

Waverley Country Club Plans to Postpone Punch Bowl Golf Competition Until October

Punch Bowl Tourney to Be Set Back

Final Classic of Golf Season Is Likely to Be Postponed Until October.

THE Punch Bowl golf competition, the final classic of the 1920 season in the Pacific Northwest—originally scheduled to be played on the Waverley Country club course September 18, may be postponed until the following month on account of the condition of the links. This announcement was made Saturday by Walter E. Pearson, chairman of the handicaps committee of the Waverley Country club. "Our course is pretty good at this time due to the long dry spell, and it has been suggested that the bowl matches be postponed until about a time the course is in top shape," said Pearson.

HAVE STRONG TEAM
If the northern clubs agree to the postponement, it is likely that the team match between Waverley and Seattle clubs for the Burns trophy will be played the following day.

There is a great deal of interest in the coming Punch Bowl competition. The Waverley club annexed the bowl at Seattle last year after one of the closest matches in the history of the trophy.

Captain C. Harry Davis Jr. of the Waverley team is hopeful of retaining the bowl. Among the players who will likely be on the team this year are Russell Smith, Guy M. Standifer, Forest Watson, Ellis J. Bragg, A. S. Kerry, Dr. O. R. Williams, Roscoe Pawsitt and Rudolph Wilhelm.

H. Chandler Egan may play in the tourney. The northern clubs will also have strong teams again this year. One of the biggest fields that ever participated in a tournament is expected.

TASK TO RATE GOLFERS

Rating the golfers of the Pacific Northwest Golf association is the task that confronts John H. Chandler Egan, ex vice president of the association. H. Chandler Egan, ex vice president of the Northwest championship title, will be in charge of the national match with Rudolph Wilhelm, who will rank number one.

Wilhelm, who holds the Oregon title, which he won last year, will be placed in the number two class. There will be a great number of players in the next three classes.

The division of the tournament providing for a handicap championship seems to have met with favor. It will be a record breaking entry in the men's event.

CALIFORNIA FOLLOWS SUIT

The California open golf championship will not be staged in conjunction with the amateur event to be staged in September at the Waverley Country club.

Practically every big golf association in the country has separated the open from the amateur championship events. This move is a good one and is meeting with popular favor wherever it is put into effect.

WILHELM EN ROUTE EAST

Rudolph Wilhelm, Oregon state champion, left Friday for New York to participate in the national amateur championship tournament. Wilhelm is the first Oregon player to enter the big golf classic, and if he plays in the same style that he has in the Northwest tourneys this year he will be among the contenders for the title. Wilhelm plans to play several practice rounds before the tourney opens.

The Portland Golf club championships will be determined next month, and the Waverley club events will be staged in October.

Champion Reds Will Not Trade Ruether

Roke has signified his willingness to run Sir Barton against the "wonder horse," and Samuel D. Riddle, owner of Man o' War, said he would announce his decision in a few days.

Willie Jackson, the New York light-weight boxer, has received \$1,400 since January 12 for his fights in which he engaged. His largest reward was \$13,448.87 for his contest with Low Decker, in Philadelphia, a few weeks ago, in one of the baseball parks.

Robertson Offered 3-Year Job by Penn.

Lawson Robertson, former Irish-American A. C. coach and tutor of the University of Pennsylvania for the last three years, has been offered a new three-year contract by the Red and Blue. Robertson, who is married and has a family, is said to be in good health and is to receive an increase in salary. Under Robertson's coaching the university won its first inter-collegiate track and field championship the last season, since the days of the late Mike Murphy.

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Rainiers Not to Let Bohne Join Reds Until 1921

Sammy Bohne, Seattle star third baseman, recently purchased by the Cincinnati Reds, cannot join the majors until spring, despite distress signals wired here for his immediate use in the East, according to William Klepper, president of the Seattle club, today.

"We will not sacrifice the interests of the Seattle club," said Klepper. "Bohne is in the race for the coast league pennant and it would not be fair to the fans to send him east now," said Boss Klepper.

Former Yale Player Has Task Ahead

Elmer McDevitt to Coach Northwestern Team; 'Chic' Harley to Assist at Ohio State.

CHICAGO, Ill., Aug. 28.—College athletics in the Middle West will be considerably "rejuvenated" beginning with the football season this fall, according to plans announced by faculties of several big mid-western schools.

The "rejuvenation" will consist of changes in the coaching department with a view to strengthening college teams in all sports.

At present efforts are being concentrated in improving the football chances of several colleges in the Big Ten.

CHIC HARLEY TO HELP

Although they were runners up in the championship last year, Ohio State will have in addition to Jack Wilce, Chick Harley, who captained the Buckeye eleven in 1919.

Harley will take the kickers in hand and if he has the faculty for teaching the game as well as he played it, Ohio should be well up in front from a kicking standpoint. Harley was one of the best punters and field goal kickers in the West last year and was selected by most critics for a position on the All-American football team.

