COX IS READY TO BACK UP FUND CHARGE

Democratic Nominee to Cite Figures and Names to Support Assertion That Harding's Slush Fund Will Reach \$15,000,000

By Herbert W. Walker
Dayton, Ohio, Aug. 23.—(U. P.)—Governor James M. Cox will soon name many of the contributors to the Republican campaign fund and give the financial quotas for various political districts as "evidence" in support of his charge that a "war chest" of \$15,000,000 is being raised to insure a Harding victory, according to leaders in the Democratic camp here.

Despite denials of his charge by Senator Harding and Will H. Hays, the governor asserted again today that he is ready to "reveal the facts" and has ample evidence to back up his statement. With the senate campaign expenditures committee resuming its hearings Chicago today, interest centered on whether Cox might be called to present personally his information regarding the Republican fund. Senator Reed, Missouri, Democrat, has wired the governor that the committee desires all the facts in his possession. He gave assurance that a thorough investigation would be made, and that he would be forthcoming.

ROOSEVELT'S TACTICS PATTERN
It is probable that Cox, in continuing his attacks on Republican political expenditures, will adopt tactics used by Theodore Roosevelt in 1912. In several of his speeches then, Roosevelt, as the progressive candidate, "called the roll" of the biggest Republican campaign contributors. Cox indicated that his evidence will enable him to attack many of the same men who were on Roosevelt's roll.

The governor claims that the country has been divided into seven main districts for the collection of campaign funds and he also charged the quota for Ohio is in excess of \$500,000. Will Hays, he insists, in his speech Saturday did not deny that the goal of the Republicans is \$15,000,000.

DENIAL HELD MEANINGLESS
"He says the preliminary estimate is \$5,000,000," Cox said. "That doesn't mean anything."

CALIFORNIA OURS, SAYS ROOSEVELT

Davis, Cal., Aug. 23.—"We'll easily carry California," Franklin D. Roosevelt, Democratic candidate for vice president, said here today.

"Except for the fact that I spent Sunday sitting under a water tank in some little Oregon town, everything is rosy with me and our party."

"Do you think Hiram Johnson will help the Republicans carry this state?" Roosevelt was asked.

"Poor Hiram!" Roosevelt sighed. "I think Hiram is about as good as dead. I think his support will help the Republicans at all."

Roosevelt's train stopped for 10 minutes at Davis. He was on his way to San Francisco.

"This is a flying trip of the state," Roosevelt said. "We will stay only 48 hours, going to Salt Lake, Utah, and the mountain district for another campaign."

Roosevelt said he planned to return to California in October in a final campaign.

Baby's Birth Saves Two Million Dollar Fortune for Mother

Louisville, Ky., Aug. 23.—(I. N. S.)—Nestling in her cradle at Silver City, today, little Johnnie Eliza Bartlett may not know it, but she is heiress to \$2,000,000, and her arrival averted an impending suit for the estate of C. P. Moorman, wealthy brewer.

Mrs. Lucy Elizabeth Moorman Bartlett, the baby's mother, is enabled by the birth of her daughter to find the pot of gold she has been chasing since her grandfather's death.

Under the terms of the will of her grandfather, \$2,000,000 of his estate was to go to his only child, Johnnie Eliza Bartlett, if she should be born to a child before she was 25 years old. The will also provided a life annuity of \$25,000 for the mother, but stipulated that if the will was contested, the beneficiary seeking to break it would be eliminated automatically.

The infant's mother, who turned up her nose at a life annuity of \$15,000 offered by the trustees of her grandfather's estate when she became a widow, now she has the income of the \$2,000,000 her own daughter inherits from the wealthy brewer's estate.

Continental Flight Completed by Plane

New York, Aug. 22.—Completing its round trip across continental flight, the Larson all-metal airplane, piloted by Bert Acosta, arrived at Central Park, Long Island, today. Passengers were carried on the trip, including Eddie Rick, publisher of the Cleveland Plain Dealer, and Cleveland. The plane made its trip to blaze an aerial mail route to the Pacific coast.

