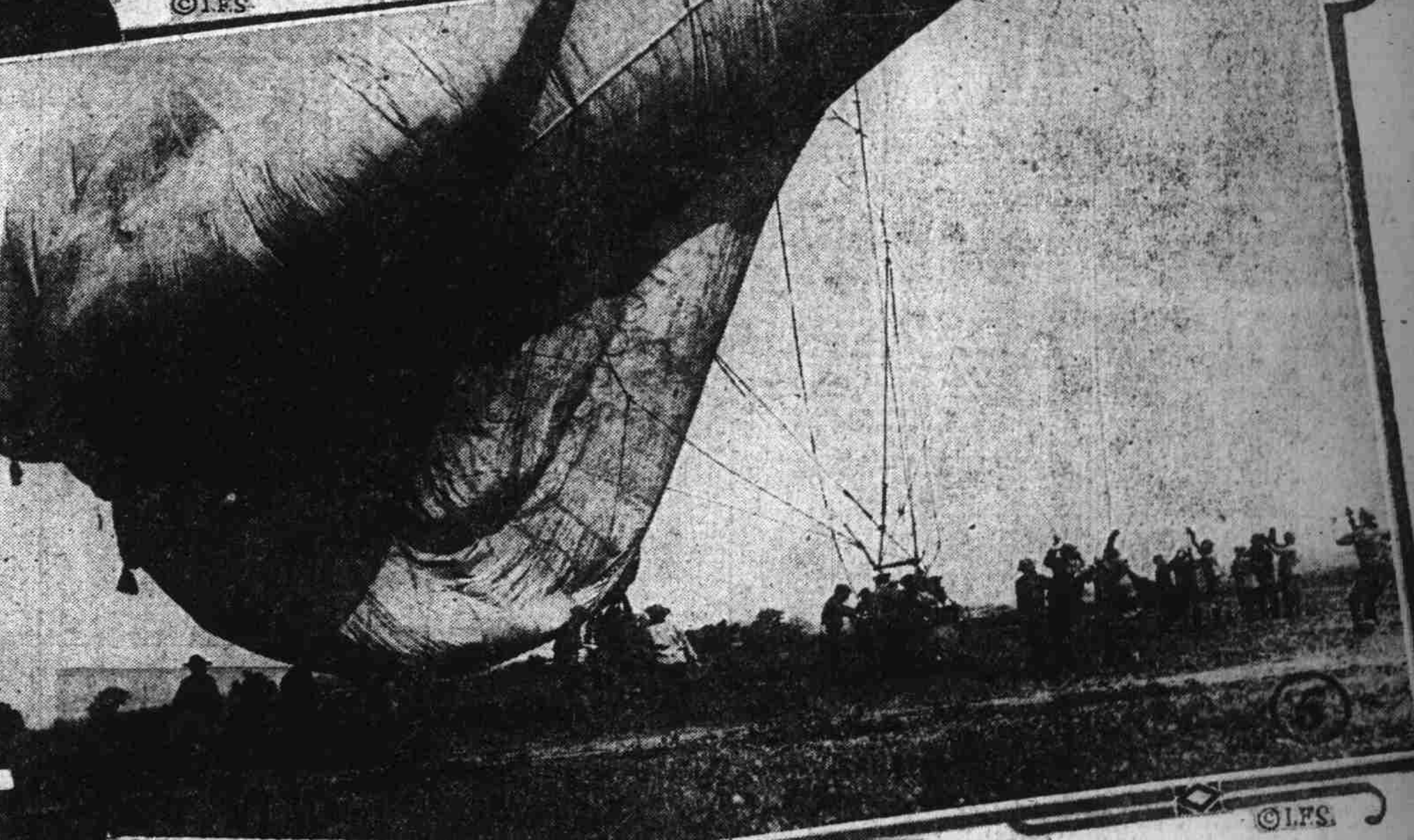
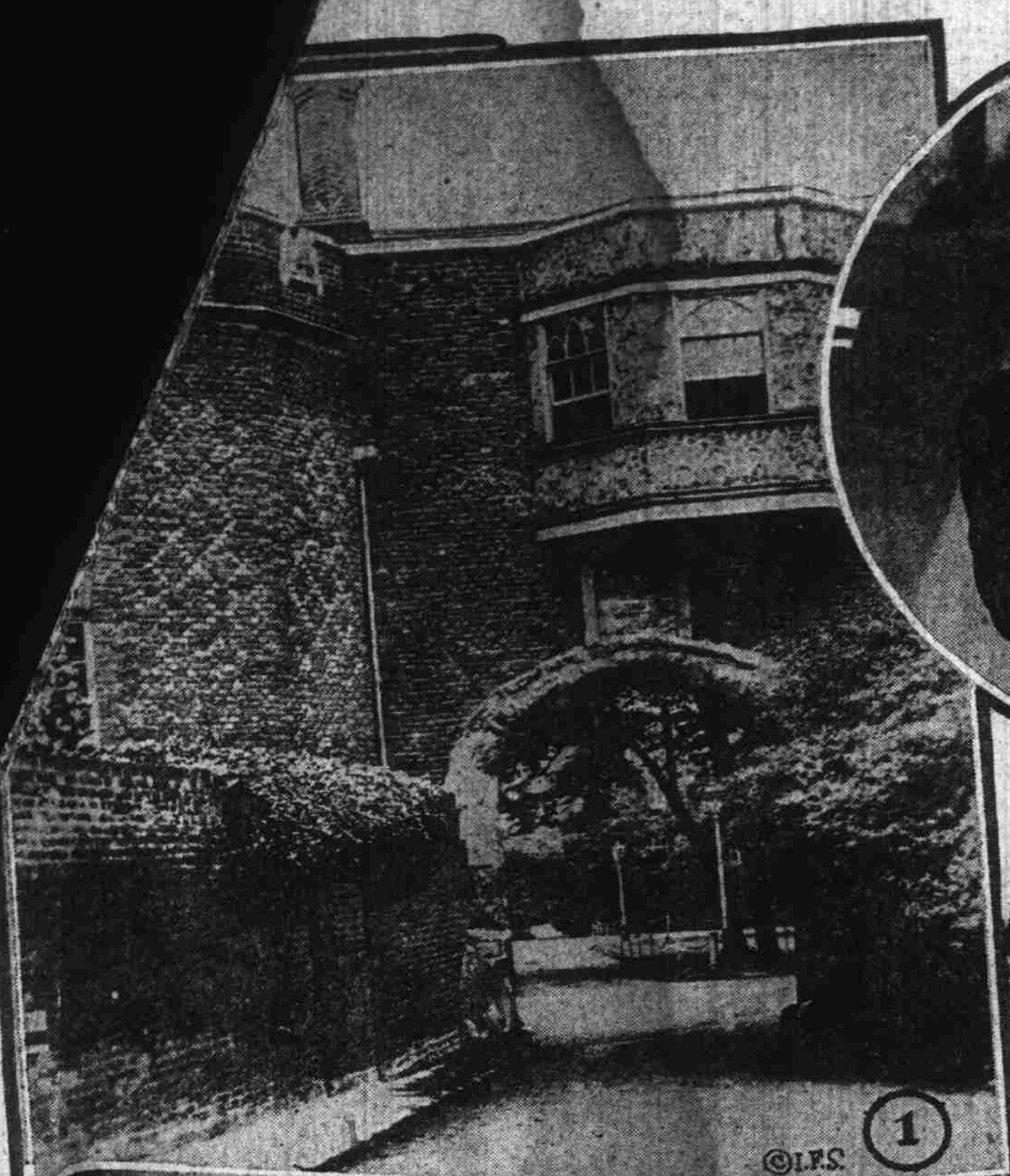

