## Portland Is Twice Winner Over Acorns

Beavers Put Across Two Victories Although Outright Sutherland Big Star of Day.

RALLYING in the eighth inning of the second game, when South-Joe Boehling—late of the Cleveland Indians—faltered, the Beavers put across three runs and nosed out the Oaks; 3 to 2, giving them a double victory in Saturday's double-header, the first game ending with the count of 4 to 3, in favor of the Mackmen.

The Beavers came from behind in both games, and the victories place them back in the first division again, the Rainiers and Angels dropping back through defeats.

"Suds" Sutherland had sweet revenge on the Acorns. Friday they chased him to the showers in the first inning, but Saturday he came back, and with the count 2 to 0 in favor of Oakland he delivered a double in the pinch and sent over two runs that practically spelled defeat for the Acorns.

**POLSON HIT HARD**  
In the first game the Oaks clouted Harold Polson's offerings quite freely but ineffectively in all but two innings. The Beavers grabbed six hits off the delivery of Ray Kremer, but they were hit that counted.

The appearance of Blue in the lineup again put more confidence in the Beavers and they played with more pep. Kingston broke into the lineup in the second game and pulled off a nice play in the pinch.

Portland broke the ice in the first game when Cox tripped to deep center field and scored when Koehler bounced a single across the keystone sack.

**BEAVERS COME BACK**  
The Beavers took the lead in the fourth inning by scoring two runs. Cooper singled to left field, but was out stretching. Miller beat out a hit to Spranger and Koehler moved Cox up with a sacrifice. Lane flied out to Cox and Guisto singled to center, scoring Miller. Spranger's boot on Dorman's fly grounded allowed Cooper to score. The Beavers fought back and scored three runs. Malsbait beat out a tap in front of the plate and Schaller drew a walk. Blue picked up the bases and sent it into deep left center, scoring Malsbait and Schaller ahead of him. Blue counted on Cox's drive through the short field. Koehler moved Cox up with a sacrifice, but Spranger and Polson could not deliver.

**OAKS RALLY FAISL**  
After this frame the Beavers were threatened at bay by Kremer, while his mates threatened to tie up the count in the eighth inning. With Sprubaker down, the game doubled—his fourth hit of the game—and Miller drove a hit through the infield. Knight pitched at first, but Lane singled over short, scoring Cooper and putting Knight on third. Guisto was hit by a pitched ball, and Honus Mize decided to bat for Dorman. He forced Guisto at second, ending the scoring.

Boehling pinch hitting for Kremer, beat out an infield tap along the first base line, and Willie sacrificed. Brubaker popped out to Blue, and Cooper's best effort was a pop fly to Spranger.

**BOEHLING GOES STRONG**  
Boehling traveled along at a great pace for seven innings, holding the Beavers to three hits, two of which were made by Dick Cox. With the two runs lead he held it looked like a cinch victory for the Oaks, but Cox opened the eighth with a single and Koehler drew a walk. Spranger was hit by a pitched ball, filling the bases, and then Sutherland cracked one past Knight that was good for two bases, scoring Cox and Koehler. Spranger, who had reached third on Suds' blow, scored on Malsbait's sacrifice. After Westerall had drawn a walk, Schaller struck out for the second time, ending the inning.

Oakland's first run was scored in the second on Miller's hit over second. Knight's sacrifice, Lane's walk, and Guisto's hit made three. A double play spoiled further chances of scoring.

Boehling's single, a forecourt, Brubaker's single and a sacrifice fly gave the Oaks their second run in the third. Suds faltered in the fourth a trifle, but the steadied down and held the Oaks at bay.

There will be a double-header this afternoon. The series stands three to two in favor of the Beavers.