Woman Bather Is Saved From Death In Swift Current Of Columbia River

Hearing the cries of bathers in the Columbia river some distance east of Columbia beach Sunday evening, Fred Bieber of 22½ Union avenue threw off his coat and plunged in, saving from drowning Mrs. William White of 5039 Sixtieth avenue southeast, who had waded out beyond her depth and was caught in the current.

Mrs. White and her husband and small son had been spending the afternoon at the beach. She could not swim and was merely splashing about outside the strip of beach patrolled by the life guards. Mrs. C. H. Naylor of 4608 Fifty-seventh avenue southeast and her guest, Miss Gertrude Winship of Seattle, were swimming near Mrs. White, who had expressed a longing to be able to swim as well as they. Suddenly they heard her scream but because of the current out in the river at that point they could not reach her.

It was then that Bieber, who happened to be strolling along the beach, rushed into the water with all his clothes on except his coat and swam to her, dragging her ashore.

Jack Pobochenko, head life guard at the beach, worked over her for nearly an hour before she was resuscitated.

After an hour of rest at the bath house Mrs. White was able to go to her home. Her husband had left the water to search for their son, who was playing somewhere along the beach, when his wife was in the water.

The beach is marked off with large red crosses to show the safe bathing area. The water deepens rapidly before the bounds of these markers.

G. O. P. Candidates Denied Support if Backed by League

Spokane, Wash., Aug. 23.—Any Republican candidate for state or county office who is endorsed by the Non-partisan league and who does not repudiate this endorsement is virtually read out of the party by action taken by the Republican state central committee, it was announced by Levi C. Jessup, Republican state vice chairman.

"If all candidates who have been endorsed by the Non-partisan league do not repudiate their endorsement the Republican party is through with them," said Jessup. "We will not support them, even if they are nominated on the Republican ticket."

Progressives Are Coming Our Way, Says Roosevelt

"We have them coming our way," said Franklin D. Roosevelt, Democratic nominee for vice president of the United States, in an interview to The Journal before leaving for San Francisco Saturday night. Roosevelt was referring to the number of Republicans, Independents and Progressives who came to him after the meeting at The Auditorium and said, "I am a Republican, but I am going to vote for you and Cox."

Everywhere, said Roosevelt, throughout his tour, he has heard the story of the Republican party, because we are making no difference whether during work hours, dinner hour, morning, noon or night, people are coming to hear the truth on the great issues of the campaign and the most significant is, so I am told, that our audiences consist of at least 50 per cent Republicans and Independents.

The Portland meeting was the best held so far, said Roosevelt, who was much impressed with the enthusiasm and the quick response to points made.

PROGRESSIVES DOMINANT
"Our fight is not against the rank and file of the Republican party, because we remember that in 1912, when the party split, there were more votes for the Progressive ticket than for Taft. I am still going on the assumption, and very properly, that the rank and file still want the Republican party and are not a progressive party, but the fact remains that

FISH-PEAKING DEMAND AGAIN PRESENTED BY YANKEES

Sportsmen Ask That the Charges That Were Passed Up at Recent Session of Special Committee Be Considered; Facts Ready.

Again demanding a full hearing of the charges made by sportsmen of the state against members of the former state fish and game commission, Richard W. Price Monday forwarded to Louis E. Bean of Eugene, chairman of the legislative investigation committee, a reiterated list of charges and asks that the committee set a time to consider them. Price promised that full evidence supporting the allegation would be presented whenever the committee should designate.

ACTION IS DEFENDED
This action follows a hasty session of the committee last week, when adjournment sine die was taken without going into the merits of the controversy that has lashed back and forth in this state for years. The assigned reason for dropping the investigation as authorized by the legislature at its special session last winter was that the creation of a divided commission, separating the commercial fishing program from the game fish and preservation of wild life, had automatically put a stop to the controversy. This does not account for various financial and political misdeeds charged against the individual members of the original body. Price contends.