ELECTRICITY'S PART IN WORLD PROGRESS SHOWN

Films of Educational Value Are Taken to Show People Divers Industrial Activity in U. S.

Electric appliances have come into such general use that the public has a right to know everything that it can learn about electricity, and with this belief as a working basis, the General Electric company is turning out a series of educational films showing the part that electricity plays in every industry.

The lumber industry is one of the most important enterprises that makes use of electricity in many forms and to get the best scenes obtainable the General Electric company has sent C. F. Batsch to Oregon to film two reels of film here.

"Great dangers which the donkey engine incur from a fire standpoint has caused us to work into the picture the effective work that electric loggers are doing," said Batsch in discussing the work Tuesday.

"The General Electric company has been supplying a greater amount of education to the public than any other electric company. These films are used purely as an educational feature and not as an advertising medium. The General Electric company considers that anything helping the electrical industry in general will aid the company."

FENDELTON IS FILMED

"Just before coming to Oregon we filmed a picture titled 'Revelations' in which the X-ray shows the human body in action. We filmed the four industries in the Middle-west and took supplementary pictures of wheat fields at Pendleton. From Oregon we will go to Oakland to film the incandescent light industry and then finish up some final scenes in the Southwest and South for pictures treating on the woolen and cotton industries."

"We are going from stem to stern through the lumber industry and will show all phases. Scenes are being filmed in Oregon and Washington for two reels and these will be distributed to colleges and theatres as educational pictures. They will contain no advertising."

FOREST CONE CROP TO BE GATHERED IN EARLY SEPTEMBER

J. F. Kummel, Forest Examiner, Returns From Making Arrangements to Collect Cone Harvest

The annual gathering of the forest cone crop will begin early in September, from the seed of which will be raised the young trees at Wind River nursery which will be used to restock the old burns and logged off areas which forest fires have rendered incapable of natural reproduction.

J. F. Kummel, forest examiner, in charge of planting, has just returned from Wind River, where he has been arranging for the cone harvest. Fifty pounds of Western white pine seed, 75 pounds of noble fir and 50 pounds of silver fir will be gathered from near the Race Track ranger station on the Columbia national forest.

The crop this year is not quite up to standard, it is said.

The plan for gathering and drying the seed involves the employment of four or five men, who will climb the trees and pick the cones before they have begun to open. They will drop them to the ground, where they will be picked up, placed into sacks and carried to a log kiln, where they will be dried. If the weather is permissible the cones will be dried in the open air, spread upon

INSANE SURVEY IS MADE BY U. OF O. WORKER IN STATE

Miss Mozelle Hair of the U. of O. Extension Division, Does Valuable Work for Oregon.

Miss Mozelle Hair, secretary of extension teaching in the extension division of the University of Oregon, the gathering of data concerning the insane both in and out of institutions in the western part of the state.

Miss Hair has been acting as one of the special field investigators of the Oregon state survey of mental defect, delinquency and dependency which the United States public health service is directing for the University of Oregon at the request of the legislature. The facts concerning the insane in the eastern part of the state were contributed by Dr. Wilson D. McNary, superintendent of the Eastern Oregon state hospital at Pendleton.

"The Oregon state survey contemplates making a study as to the number and type of cases of mental disorder in Oregon as part of its studies in mental defect," said Dr. Carlisle, director of the survey.

"Having no state appropriations, the survey is being carried forward entirely by citizen cooperation. This active cooperation of Oregonians in this pioneer movement in mental hygiene indicates

E. V. LANE of New York has just taken over for a period of 13 years old Richmond Palace in the suburbs of London (above at right).
