

SUFFRAGE VICTORY IS CELEBRATED BY WOMEN AT LUNCH

Mrs. Millie R. Trumbull Given Ovation When She Attacks Politicians Who Opposed Move

The absolute necessity for the solidarity for the woman sentiment and the woman vote, the need of learning the lesson of standing for principle rather than party—these are the big things that now confront the women of this nation," declares Mrs. Millie R. Trumbull in her address at the luncheon given Saturday afternoon at the Hotel Benson under the auspices of the Oregon Equal Suffrage Alliance in celebration of the passage of the federal suffrage amendment.

Conditions in Oregon "before and after" suffrage were handled here by Mrs. Trumbull and her denunciation of the "before" politicians in which she said she would have to let the voters decide for their refusal to even listen to the protestations and pleadings of the women. She made a plea for the non-partisan primary, a woman physician at the Cedars, women on juries and a careful scrutiny of candidates for circuit judge.

BAKER PAYS TRIBUTE

The program opened with the singing of "America," invocation by Mrs. Mattie M. Sleeth and the reading of telegrams from Mrs. Carrie Chapman Catt, president of the National Equal Suffrage association, and from Mrs. Ada E. Milliken, who sent greetings from an Eastern Oregon equal suffrage association.

Mayor Baker paid a tribute to the refining and uplifting influence in Oregon of the women since they had had the ballot. He declared that to the women is due the credit for the evolution of Portland from one of the roughest cities in the country 17 years ago to one of the cleanest now.

HISTORY OF MOVE REVIEWED

A history of the national work for suffrage dating from its inception was given by Mrs. M. L. T. Hadden, who named many of the pioneer workers, paying a high tribute to Frances Willard, whose petitions bearing thousands of names in an effort to secure suffrage, were spat upon and thrown upon the floor. Mrs. Hadden took occasion to rap the radical element of the suffrage movement, the National Woman's party. Mrs. Sarah Evans gave a history of the suffrage movement in Oregon, detailing the various unsuccessful efforts to secure the right of suffrage. The first suffrage organization was founded in 1871 by Mrs. Martha Walton, mother of Mrs. Warren B. Thomas. Mrs. Abigail Scott Duniway started the suffrage publication, The New Northwest, in 1872. In 1874 the legislature was asked to pass a suffrage bill, but refused. In 1878 school suffrage was obtained. In 1884 suffrage was submitted to the people, but was defeated; again in 1900 it was submitted to the people and failed. In 1906, 1908 and 1910 it was submitted and defeated, but in 1912 victory crowned the efforts of the workers.

MRS. DUNIWAY RECALLED

Dr. Viola May Coe, in reviewing the work of some of the pioneer workers, said: "Fifty years ago to-day Mrs. Duniway's own words, 'State eggs came my way'—the change in public sentiment since that day is one of the impressive things of this day." Mrs. Coe mentioned in highest terms Mrs. Duniway, Dr. Mary A. Thompson, Dr. Jessie Myers, Mrs. Cartwright and Mrs. Dalton. Mrs. Helen Ekin Starrett recalled in an entertaining manner her attendance at the first suffrage convention held in Washington, D. C., in 1883 and compared it with the recent victory convention at Chicago, which she also attended. Dr. Esther Fohl Loveloy, in speaking of the future work of women, made a plea for independence of thought and action, de-

U. S. ALTERS ITS POLICY TO ARDS POLISH INVASION

American Would Sanction Crossing Into Russia to Guard Against Further Red Invasion.

Washington, Aug. 28.—It was announced by Secretary of the Navy Daniels today that Admiral Kuntze and the American squadron now at Reval, had been ordered to proceed from that port to Dantzig. Later in the day Secretary Colby held a conference with Admiral Knapp at the department of state.

It was learned from an unofficial source this afternoon that a complete new set of instructions were sent to Admiral Huse. They are so revolutionary in fact, that they constitute a material change of policy on the part of the United States.

POLICY IS CHANGED

First and most important of all, it is a certainty that the American government has determined not to insist that the Polish army remain within the ethnic borders of Poland, but that they shall be permitted to proceed a sufficient distance into Russian territory to safeguard Poland against further invasion by the soviet armies. In this the United States is in thorough accord with the attitude assumed by Great Britain, Italy and the other nations.

