## Borton May Start Suit Against P.C.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Aug. 20.—(I. N. S.)—A new sensation in the Pacific Coast baseball scandal developed Thursday, following the allegation of Vernon club officials that a ring of gamblers was behind Baker ("Babe") Borton in his charges against Vernon players, when Borton's attorney declared that unless league officials gave Borton an opportunity to prove his charges before August 23, that a suit for slander will be started against the Coast league heads.

"My client, Mr. Borton," said the attorney, in a signed statement, "is sick and tired of the ballplayers making him the goat in this mixup. W. H. McCarthy, president of the Coast league, said Borton would be given an opportunity to prove his charges. He has not afforded my client this opportunity. The season for this is that the gamblers are guilty of the charges which Mr. Borton has made against them, and he is afraid of the facts coming out."

Officials of the Vernon club declared they had circumstantial evidence against two gamblers who were said to have started the whole baseball scandal. One of these two men won \$2000 and the other \$1500 on the game Stroud pitched against Vernon, it was alleged. What was said to have attracted attention was the fact that the two men offered odds of 10 to 7 against Stroud, considered one of the best pitchers in the league.

## MCCARTHY READY TO FACE BORTON IN COURT ROOM

San Francisco, Aug. 20.—(U. P.)—"Mr. Borton can get me into court at any time on nine minutes' notice—why wait nine days?" said President McCarthy of the Coast league when informed of the threat of Baker Borton's attorney that he would sue McCarthy and Manager Hank for libel within nine days.

"I didn't believe Borton could be slandered," said McCarthy. "The criminal libel suit against him will be filed just as soon as the Vernon team gets home, which will be August 31."
