Tigers Dine On 2 Courses Of Duck Meat

STILL in the rut, where the Seattle Rainiers put them a fortnight ago, the Beavers were checked twice by the ferocious Tigers Sunday afternoon, 5 to 2 and 6 to 1. The double victory gave the Tigers five out of the six games and put Esick's Bengals out in front of the Coast league parade.

Although the fans staged the first pop-bottle and cushion showers of the season on Empire Mall, it did not help the Beavers any, although it did instill a little bit of fighting spirit into Dick Cox, who grabbed for a whole inning on a called strike, finally arousing the ire of Umpire Byron. Cox took his shower ahead of the rest of the players.

HARD DAY FOR UMPS
The shower from the bleachers was caused by Esick calling Mitchell safe at first on a close play. From the press stand it appeared as though Mitchell beat Blue, who had recovered a fumble, by an eyelash.

The umpires had a pretty tough day of it. Ed Baker, Byron, Mitchell, and who was up at the plate for Kingdon in the eighth inning of the first game, were the only umpires who were not loaded at the time.

The Beavers had a rotten day all around. Pitchers Polson and Sutherland were touched up pretty freely by the Vernon batsmen and the base running of the Beavers was very ragged in spots. Maybe it was due to their cleats getting choked with mud, but it looked bad from the grandstand's point of view.

After getting out of a bad hole in the second inning, Polson got himself into another tight place in the third, but managed to crawl out with only one run scored against him. A fast double play with the bases loaded, Edington being nabbed at the plate and Del Baker looking for a runner at first, killed the Tigers' chances for more runs.

DICKS COME BACK
Portland came back with two runs. Siglin hooked one of Frank Shenbach's curves for a single to center and went around to third when Smith threw a grounder into right field in an effort to catch Paddy at second.

Maisel was safe on a fielder's choice and when Fisher threw low to Devormer Siglin scored. Blue forced Wistral at third and Cox scored Maisel with a hit to center.

The Tigers tied the count in the sixth on singles by Mueller and Morse and then they threw in an error to complete a double play. In the seventh, three singles, a walk and a pretty bunt by Mueller gave the Tigers three tallies.

Manager Mac started to shoot in pinch hitters in the eighth and ninth and used three of them in an effort to get started, but failed. Brooks pitched the last two frames and held the Tigers at bay.

FOURTEEN OFF SUTHERLAND
The Tigers collected 14 bingles off Sutherland in the second game, scoring one run each in the second, fifth and sixth innings, and putting three over in the eighth on four hits and a walk.

Portland made only five hits off Willie Mitchell in the second battle, its lone tally coming on Mueller's error, a passed ball, and a sacrifice hit. Short and a second boot by Mueller, who let Mitchell's throw get away from him.

Smith of the Tigers was chased from the first game and repeated the feat both the umpires and the Beavers had a bad day.

Outfielder Manush drew the blue slip after the game. Manager Mac was not desiring to carry him on the two weeks' sojourn in the southland, where it is hoped the Beavers will hit dry weather and get out of the rut.

Del Baker strained his side in the first game and probably will be out of the game for a week or 10 days.

AMATEUR HEADS TO HOLD MEET IN VICTORIA, OCT. 3
The annual meeting of the Pacific Northwest association, the governing body of amateur athletics in the northwest and a branch of the Amateur Athletic Union, will be held in Victoria, B. C., according to an announcement made by Harry S. Burdick of Spokane and president of the P. N. A. The report of the association in all probability will be October 2.

Besides the election of officers and naming of committee chairmen, the awarding of the various championships will be one of the important matters to be disposed of. Several applications have been made for the track and field events, the boxing and wrestling bouts and the swimming contests, but nothing definite will be done until the officials of the P. N. A. meet at Victoria.

A report of the American Olympic games committee is expected to be issued in time to be received for the October 3 session.

Local Girl Diver Wins Third Place
BRUSSELS, Aug. 30.—America added to its rowing laurels by winning three of their four events yesterday and finishing second in the other.

The most popular races were the eight-oar, which the navy crew won, and the single scull, which went to Jack Kelly of Philadelphia.

The U. S. naval academy established a new world record for 2000 meters in 6 minutes 5 seconds, defeating the London crew of British stars by half a length.

Kelly's time in the single sculls was 7 minutes 35 seconds. Both he and the Englishman, Heresford, were exhausted at the finish.

In the double sculls, without Coxswain, Kelly and Paul Costello won in 7 minutes 9 seconds, with Italy second and France third.

SWITZERLAND WINNER
Switzerland won the four-oared race in 8 minutes 54 seconds with the Philadelphia Barque club second and Norway fourth.

In the two-oared race, with coxswain, in which America had no entry, Italy was first, France second and Switzerland third.

Duke Kahanamoku, Honolulu, set a new Olympic record in the 100 metre free-style swim at Antwerp. He won the final in 1 minute 12.5 seconds, bettering the old mark by one second. Koloa and Harris, both of Honolulu, were second and third, and Heraldo, Australia, fourth.

DUKE SETS MARK
Another new mark was made in the 800 metre relay, which the American team won in 10 minutes 4.5 seconds, compared with the old record of 10 minutes 10.5 seconds. Australia was second, England third and Sweden fourth.

The 200 metre breast-stroke went to Malmro, Sweden, with Henning, Sweden, second; Aaltoven, Finland, third, and J. Howell, Oakland, Cal., fourth, in 3 minutes 4.5 seconds.

Pinckston, San Francisco, won the final of the fancy diving. Adler, Sweden, was second, and Priest, Los Angeles, third.

America made "a slam" in the ladies' springboard diving. Allen Rignin, New York, was first; Helen Walwright, New York, second, and Thelma Payne, Portland, third.

In the 100 metre ladies' team race, America was first, with England second and Sweden third. America was defeated for second place in water polo by Belgium 7 to 2.

Khaki Used in Cars
Still another use has been found for the thousands of yards of khaki cloth destined to make uniforms for American soldiers in France and sold to the French government after the armistice. The interiors of Paris taxicabs are being upholstered with the khaki cloth which is warranted to last several years.

Auto Races Will Be Staged Labor Day
Centralia, Aug. 30.—The automobile races which were to have been run Saturday afternoon at the fair grounds and which were postponed on account of the rain and a muddy track, will be run on Labor day. E. P. Kane, promoter of the events, announced last night. Owners of all entries agreed to have their cars at the track on that day.

The Labor day events will include two auto races, one for larger and the other smaller cars; a motorcycle race with side cars and one without. If possible a race between an automobile and an airplane will be arranged.