Northwestern university will probably have what is considered the most important football change. Elmer McDevitt, a former player, will direct the Purple eleven this fall. McDevitt was assistant to Fred Murphy when the latter coached Northwestern, and succeeded Charles Gorman, who will handle the Kansas Jayhawks.

ILLINOIS LOSES JONES

McDevitt is up against the hardest proposition ever tackled by a Northwestern football coach. The stiffest schedule in the history of the Evanston school is set for this season. On October 9 Northwestern meets Minnesota. It closes the season against the hard driving "Duke" team.

Alonso Stager will direct the fortunes of the Chicago university team and Coach Williams will again act as the football tutor to Minnesota's gridiron stars.

Changes in the athletic directing will not be confined to football alone, however. Illinois loses the services of Ralph Jones, who has coached the Illinois basketball team since 1912. Jones is going to Lake Forest, Ill., academy, to take charge of all of its athletic activities.

At Wisconsin, Dr. W. E. Meanwell, former basketball coach, will return to direct the basketball team. Meanwell is considered one of the best basketball coaches in the country. The Wisconsin five won five championships when Meanwell was with them before.

Portland A. C. Is Going to Form a Football Squad

One of the first independent football teams to be organized in Portland for the 1920 season will be known as the Portland Athletic club eleven according to an announcement made by Louis Gallo, instructor at Lincoln Park, and Henry Cook, last year with the Multnomah Amateur Athletic club, who will act as coach as well as play in the backfield.

Former college and Portland Interscholastic league stars are asked to sign up for the new organization and efforts will be made to secure contests with Reed, college football stars, and the Chemawa Indians and the rook representatives of the University of Oregon and Oregon Agricultural college.

McDevitt, a 190-pounder, is looked on to be the main stay at center and Cal Krause, says he is going to tryout for tackle. None of the athletes who have signified their intentions of coming out for the campaign, is assured of a position inasmuch as the personnel of the team will be named on merits only and not through friendship.

If the present cool weather keeps up the first workout will be held next week on the Montgomery track, otherwise the second Sunday in September will see the independents swinging into action.

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MAN O' WAR MAY SET UP NOT FAR BEHIND RECORD

Great Horse Has Won 16 Out of 17 Races; Fifth in List.

NO AMERICAN thoroughbred ever has won \$200,000 in his lifetime, but Man o' War went another step toward that mark in winning the Travers Stakes at Saratoga Springs.

To date, the son of Fair Play, Mahubah, has won \$141,575 in purses and stakes, and is 11th behind Domino, Sycamby, Colin and Ballot on the list of great winning horses in this country.

New Systems Of Football For P. C. Fans

Oregon Aggies, Stanford and Washington Will Use New Styles This Season.

PACIFIC COAST INTERCOLLEGIATE conference football fans are going to see some new styles of play this coming season, since the Oregon Agricultural college, Leland Stanford and the University of Washington have signed up new coaches.

The Oregon Aggies will be tutored by R. B. Rutherford, former captain of the University of Nebraska team, who will, no doubt, use the system of play that "Jumbo" Steinhilber had such great success with when he headed the Cornhuskers.

Ralph Powell, the new Stanford coach, is a Wisconsin man, and his style of play will be patterned after the system used by the Badgers. "Stubby" Allison, Washington's young mentor, will put out a new brand of game.

THREE USE SAME
Pennsylvania's old plays will be ace high at California, with Andy Smith as head coach, and the Oregon system perfected by Hugo Bezdek will prevail at Oregon, while Coach Welch of the Pullman Cougars will depend upon the Carlisle plays to bring the championship to Washington State college.

One dozen veteran members of the University of Washington football team will report to Coach Allison September 15, when the grind for the season will be started. Washington needs an end to replace George Smith, a fullback to fill Thiesen's shoes and a couple of big husky linemen.

Among the members of last year's team, who will be back, are: Ted Paule, "Sandy" Wick, Rhea Butler, Gus Pope, Bob Abel, "Red" Hyndman, Frank Townsend, Gerry Wachter, Herman Miller, Zeke Clark, Bill Grimm and Jimmy Gilly.

STANFORD LOSES STARS
Stanford loses a number of its best players last season in "Dink" Templeton, Elinman, Caughey, Pelouse and Lilly. Among some of the new players Coach Powell will have to train for the places vacated by these men are Howard Deane, who played with the Occidental team three years; Dick Arnett, who played halfback on an eastern army team; Will Pawsitt, All-Southern California last season, and Doug Sproule and MacAlpine of the 1919 freshman squad.

The hopes of the Oregon Aggies rested on a new coach, when Carl Lodell announced that he had signed to coach the La Grande high school team. The loss of Cack Hubbard, all-const and last season, through ineptitude, also caused a slump in the Aggie stock.

When a feller wins the world championship, he gets a real mark. But his game suddenly collapsed at the last flag. The front nerves and the physical endurance that had pounded out that great score failed.
