Rattlesnake Knocks Out Pig in Duel, Then The Porker "Beats It"
Walla Walla, Wash., Aug. 21.—The latest thing in fights, according to W. S. Kirkman, prominent business man of this city, is a rattlesnake versus pig. Kirkman, on returning from a trip into the blue mountains yesterday, recited a tale of how a rattlesnake and a half-grown pig fought in a duel in which the rattlesnake, contrary to all previous "dope" on the general superiority of pigs over snakes, won in the first round with lightning swiftness to the porker's head. The pig was completely bowled over by the shock of the rattlesnake's blow and the sting of its fangs, and, picking himself up hastily, fled from the scene of the combat.

The fight occurred while a herd of pigs were being driven from a ranch to Klicker springs, on Mill creek, by a little girl, who, becoming alarmed, called the rattlesnake to kill the pigs. He was quickly on the scene and dispatched a rattler nearly five feet long, with 17 rattles. A mountain sheep, the snake was more than 17 years old.

High Living Costs Have No Ill Effects On People of Baker
Baker, Or., Aug. 21.—The high cost of living and the depreciation of the United States dollar to about 50 cents has not had a serious effect upon the operating expenses of Baker county, according to Charles Hyde, county assessor, in 1911. Baker county receipts from tax levies amounted to \$126,725. In 1919 the tax receipts totaled \$125,914, or \$815 less than they were nine years ago. Hyde said the value of the county was worth its full face value and living costs were far below the present standard. The work in the county has not been in any way impaired during this time. In fact, there are more people employed by Baker county now than there were in 1911, and the road work throughout the county has been considerably increased in the last nine years.

Alkaline Lands Are To Be Investigated
The Dalles, Aug. 21.—Tests to ascertain the nature of the alkaline land along the banks of the five-mile creek will be made in the near future, according to E. R. Jackson, county agent. After the tests have been taken steps will be made to reclaim this land, at present too poor to raise crops. More of this land lies along the Columbia river west of The Dalles and an effort will be made to put this under cultivation.

Teaching Force Augmented
Spokane, Wash., Aug. 21.—Twenty-five new high school and 105 new grade school teachers will begin work in the city public schools when school opens up next month, according to O. S. Pratt, superintendent of public schools.

Big Time Planned
Eugene, Aug. 21.—The Eugene Chamber of Commerce is formulating plans in conjunction with the Alsea River Lumber company and the residents of the new town of Glenbrook for a grand barbecue picnic and jubilee Thursday to celebrate the founding of Glenbrook and the beginning of operations in the mammoth plant of the Alsea company.

During the year 535 boxes of books, magazines and other reading matter were distributed among 122 logging camps in the Pacific Northwest. Captain Anderson and his associate, E. B. Fish, also visited most of the logging camps, holding Americanization meetings. The work has had measurable results and is praised by all who investigate it.

Congregationalists Mourning Death of Dr. Hubert Herring

The Congregationalists of Portland and Oregon are mourning the untimely death of one of its great national leaders, the Rev. Hubert C. Herring, the executive secretary of the national council.

For the past six months, Dr. Herring had been exceedingly busy arranging for the three hundredth anniversary of the landing of the Pilgrims at Plymouth. This tercentenary celebration was held the early portion of July in Boston. He had finished all the work left over from the great convention and had just arrived at Martha's Vineyard for a few days' vacation.

Immediately upon arriving he went to swimming. He was an expert swimmer and ventured out too far. He called for help which was given. Another swimmer was in difficulty and he sent his rescuer to help the endangered one. He said he was all right, but in a moment or two his body disappeared and it was found an hour afterwards.

Dr. Herring was a religious statesman. Few men knew the conditions in the religious world better than he. He had an international reputation both as an orator and executive. He was well known on both sides of the ocean. He was in Portland a very few years ago and aided in the laying of the cornerstone in one of the Congregational churches.

Cox Babies Spoil Plans of Parents To See Big Events
Dee, Or., Aug. 21.—Little Anna Cox of Dayton, Ohio, may have kept her mother from coming West at the time her father jumped from "governor" to "presidential nominee," but a little relative of the tiny Anna went her more than one better.

Little Anna Cox of Hartford City, Ind., made known her arrival July 4 and prevented her father, mother, brothers and sister from the trip to Portland to attend the Shriner's convention. Her father, Ed Cox, a newspaper publisher here, his distinguished relative, worked hard in 1919 to land the big convention for Portland.

From the moment of the Portland victory he planned to help Portland celebrate and to spend his vacation at Seaside. Baby Anna, however, changed his plans.

Mrs. Cox was formerly Miss Nellie Tozier, a sister of Albert Tozier of Dee and of Mrs. Edith Tozier Wethered of Portland. They were married in Portland.