MANHATTAN FAVORS COX

In Manhattan, 15 women were asked for their opinion. Eight are for Cox, two for Harding, one for Debs and three undecided. Of the total number seven are Democrats, two Republicans and six independents. Five were for the league and two against it. One was opposed to prohibition.

COX LEADS IN BRONX

In the Bronx a poll of 25 women gives Cox 11, Harding seven, Debs four and undecided three. Two are Democrats, two Republicans, one Socialist, and 20 class themselves as independents. One of the independents is for Debs, six for Harding, two for Debs and three undecided. Three are in favor of the league and two against it. One is opposed to prohibition.

ONE AGAINST LEAGUE

The vote of 15 women in Richmond gives seven to Cox and five to Harding. There are seven Democrats, four Republicans and one independent. The independent is for Harding. One of them is against the league.

IN YONKERS

In Yonkers there were 20 votes, 10 for Cox and 10 for Harding. Four of them were Democrats, six Republicans and 10 independents. Of the independents in the Yonkers poll six are for Cox and four for Harding. Three are in favor of the league and one against.

DRY ISSUE IGNORED

The Hoboken poll of 21 women shows 12 for Cox, 8 for Harding and 1 undecided. There are 5 Democrats, 3 Republicans and 13 independents. Of them 8 are for Cox, 4 for Harding and 1 undecided. Nine are for the league and 6 are against it. The wet and dry issue is ignored altogether.

IN ORANGE

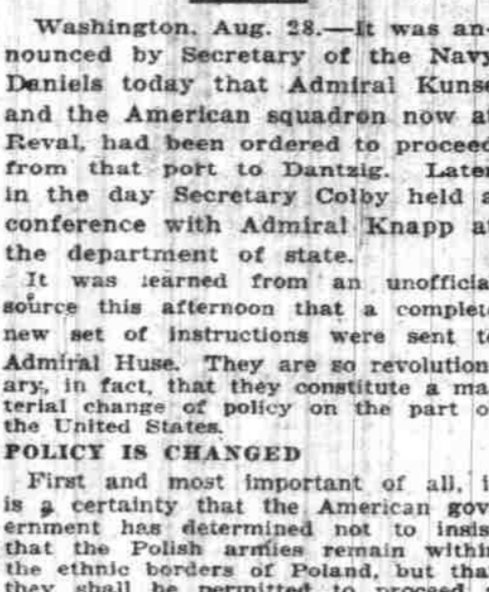
In Orange, out of 13 women 2 are for Cox, 9 for Harding and 2 undecided. One is a Democrat, 9 Republicans and 3 independents, of whom 1 is for Cox and 2 undecided. Three are for the league and 1 against it.

IN JERSEY CITY

In Jersey City, out of 11 votes, 8 are for Cox and 3 for Harding. There are 8 Democrats, 2 Republicans and 1 independent. The Democrats are for Cox, the Republicans for Harding. Of the independents, 2 are for Cox and 1 for Harding. One is an advocate for the league, 1 is strongly opposed to prohibition.

TROOPS ARE SENT TO COAL FIELDS OF WEST VIRGINIA

Governor Cornwell Asks Federal Aid to Quell Disorders in Mining Region.

Charleston, W. Va., Aug. 28.—(U. P.)—A detachment of federal troops from Camp Sherman, Ohio, has been ordered to the West Virginia coal fields at the request of Governor Cornwell. It was announced at the Governor's office tonight. The troops are to be stationed in Williamson, W. Va.

In making the announcement of his request for federal aid, Governor Cornwell said many disorders have occurred in the Williamson and other districts and the trouble is spread over a wide area and is too much for the small police force. The mountainous country makes the work of maintaining order all the more difficult, he said.

Citizens in the Mattewan field, where several fatalities occurred in a gun battle several weeks ago, have received letters threatening death. Word of threatened violence has been received from other parts of the mine fields.

SHOTS EXCHANGED BETWEEN MINERS AND MINE GUARDS

Huntington, W. Va., Aug. 28.—(U. P.)—Several hundred shots were fired today in a rifle and pistol battle between coal miners and mine guards at Williamsbranch mine near Fayette county. State police received reports of the shooting of Major Payne, a detective. They believe that several others were injured, but were unable to gain any definite information of the battle and the casualties.
