Pageant to Be Given at Seaside Is of Interest

MUCH interest is manifested in the pageant to be presented Friday and Saturday evenings, August 27 and 28, on the beach at Seaside, by the summer colonists at Seaside, Gearhart and Astoria, in commemoration of the Lewis and Clark expedition.

The pageant will be introduced with a prologue, in which scenes of fairies, water nymphs and wood nymphs will dance and play in the real waves of the ocean. Neptune, impersonated by a prominent Portland man, being the center of this lively picture. Hearing the approach of the Indians from the distance the fairy folk will dance away into the waves and put of sight. The arrival of the Indians will mark a second epoch in the history. This promises to be one of the most picturesque features of the pageant. Lee Moorehouse of Pendleton, whose collection of Indian blankets, baskets and other work of these early settlers, is accounted among the finest in the state, will be in charge of the costumes and settings of the Indian scenes.

The arrival of Lewis and Clark will mark the next epoch. Then will follow a pioneer scene, introducing the old prairie schooner and other suggestions of the early days. The pioneers will gather around their campfires and sing the old songs as they did in the late forties and early fifties. The climax of the pageant will be reached in the battle between the pioneers and the Indians. This will be followed by the introduction of several historical figures, the central one being the "Queen of the West," who is being selected now by vote. Columbia will be impersonated by Mrs. A. D. Frost of Portland. The central figures will be flanked by 100 girls in white, carrying flags, and 100 Boy Scouts in uniform. The affair will close by the entire audience singing "The Star Spangled Banner."

On both evenings the performances will be followed by pioneer supper dances, given at the Seaside hotel. The old dances will be played and many of the hostesses, who are reserving tables, are planning to wear pioneer costumes.

The marriage of Miss Ann Marie McMahon and James Thomas Rooney will take place at St. Ignace church at 9 o'clock on September 1. Miss Catherine McMahon will attend her sister as maid of honor, and Robert Martin Fenell will be best man. Miss McMahon, who is an unusually charming girl, has been entertained at several informal dinners and luncheons. Mr. Rooney is a well-known Portland man and knight of Columbus.