In his statement addressed to Chairman Bean, Price quotes the text of the resolution adopted by the special legislative session creating the committee and ordering that full investigation be made of the charges, including the dismissal of State Biologist William L. Finley and the submission of a full report on the situation to the governor.

BRIEF IS RECITED
It also recites the details of the committee's brief meeting of August 18, when the committee refused to hear the evidence which Price and others were prepared to offer and adjourned over.

Extra Demurrage Penalty Effective Date Is Postponed

Salem, Aug. 23.—The penalty above the regular demurrage charge for cars held longer than the 48 hours limit, now in effect, was recently filed with the public service commission. It is temporarily suspended as far as Oregon shippers are concerned, in an order issued by the commission Monday, postponing the effective date of the penalty until November 23. Should the railroads fail to comply with this suspension order, a hearing will be called by the state commission.

Man Uses Rare Good Judgment in Falling

Litchfield, Ill., Aug. 23.—Harry J. Hines, 38, was saved from a serious injury when he fell through the skylight of a local hospital. He landed in the operating room and by the time he regained consciousness his injuries had been dressed.

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U. S. Scores 210 Points in 7th Track and Field Meet; Finland, With 95, Is Nearest Competitor; Americans Break Records.

Antwerp, Aug. 23.—By adding six points to their total through taking fourth place in two of the last events, the United States this afternoon wound up in the seventh Olympiad's track and field games with a grand total of 210 points, 115 points more than its nearest competitor, Finland, which finished with 95 points. The American athletes took fourth place in the cross country race and in the 1600-meter relay race.

TOTALS DO NOT TALLY
The final standing, as given out officially by the Olympic committee, but which does not tally with apparently authentic records kept by newspapermen, is:

United States, 210; Finland, 95; Sweden, 90; England, 80; France, 33; Italy, 29; South Africa, 23; Canada, 13; Norway, 11; Estonia, 10; Belgium and Denmark, 9 each; Australia, Holland and New Zealand, 5 each; Czechoslovakia, 3; Luxembourg, 1.

Three new records were hung up by American athletes in the course of the games and these were the outstanding features of the games, unless it is considered that Earl Thompson's new record for the 110-meter hurdles is a feat.

Even in that event the United States must take a great deal of credit, for Thompson is an American-trained athlete, even though he represented Canada in the games. The American records include Foss' performance in the pole vault; Frank Loomis' new figures for the 400-meter hurdles and Landan's breaking of the high jump record.

U. S. SCORES IN 5
The Americans scored in 25 of the 29 events marking up from 1 to 17 points in each of them.

England won the 1600-meter relay race today, the American team finishing fourth.

The English team's time was 3 minutes, 22.1 seconds, compared with 3 minutes, 18.2 seconds made by the American team in Stockholm in 1912.

South Africa finished second, France third, Sweden fifth and Belgium sixth.

The American team was composed of G. S. Schiller, Los Angeles Athletic club; J. E. Meredith, Los Angeles Athletic club; G. S. Brettnall, Cornell, and F. J. Shea, Navy.

Finland won the final of the 10,000 meter cross-country figures were as follows: Charles Squires, Imbler garage man, 32:25.4; second, Sweden third, Finland fourth, Belgium fifth, and France sixth.

The marathon, climax of the track and field events, was won by Hannes Kolehmainen, Finland, in the new world's record time of 2:32:25.4. Loosman of Estonia was second, only 13 seconds behind the winner. Organ, Lindor, and Kolehmainen finished seventh, eighth, and ninth, respectively.

YOUTHS WATCHING AIRPLANE KILLED

Three men on the truck heard the train about the same time and the driver, Charles Squires, Imbler garage man, attempted to turn out, but the fender of the locomotive caught a wheel of the truck and the six boys on the side near the train were thrown under its wheels.

