

EUROPE EAGER TO KNOW HARDING'S PLAN FOR PEACE

London, Aug. 27.—There is great interest in diplomatic and official quarters here in what Senator Harding may promulgate in the way of a counter proposal for the League of Nations as advocated by Governor Cox.

There is greater interest, perhaps, because of the fact that Elihu Root, regarded as a sort of Republican guide, has been in consultation with Lloyd George, Premier Millerand of France, Arthur Balfour, Sir Eric Drummond and all of the foreign diplomats, during recent weeks, to sound out allied opinion on the subject of Article X of the League of Nations covenant.

Root has gone over the ground thoroughly in connection with his work on the international court plan under the league and is in a position to advise Harding authoritatively on allied opinion. It is a mistake, say Root's friends, to think that he favors scrapping the present league and substituting for it an international court alone.

He has found, they say, that European diplomats are not enthusiastic about a court which would involve ironclad arbitration pledges. In fact, Root has found, it is said, that Europe is as fearful of a plan for strong arbitration pledges as many Americans are fearful of Article X.

So there is little likelihood that Root will counsel a scuttling of the Wilson league in its entirety. He has been for the league with reservations from the outset, and in his work here on the international court, provided in the covenant, he had built up a plan based upon the ideal that the League of Nations will, in fact, be the international institution it was intended.

Miners Are Pleased With Increased Pay For Coal Industry

Chicago, Aug. 27.—(I. N. S.)—Satisfaction was expressed today over the new wage agreement reached between representatives of the United Mine Workers and the Illinois Coal Operators' association by which day men in Illinois mines are granted an increase of \$1.50 per day. The agreement is expected to insure peace in the Illinois field until March 1, 1922, when it expires.

More than 50,000 miners are affected. Frank Farrington, head of the miners, said the men would be satisfied although their original demands were for \$2 per day increase.

It was agreed that during the time the agreement is in effect no effort will be made to modify or change the wage contract. The miners' officials pledge themselves to use their full authority to insure operation and maximum production at all mines. Payment of bonuses is abolished.

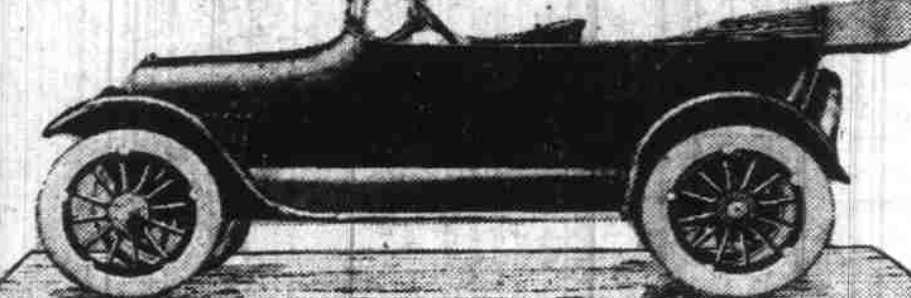
Governor Davis of Idaho Is Taken Ill

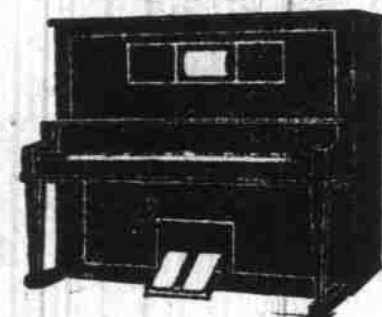

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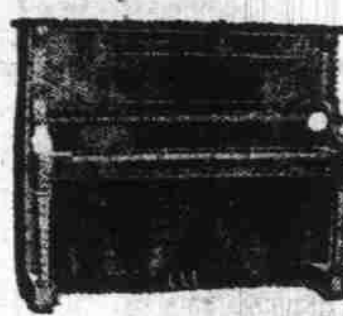


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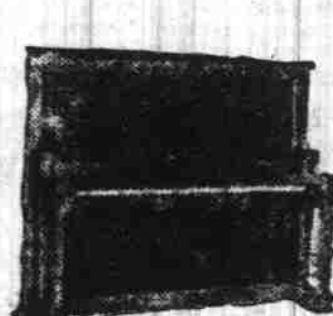
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
