

COX SCENTS PLOT IN LABOR LAY-OFF

En Route With Governor Cox, Toledo, Ohio, Aug. 20.—(L. N. S.)—Governor James M. Cox, the Democratic presidential nominee, has instituted a survey of circumstances surrounding the laying off of numbers of workmen in various industries, following receipt of intimations that "Republican leaders plan to use 'unemployment' as an argument in persuading workmen to vote against the Democratic ticket in the November elections." The survey, it was stated today, will be directed particularly toward conditions in the mills, the American Woolen Woolen Mills and those prevailing on a certain railroad system.

Governor Cox's attention was first directed to the matter several days ago at Toledo, when a man whose name was not made public talked with the governor and assured him such a plan was being worked out.

"This man told me that a thousand workmen had been laid off in one industry alone for political purposes," said Governor Cox, and charges that the same interests which he says are contributing to the "Republican campaign fund of at least \$15,000,000 and are seeking to undermine the federal reserve act" are abetting the movement to discredit the Democratic party with labor.

"The Republicans say they are limiting campaign contributions to \$1000," said the governor. "Later in the campaign—which I assure you, will contain some surprises—I shall give you the names of gentlemen whose contributions were made by themselves and 19 clerks."

"The American Woolen company is closing its plant. It is doing it because it wishes to cut down supply and drive up the cost of clothing. If there are enough millionaires left to buy a suit of clothes at the prices the company hopes to charge."

"It has been said that the government should not interfere in business. That is true, except when someone under the protection of the government is trying to pick somebody's else pocket."

Governor Cox left South Bend shortly after 1 o'clock this morning, but his car was sidetracked at Toledo for several hours waiting for a connection to Columbus. He is due to arrive in Columbus at 10 o'clock this morning. The remainder of the day he plans to spend working on state business.

The governor will speak tomorrow at Orville, Ohio, and at the Cox day celebration in Canton.

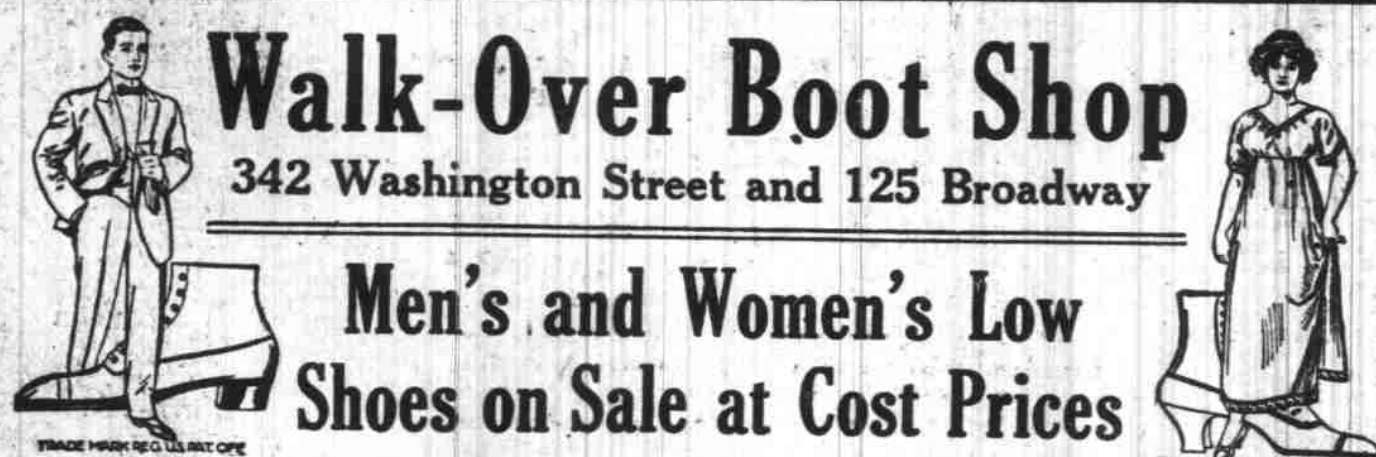

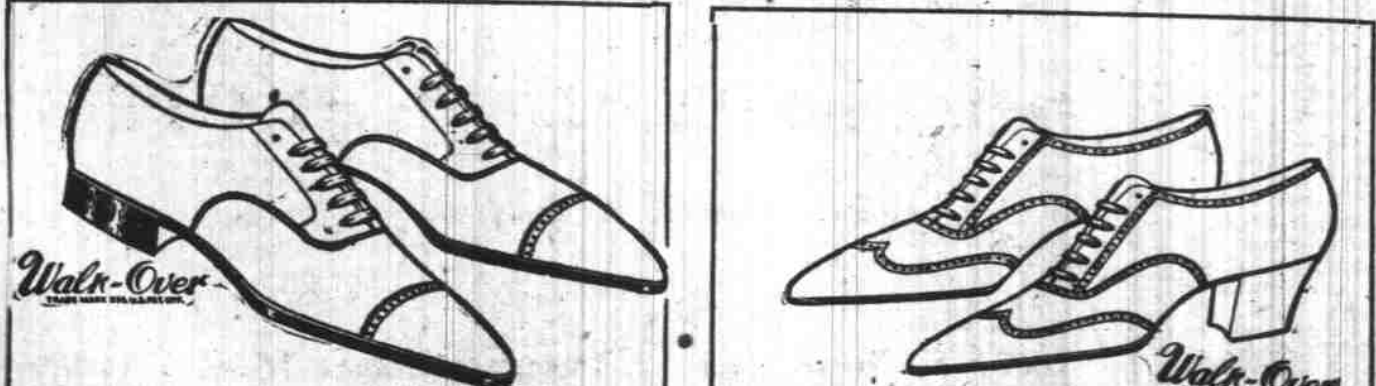
