

SANDY ROUTE IS CHOSEN FOR MOUNT HOOD LOOP ROAD

The contest over the location of the Multnomah county end of the Mount Hood loop highway was ended Tuesday by the decision of the state highway commission in favor of the south or Sandy route.

This route runs from Gresham through Kelso, Sandy and Cherryville to Zigzag, where connection is made with the national forest road. The chief argument in its behalf was that it is slightly shorter and passes through a larger agricultural area than the north or Bull Run route. It is also estimated that the cost of construction would be \$400,000 less than that of the north route.

DECISION APPROVED

The decision of the highway commission met the hearty approval of a large delegation from Sandy who indicated their commendation through a quartet which sang a topical song of several verses to the tune of "Loch Lomond," the chorus of which ran:

"O we'll take the high road and leave them the low road,
And we'll be in Portland before them.
The south side is the shortest,
The cheapest and the best,
O give us the highway through Sandy."

The determination of the location of the Mount Hood loop highway will not be followed by immediate construction. It may be several years before it is completed judging from other sections taken by the commission signifying its policy not to take up new projects until after the main trunk roads, especially the Pacific highway, is improved.

POLICY EXPLAINED

This policy was pointed out to a delegation from the Portland Chamber of Commerce, asking for consideration of a road to the Josephine county caves. It was represented by the delegation that so anxious was Grants Pass to have this road put under construction that the townspeople would guarantee to pay 5 per cent over the sale price of road bonds.

Chairman Benson of the highway commission pointed out that it would require \$7,500,000 to complete the Pacific and Columbia river highways, and that financial resources of the commission for the next three years on the present basis were only \$9,000,000.

In the face of this he asked the delegation if it were not better business to first construct the main roads before taking up side roads, which the money is not yet in sight.

DELEGATION AGREED

The members of the delegation agreed with him that it was and expressed themselves as satisfied if the preliminary steps were taken to give Josephine county road priority when the main roads were completed. On this understanding the commission agreed to prepare a plan for paving uncompleted stretches between Roseburg and Corvallis and in Linn, Marion, Clackamas, Yamhill and Washington counties.

The total mileage is about 100 miles which it is proposed to pave next year. TO ASK BIDS

It is planned to advertise for bids this winter in order that "tractors" may be ready to start work as soon as spring opens in order to complete the work by next fall. Plans will also be prepared for paving between Seaside and Astoria on the Columbia river highway.

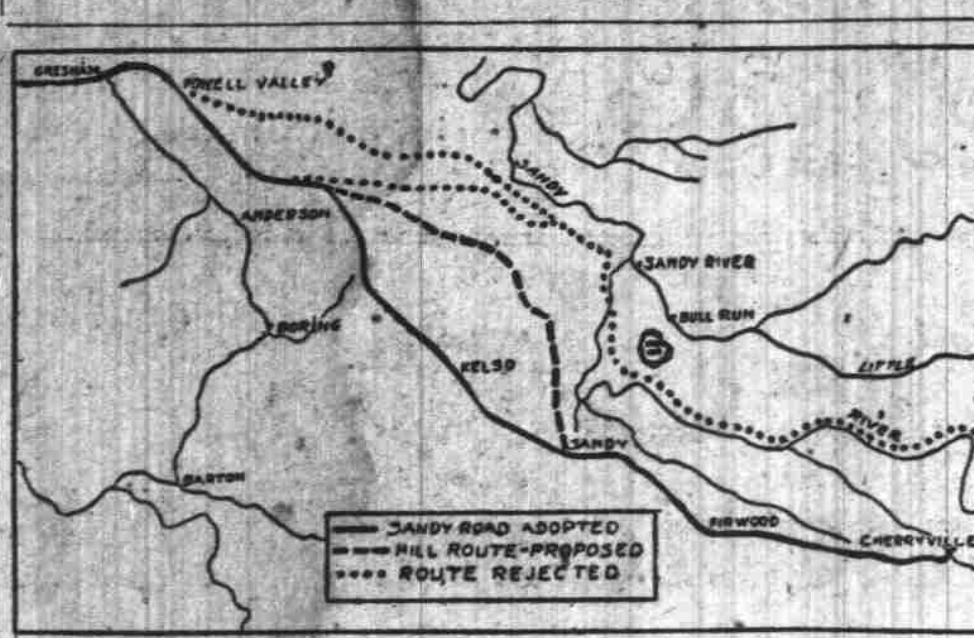
There will yet be left about another 100 miles including stretches south of Roseburg and between Hood River and The Dalles, which will be put under contract for paving during the 1921 season.