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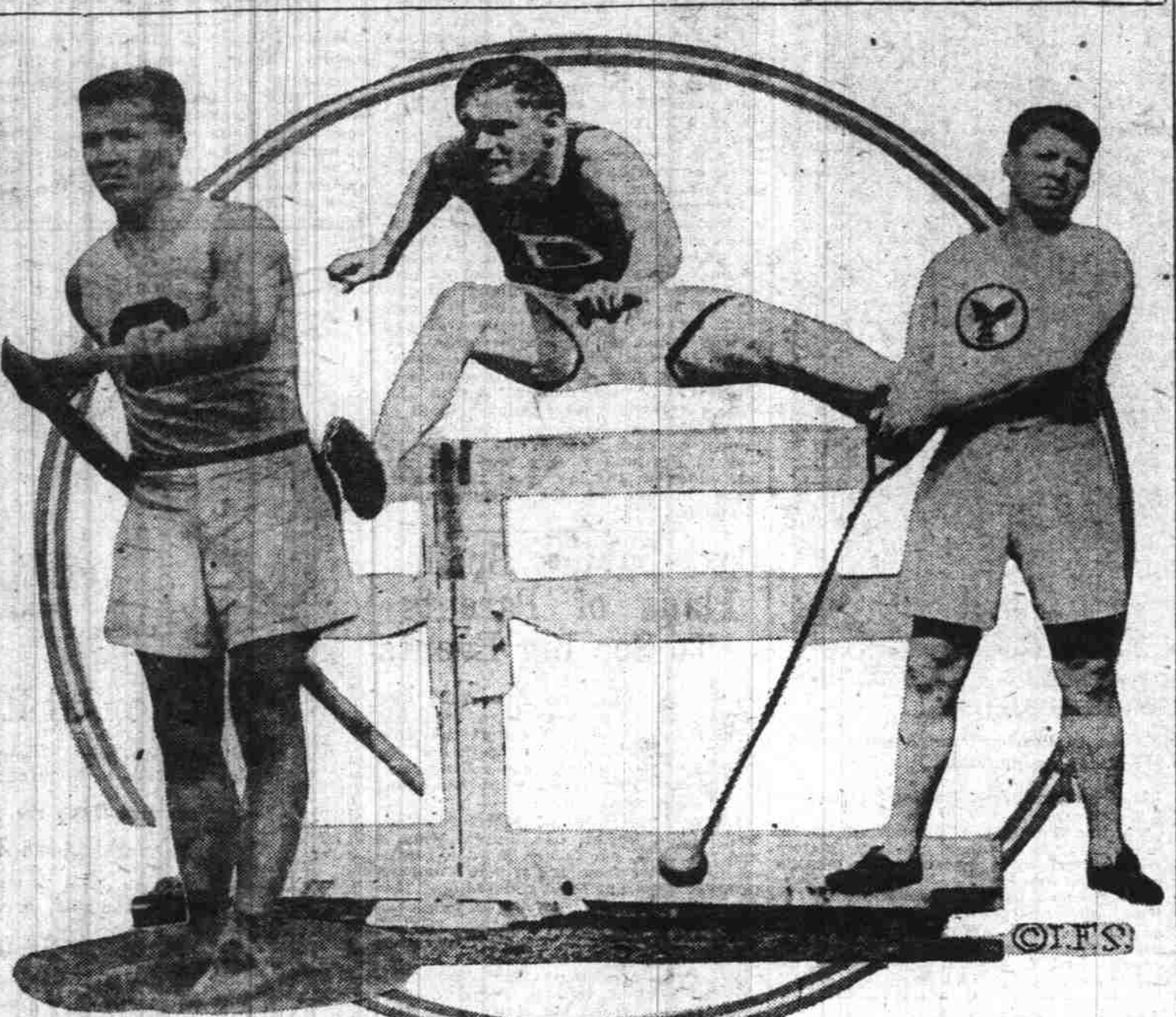
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## Public Golf Course Play Next Month

City Championship to Be at Stake; To Open Upper Nine Holes in September.

THE upper nine holes of the Eastmoreland public golf course will be opened for play this fall, shortly after the first hard rain, according to an announcement made by John Junor, professional in charge of the links.

All the work has been completed on the greens and fairways, except for rolling them, and this cannot be accomplished until after a good hard rain.

The opening of the second nine holes will be very welcome in the ranks of the players, as the first nine holes have been very much crowded during the past year. There have been times when players have been forced to wait at the various tees from 10 to 15 minutes, but this will be done away with soon.

The total measurement of the 18 holes will be between 6100 and 6200 yards. As soon as a definite date is set for the opening of the upper nine, plans will be laid for the second annual city championship tournament.

Last year's tourney was a huge success, Johnny Rebstock defeating Dr. O. F. Willing in the finals. There are a large number of youngsters who are playing a very capable game this year, and they are keenly interested in the coming tourney.

Johnny Junor, professional, is also trying to make arrangements for a team of 12 to play against the other clubs.

Victor E. Johnson, who had charge of last year's tournament, is expected to return from the coast during the latter part of this month, when definite plans will be laid for the tournaments.

## Hope Is Held Out for Golf Contest Here

Efforts Are Being Made Despite Negative Wire; Golfing Notes of Interest.

DESPITE word that Edward Ray, who recently annexed the United States open championship, and his partner, Harry Vardon, were not being booked for matches on the Pacific coast this year, C. Harry Davis Jr., captain of the Waverley Country Club team, and John H. Dreher of Seattle, secretary of the Pacific Northwest Golf association, have not yet given up hope of having the two great English professionals visit the Northwest before they return home in November.

Acting for various clubs in the Northwest, Captain Davis wired the managers of the Ray-Vardon tour an offer of 10 matches in the Northwest, three of which were to be played in Portland.

An invitation to participate in the Del Monte open tourney was turned down by the English golfers, but Fred Purner, who is directing the tournament, is hopeful of securing their entry list.

