Big Sawmill for Lakeview—Charles Hall of Marshfield, president of the Oregon State Chamber of Commerce, is head of an organization of lumber manufacturers who propose to build a sawmill with an annual capacity of 600,000 feet of lumber on the Thomas creek about 20 miles northwest of Lakeview.