The commission as a further indication of completing the main trunk roads ordered plans for grading the old Oregon trail between Huntington and Baker prepared for early work.

Plans were also ordered for a new bridge at Vale, Malheur county, and one at Myrtle creek in Douglas county, also one across the South Umpqua between Myrtle creek and Canyonville and one at Canyonville.

The vexing question of road signs was brought up by M. O. Wilkins representing the Portland Ad club. There was much criticism, he said, especially by tourists, that country roads were not signed and that on state roads under construction detour roads were not marked out. He wanted to know if there could not be better cooperation with counties in marking the roads. The highway commissioners admitted that there was ground for criticism of the highway department in regard to detour

signs and an order was issued to engineers to see that this provision was better enforced. As to county roads the commission had no jurisdiction.

PUBLIC RESPONSIBLE

It was pointed out that the traveling public was itself responsible for conditions. Detour signs are disregarded even when put up.

Butte creek section, John Day highway, Wheeler county, graveling 9.36 miles, Blake & Compton company, \$74,160.

McMinnville-West Dayton, graveling 4.94 miles, E. A. Palmer, \$24,395.

BIDS ARE REJECTED

Bids for graveling the Pacific highway between Oswego and Oregon City were rejected and it was decided to readvertise the project for paving instead of gravel surface.

Unity Farmers in Toils of Law; Still And Mash Located

Baker, Aug. 25.—W. H. Turner and Charles Graham, prominent farmers of Unity, were arrested Saturday as the result of an investigation which Sheriff Price Anderson, Deputy Sheriff William Pierce, District Attorney Levens and Federal Agent Fred Currey have been making during the last few days.

Turner and Graham will be brought up before United States commissioner W. L. Patterson on charges of making illicit liquor.

The officers found more than 70 gallons of raisin and prune mash in the alleged distillery in the Unity country. The two men were brought to the city, where they will be held pending hearing.

Other stills have been found by the officers in the vicinity of Whitney, but as yet no arrests have been made because of lack of evidence. Nothing will be done in regard to these stills until further evidence can be gathered by the authorities.

Well Known Missouri Educator Is Drowned

Cape Girardeau, Mo., Aug. 25.—(I. N. S.)—Prof. Homer L. Roberts, head of the department of biology at the Missouri State Teachers' college, was drowned in Current river near Eminence, Mo., Tuesday. He was one of the best known educators in Missouri. Lieutenant Edward S. Roberts, U. S. A., his son, is now in Antwerp as a member of the American Olympic team. Prof. Roberts was on a vacation trip.

Groceryman Claims \$43,000,000 Estate

Montreal, Aug. 25.—(I. N. S.)—A local grocer, Hyman Horowitz, Tuesday claimed that he is the heir to a \$43,000,000 estate which is in the hands of the United States government. He asserts the estate rightfully is his as the heir to his uncle, who changed his religion and became a Catholic bishop.

\$4,500,000 Machine Contract Awarded

Hartford, Conn., Aug. 24.—(I. N. S.)—It was reported here on reliable authority today that the Colt Patent Firearms company of this city had received a contract from the government for the

manufacture of Browning machine guns to the amount of \$4,500,000. President G. Nichols of the company refused to confirm or deny the report. Colt stock jumped from 42 to 48 in the local market today.

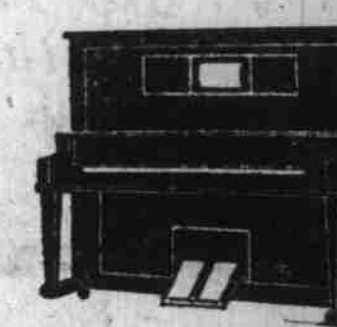