Should Ray and Vardon consent to play in California, it is practically certain that they will play in the Northwest.

The famous professionals have a heavy schedule arranged, but it is likely that they will play in the Northwest.

Johnny Dreher, secretary of the P. N. W. G. A., is highly pleased with the revision of the tournament rules as announced a week ago. Dreher, who knows the golf game in the Northwest like a champion, knows how to make shots, predicts a great future for the game. "It is impossible," said Dreher, "to consider staging the Northwest tournament on one link in the future."

Rudolph Wilhelm, Oregon champion and runner-up in the Northwest championship, will leave this weekend for New York to participate in the national amateur championship. Wilhelm has a statement to close on declaring that he will be among the entrants, as will Roscoe Fawcett.

The final of the presidents' cup tournament of the Portland Golf club will be played today, Charles W. Meyers opposing J. J. Collins in an 18-hole match.

The next big golf tournament, which will bring to a close one of the greatest years in the history of the sport in the Northwest, is the punch bowl tournament to be staged over the Waverley course next month. Preparations for the event will begin this week. Waverley won the bowl last year at Seattle in an exceptionally close match.

## Carl Mays to Pitch Regularly for N. Y.

Polo Grounds, New York, Aug. 21.—(U. P.)—Pitcher Carl Mays is not "a broken reed," despite his grief at the death of Ray Chapman, Cleveland shortstop, who was hit on the head by a ball thrown by Mays.

Jacob Ruppert and T. L. Huston, joint owners of the New York club, issued a statement this afternoon declaring that Mays, while bowed down with grief, is not a broken reed. He will take his regular turn at pitching and he is expected to win. If he requires protection, he will have it.

Mays was not on the field this afternoon when the game between Detroit and New York started.

## Measure to Stop Ball Gambling Drafted in S. F.

San Francisco, Aug. 21.—(U. P.)—A measure to stop ball gambling on the Pacific Coast has been drafted by the Pacific Coast League. S. B. Strube, president of the San Francisco club, and Police Judge Timothy S. Fitzpatrick have drafted a bill to be introduced when the lawmakers meet in January. It was completed at a meeting held Friday.

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## Playground Tennis Championships to Start Next Week

Entries to the annual tennis tournament of the Portland public playgrounds must be in Tuesday night, and the first round has been set for Monday, August 30. William H. Knapp, supervisor of physical education of the playgrounds, has named F. E. Harrigan to handle the tourney.

There will be events for boys, girls, juniors and seniors, and each contest must be a bonafide player on a playground court. Anyone who has won an open event is not eligible for the playground championship. The boys' and girls' class is for little athletes who had not reached their fifteenth birthday by March 1, 1920, while the juniors' is limited to 18 years on March 1, 1920, and the seniors' is the unlimited division.

The rules of the United States National Lawn Tennis association will govern and suitable prizes will be secured for the various winners. One half hour away will be given to each contestant when the match is scheduled, and failure to show up within that time means a defaulted contest.

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## Carpentier Willing to Battle Jack

Frenchman's Manager Stumbling Block, Opinion of Trainer; Ambition to Meet Dempsey.

NEW YORK, Aug. 21.—(U. P.)—If Georges Carpentier, the European heavyweight champion, does not meet Jack Dempsey, the world's champion, when he returns to this country in the fall it will be no fault of Georges. Francois Descamps, the astute little manager of the Frenchman, is the obstacle in the way of such a match, if there is an obstacle. He holds Dempsey in much more solemn respect than does the fighter himself.

These facts were ascertained here today in a talk with the French fighter's trainer, M. Wilson.

"It is Wilson's greatest ambition to meet Dempsey," said Wilson. "It is what I might call his heart's desire. He wants to fight for the world's championship and believes he can win it. I believe he has an excellent chance of winning from Dempsey, for I have seen the American champion in training and believe I am fair enough judge of a fighter to make a close comparison between him and Carpentier."

"There is a great deal of difference in the size of the men. I had been led to believe that Dempsey was much larger than he really is. On the other hand I have found to my surprise that the champion is very fast and very dangerous. I had expected to see a slow lumbering giant, with a slow punch that would be easy for Georges to avoid. I found instead a very shrewd, very fast man, one fully capable of defending the title against anyone."

COCHRAN IS ANGLING  
It became known by a remark from Jack Curley, who signed Carpentier and Levinson for the bout which is now scheduled for September 12, that Charles Cochran, the London promoter, has been trying to get Carpentier to fulfill his contract with Cochran calling for the original Cochran contract. Cochran went to Paris to attempt to sign Carpentier, who immediately demanded a new contract. Cochran consented, guaranteeing the European champion \$200,000 for a bout with Dempsey, providing the match with Levinson was canceled.