The dead are: Lloyd Larsen, Wayne Keown and Clarence Larson. The injured are: Albert Blanchard, Ray Keown, brother of Wayne, internal, and Alford Westenskow, internal. All nine boys were between 13 and 15 years of age. The father and mother were placed in the baggage car and rushed to La Grande.

Clarence Larson was the son of Harry K. Larson, Imbler man who lost his life in the service in France and for whom the American Legion post at Imbler was named.

The crossing is dangerous as a tall building takes the view of the road just before the crossing the road leads down a steep embankment. An inquest will be held.

Poles Not to Go Too Far, U. S. Is Told

Washington, Aug. 23.—(I. N. S.)—Poland has informally advised the United States that she has no intention of going beyond her ethnological boundaries in her drive to push the Soviet forces out of Poland, it was learned this afternoon.

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RED ROUT BY POLES IS KEPT UP CHECKED

Russian Armies, Cut to Pieces, Rapidly Being Encircled; 200 Pieces of Artillery Taken; Red Prisoners May Total 80,000.

Berlin, Aug. 23.—(I. N. S.)—The Russians have completely evacuated the Warsaw-Danzig corridor, according to advices from Marenwerder today. Thousands of Germans are reported in flight from the corridor and adjacent territory. The marching Poles are said to have threatened death to Germans in that region.

Paris, Aug. 23.—(1:55 p. m., U. P.)—The three Bolshevik armies operating in Poland are now completely cut off from each other, according to Warsaw advices to the French foreign office today.

The Red forces in the Soltan region (50 miles east of Graudenz) have been isolated, while the armies along the river Bug and near Brest-Litovsk are all but encircled.

Prisoners taken by the Poles up to Saturday totaled 35,000, and it is believed they are now double that number. Two hundred pieces of Red artillery have been seized.

The entente mission's report says the Polish victory is "increasing hourly."

RUSS CAVALRY AT LEMBERG IS NEARLY ANNIHILATED

London, Aug. 23.—(I. N. S.)—General Budenny's Russian cavalry army that has been attempting a counter drive against the Poles in Galicia has been defeated and has narrowly escaped annihilation, according to a Central News dispatch from Vienna today.

The dispatch said that General Budenny's army is now a "considerable distance" from Lemberg. Lemberg was the chief objective of the Red army drive in Galicia.

BREST-LITOVSK ABANDONED SOVIET WAR OFFICE ADMITS

London, Aug. 23.—(I. N. S.)—The abandonment of the great Polish fortress of Brest-Litovsk, a Red stronghold, admitted by the soviet war office at Moscow today. A Bolshevik communiqué witnessed from Moscow says:

"We have abandoned Brest-Litovsk and territory in the vicinity of Ostrof and Vlodova."

DANZIG SOVIET BLOCKS FRENCH AID FOR POLES

TWO POLICEMEN DIE IN GUNFIGHT

Chicago, Aug. 23.—(I. N. S.)—Two detectives are dead and an unidentified man was wounded but escaped before the police arrived as a result of a riot early today at the Pekin Cafe, a South State street resort.

Police Sergeant William Hennessy died at Mercy hospital of gunshot wounds, shortly after the shooting, and Sergeant James Mulcahey died a few hours later. Hirsch, Miller, an ex-ballist, well known in police circles, later confessed to the shooting of Policeman Hennessy, according to members of the homicide squad assigned to the riot.

Numerous civilians, men and women, were reported to have received minor injuries in the battle, but all of them had been removed when the police, answering a riot call, arrived.

Four or more numbers of men are being held by the police for questioning. Two alleged "gunmen" are under arrest and one is said to have admitted firing at the detectives.

No accurate details of the shooting have been revealed by the police, but Sergeant Hennessy, shortly before he died, said that he and Sergeant Mulcahey entered the cafe on police business and were fired upon without warning after Mulcahey had returned being taken for a waiter by a patron of the place.
