

PANIC-STRICKEN, FAMISHED REDS FLEE OVER BORDER

Berlin, Aug. 27.—(U. P.)—Famine and desolation are following in the wake of the panic-stricken flight of the Bolshevik troops, who are crossing the frontier into East Prussia by thousands.

Many of the men are accompanied by their wives and children whom, they said, they were forced to bring with them on the invasion of Poland or they would have starved to death.

Indescribable scenes are being enacted along the border according to dispatches of press correspondents. German officials establish soup kitchens to care for the starving, emaciated Russians. Men, women and children, screaming and fighting, scrambled over each other in the rush for these rations, "like pigs fighting at a food trough," one correspondent said.

Some of the refugees, not realizing they could enter East Prussia without paying toll, offered hundreds of rubles and their personal trinkets to the frontier guards for their passage.

Hundreds of the Reds declare they never want to return to Russia, saying it is impossible to make a living there. The wildest rumors are in circulation among the prisoners. Word is passed from mouth to mouth that a revolution has broken out in Moscow and that Lenin and Trotsky have been slain.

The German government is negotiating with the entente regarding the feeding and ultimate disposal of the interned Russians. Tentative plans have been made to take them to Pillau and Swinemunde, and then distribute them among the more habitable former Russian prison camps.

World Is Ignorant Of Russ Conditions, Asserts Vanderlip

This was the positive treatment sug-

gested today by Frank A. Vanderlip, world-famed financier, when asked to comment on the Russian situation. "There is a tremendous ignorance in this country of what is actually going on in Russia," Vanderlip stated. "It is needless to say that I'm not a Bolshevik," Vanderlip added, laughing. "In fact, the great majority of Americans are not Bolsheviks. There is a wide ignorance, I believe, as to what bolshevism or communist socialism means."

"We cannot understand Russia if we try to look at her through a curtain," Vanderlip suggested that an American mission, either official or unofficial, but, unmistakably impartial, might do this country a good service by visiting Russia, just as British labor and other European delegations have done their part in reporting to our people the actual conditions, problems and needs of Russia, minus propaganda trimmings.

"Of course, it might be that the Russian soviet government would not permit such an impartial survey of their country," said Vanderlip. "But we might try. At present our information about Russia comes second or third hand."

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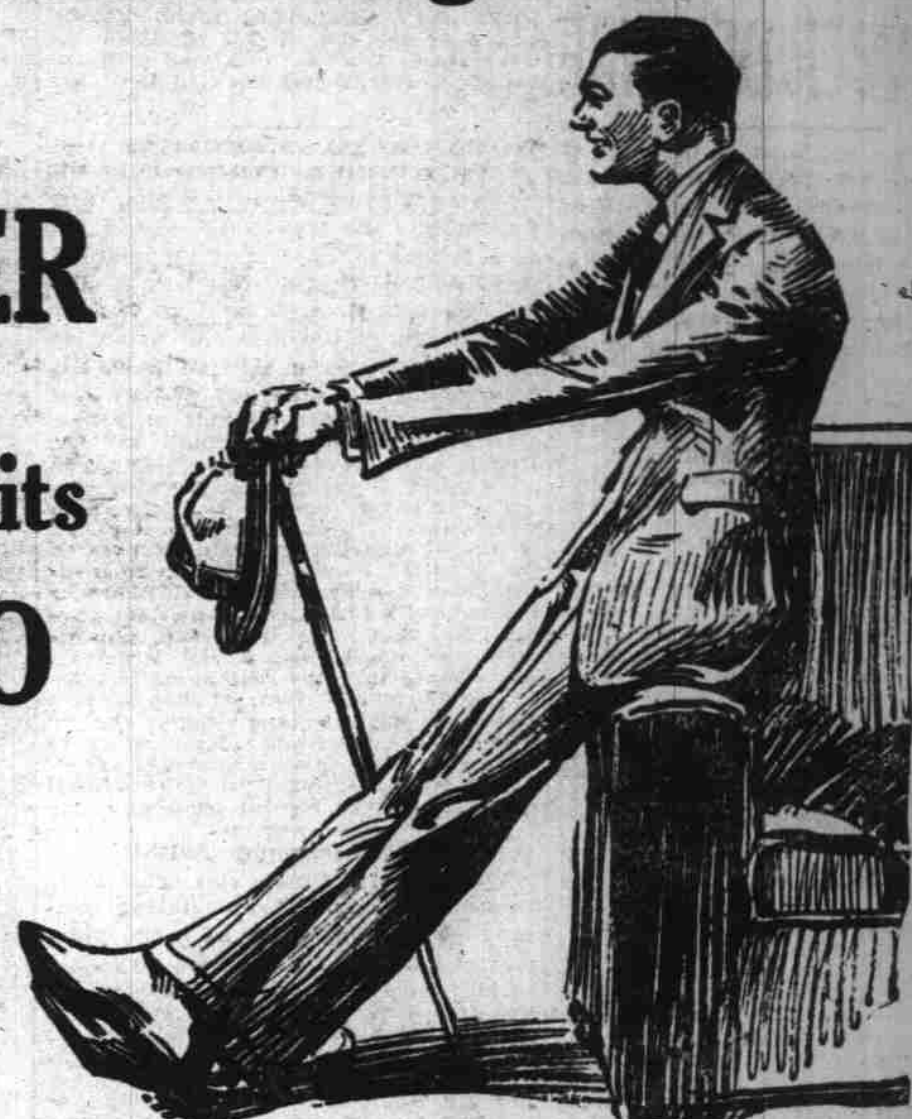
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
