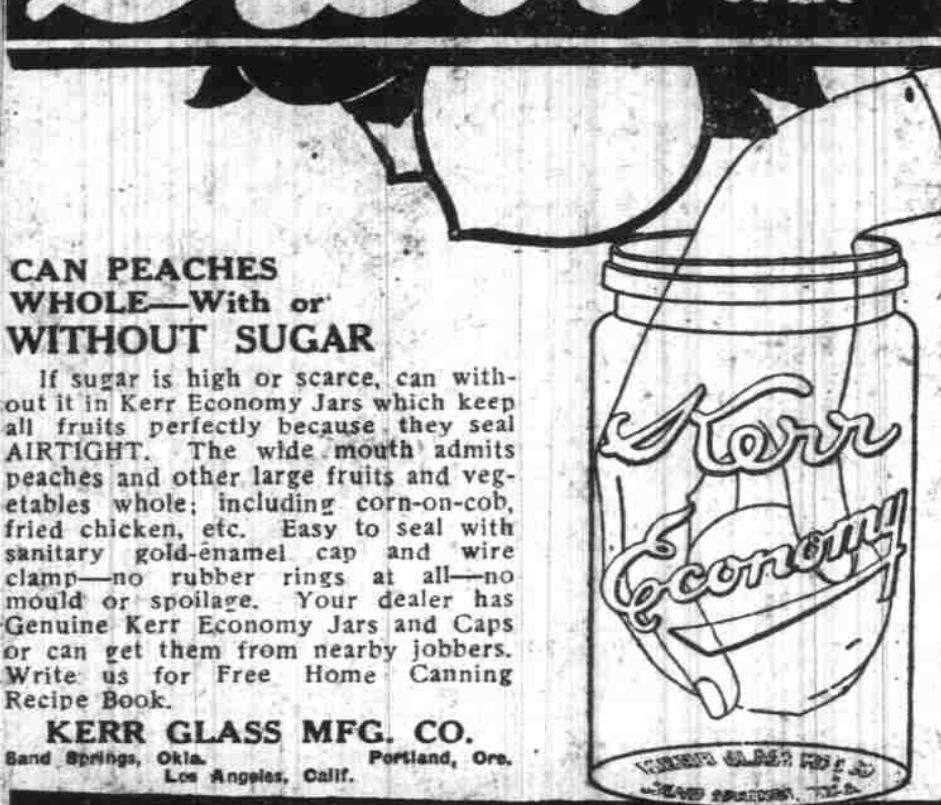
